in this accessible introductory guide the author identifies key feminist approaches to popular culture from the 1960s to the present and demonstrates how the relationship between feminism femininity and popular culture has often been a troubled one the book introduces the central ideas of both second wave feminism and feminist cultural studies and demonstrates how they inform feminist debates about a range of popular forms and practices through a series of case studies the woman s film romantic fiction soap opera consumption and material culture fashion and beauty practices and youth culture and popular music

monthly current affairs magazine from a christian perspective with a focus on politics society economics and culture

fashion is often dismissed as superficial reduced to fleeting trends but it is deeply intertwined with social and political discourse this book explores fashion s role in shaping and challenging identities through feminism queer theory and power dynamics rather than a linear history it presents fashion as a complex tapestry of resistance empowerment and transformation by igniting critical conversations it urges readers to see beyond aesthetics and engage with fashion s deeper societal impact

the time span covered by the routledge history of fashion and dress starts in the nineteenth century with the aftermath of the consumers revolution and reaches all the way to the present the fashion and garment industries have been international from the beginning and as such this volume looks at the history of fashion and dress through the lenses of both international and global history because fashion is also a

20th century and the types of garments adopted by women to overcome the challenges posed by fashionable dress it considers the many advocates for reform and examines their motives their arguments for change and how they promoted improvements in women s fashion though there was no single overarching dress reform movement it reveals similarities among the arguments posed by diverse groups of reformers including especially the equation of reform with an ideal image of improved health drawing on a variety of primary and secondary sources in the usa and europe including the popular press advice books for women allopathic and alternative medical literature and books on aesthetics art health and physical education the text makes a significant contribution to costume studies social history and women s studies

fascinating perspective a fascinating often funny and eminently stylish personal memoir i loved it chris breward author of the suit wide ranging thought provoking and important claire wilcox author of patch work elizabeth wilson is a pioneer of fashion studies yet she never intended to become an academic starting her literary career as a feminist activist writing for the underground press she went on to explore tennis bohemians and of course fashion her obsession along with forays into fiction throughout she has never seen her work as abstract or disengaged from real life in her memoir she traces this relationship between personal experience and her writing revisiting pivotal moments from childhood adolescence and adult life to explore her belief that research by its nature is always a form of autobiography she unfolds the garment of her life in a wide ranging exploration of scenes from her past

her difficult relationship with her mother fashion in the 60s and gay liberation in this journey through time she shows how experiences are inseparable from the way we seek to explain and understand them offering a unique and deeply personal account of her and our cultural world

celebrity culture has a pervasive presence in our everyday lives perhaps more so than ever before it shapes not simply the production and consumption of media content but also the social values through which we experience the world this collection analyses this phenomenon bringing together essays which explore celebrity across a range of media cultural and political contexts the authors investigate topics such as the intimacy of fame political celebrity stardom in american quality television sarah jessica parker celebrity reality tv i m a celebrity get me out of here the circulation of the porn star the gallery film david david beckham the concept of cartoon celebrity the simpsons fandom and celebrity k d lang nsync celebrity in the tabloid press celebrity magazines heat celebrity skins the fame of the serial killer and narratives of mental illness in celebrity culture the collection is organized into four themed sections fame now broadly examines the contemporary contours of fame as they course through new media sites such as reality tv and the internet and different social cultural and political spaces fame body attempts to situate the star or celebrity body at the centre of the production circulation and consumption of contemporary fame fame simulation considers the increasingly strained relationship between celebrity and artifice and authenticity fame damage looks at the way the representation of fame is bound up with auto destructive tendencies or dissolution

in 1975 laura mulvey published her seminal essay on the male gaze ushering in a new era in understanding the politics and theory of looking at the female body since then feminist thinking has expanded upon and revised mulvey s theory and much of the western world has seen a resurgence in feminist activism as well as the rise of neoliberalism and shifts in digital culture and self representation for the first time this book addresses what it means to look at the fashioned female body in this radical new landscape in chapters exploring the fashioned body within contexts such as queerness veiling blackness pregnancy fatness and criminality revisiting the gaze addresses intersectional debates in feminism and re evaluates the concept of the gaze in light of recent social and political changes with an interdisciplinary approach bridging fashion and fine art this book opens the door to discussions about the male gaze and the fashioned body

in this study u kalpagam examines the construction of the neoliberal subjectivities of entrepreneur consumer and citizen among women and girls in different contexts of their lives such as employment and livelihood urbanization and migration health and well being consumerism and ageing in india drawing from michel foucault s idea

of neoliberal governmentality it acknowledges that neoliberal articulations are entangled in a host of other factors processes and institutions that being governed by different logics and rationality may act as countervailing forces to it such that the outcomes of governing conduct may differ from what governmentality had as its objective or had expected neoliberal governmentality is also changing the landscapes of women s activism such that women as individual and collective subjects of resistance are being refashioned through modes of activism that reveal new forms and themes within women s movement activism in india today

attitudes to fashion have changed radically in the twenty first century dress is increasingly approached as a means of self expression rather than as a signifier of status or profession and designers are increasingly treated as artists as fashion moves towards art and enters the gallery museum and retail space this book is the first to fully explore the causes and implications of this shift examining the impact of technological innovation globalization and the growth of the internet the end of fashion focuses on the ways in which our understanding of fashion and the fashion system have transformed as mass mediation and digitization continue to broaden the way that contemporary fashion is perceived and consumed exploring everything from the rise of online shopping to the emergence of bloggers as power elites who have revolutionized the terrain of traditional fashion reportage this volume anatomizes a world in which runway shows now compete with live streaming digital fashion films instagram and pinterest bringing together original cutting edge contributions from leading international scholars this book is essential reading for students and scholars of fashion and cultural studies as well as anyone interested in exploring the dramatic shifts that have shaken the fashion world this century and what they might say about larger changes within an increasingly global and digital society

protest and popular culture is at once a historical monograph and a critique of postmodernist approaches to the study of mass media consumerism and popular political movements in it triece compares the self representations of several late nineteenth and twentieth century women s protest movements with representations of women offered by contemporaneous mass media outlets she shows that from the late nineteenth century until the present day u s women s protest movements sought to convince women that they are first and foremost laborer producers while the u s media has just as consistently sought to convince women that they are primarily consumers triece contends that these approaches to portraying women have been and continue to be constructed in opposition to one another the leaders of women s protest movements she argues have long sought to

convince women not to spend time and money on reshaping their selves through consumer purchases but instead to focus attention on empowering themselves politically by asserting control over their own labor power the mass media meanwhile has always treated such movements as potential threats to the financial well being of the consumer sector that is of advertisers and so has consistently trivialized them while seeking simultaneously to convince women that they should devote attention and resources to buying things not to struggling to overcome class and gender discrimination many cultural studies scholars have argued that in recent years rising prosperity has made consumerism into the primary site of both individual expression and resistance to the dominant socio economic order with self definition through personal purchases supplanting the role formerly played by struggle for an end to inequities of all kinds these scholars contend that as such mass media no longer function to naturalize and thus reinforce such inequities and consumerism no longer serves to perpetuate them triece argues that her examples show that this argument is faulty and that scholars should continue to take a traditional materialist view in all studies of mass media consumerism and popular protest

radical feminism today offers a timely and engaging account of exactly what feminism is and what it is not author denise thompson questions much of what has come to be taken for granted as feminism and points to the limitations of implicitly defining feminism in terms of women gender difference or race gender class she challenges some of the most widely accepted ideas about feminism and in doing so opens up a number of hitheto closed debates allowing for the possibility of moving those debates further

style of dress has always been a way for americans to signify their politics but perhaps never so overtly as in the 1960s and 1970s whether participating in presidential campaigns or vietnam protests hair and dress provided a powerful cultural tool for social activists to display their politics to the world and became both the cause and a symbol of the rift in american culture some americans saw stylistic freedom as part of their larger political protests integral to the ideals of self expression sexual freedom and equal rights for women and minorities others saw changes in style as the erosion of tradition and a threat to the established social and gender norms at the heart of family and nation through the lens of fashion and style dressing for the culture wars guides us through the competing political and social movements of the 1960s and 1970s although long hair on men pants and miniskirts on women and other hippie styles of self fashioning could indeed be controversial betty luther hillman illustrates how self presentation influenced the culture and

politics of the era and carried connotations similarly linked to the broader political challenges of the time luther hillman's new line of inquiry demonstrates how fashion was both a reaction to and was influenced by the political climate and its implications for changing norms of gender race and sexuality

this book offers an insightful look at the development of feminist theory through a literary lens stressing the significance of feminism s origins in the european enlightenment it traces the literary careers of feminism s major thinkers in order to elucidate the connection of feminist theoretical production to literary work

equal under the sky is the first historical study of georgia o keeffe s complex involvement with and influence on us feminism from the 1910s to the 1970s utilizing understudied sources such as fan letters archives of women s organizations
