a powerful debunking of first amendment orthodoxy that critiques reckless speech which endangers vulnerable groups and elevates fearless speech which seeks to advance equality and democracy freedom of speech has never been more important or more controversial from debates about what is permissible on social media to the politics of campus speakers and corporate advertisements the first amendment is incessantly in the news and constantly being held up as the fundamental principle of american democracy yet in reality it has contributed more to eroding our democracy than supporting it in fearless speech dr mary anne franks emphasizes the distinction between what speech a democratic society should protect and what speech a democratic society should promote while the first amendment in theory is politically neutral in practice it has been legally deployed most visibly and effectively to promote powerful antidemocratic interests misogyny racism religious zealotry and corporate self interest in other words reckless speech instead franks argues we need to focus on fearless speech

speakers who have risked their safety their reputations and in some cases their lives to call out injustice and hold the powerful accountable whether it be civil rights leaders the women of the metoo movement or pro choice advocates franks shows us how their cases and their voices can allow us to promote a more democratic version of free speech told through an accessible narrative and ending with a call for change that urges us to reevaluate the legal precedents and uses of the first amendment fearless speech is a revelatory new argument that urges us to reimagine what our society could look like

pygmalion s chisel for women who are never good enough by tracy m hallstead examines the enduring critical presence in contemporary western culture that scrutinizes critiques and sizes women down in their daily lives despite rights gained through the centuries pygmalion was the ancient mythical sculptor who believed that all women were essentially flawed he therefore endeavored to chisel to perfection a statue of a woman he called galatea like the perpetually carved and perfected galatea women labor under western culture s a priori assumption that they are flawed yet they are often unable to account for the self criticism and self doubt that result from this premise as hallstead analyzes the culture s requirements for the perfect woman she traces how cultural forces permeate women s personal lives in calling for solutions she resurfaces the thinking of historical women who responded rather than reacted to the patriarchal culture that devalued them in engaging these women of the past whose struggles were eerily similar to our own hallstead encourages a responsive feminism that becomes the clear path leading outside pygmalion s chamber door

most accounts date the birth of american abolitionism to 1831 when william lloyd garrison began publishing his radical antislavery newspaper the liberator in fact however the abolition movement had been born with the american republic in the decades following the revolution abolitionists worked steadily to eliminate slavery and racial injustice and their tactics and strategies constantly evolved tracing the development of the abolitionist movement from the 1770s to the 1830s richard newman focuses particularly on its transformation from a conservative lobbying effort into a fiery grassroots reform cause what began in late eighteenth century pennsylvania as an elite movement espousing gradual legal reform began to change in the 1820s as black activists female reformers and nonelite whites pushed their way into the antislavery movement located primarily in massachusetts these new reformers demanded immediate emancipation and they revolutionized abolitionist strategies and tactics lecturing extensively publishing gripping accounts of life in bondage and organizing on a grassroots level their attitudes and actions made the abolition movement the radical cause we view it as today
