a guide to eighteenth century art offers an introductory overview of the art artists and artistic movements of this exuberant period in european art and the social economic philosophical and political debates that helped shape them covers both artistic developments and critical approaches to the period by leading contemporary scholars uses an innovative framework to emphasize the roles of tradition modernity and hierarchy in the production of artistic works of the period reveals the practical issues connected with the production sale public and private display of art of the period assesses eighteenth century art s contribution to what we now refer to as modernity includes numerous illustrations and is accompanied by online resources examining art produced outside europe and its relationship with the west along with other useful resources

the eighteenth century saw profound changes in the way prostitution was represented in literary

and visual culture this collection of essays focuses on the variety of ways that the sex trade was represented in popular culture of the time across different art forms and highlighting contradictory interpretations

the book describes the innovations that enabled botany in the eighteenth century to emerge as an independent science independent from medicine and herbalism this encompassed the development of a reliable system for plant classification and the invention of a nomenclature that could be universally applied and understood the key that enabled linnaeus to devise his classification system was the discovery of the sexuality of plants the book which is intended for the educated general reader proceeds to illustrate how many aspects of french life were permeated by this revolution in botany between about 1760 to 1815 a botanophilia sometimes inflated into botanomania the reader should emerge with a clearer understanding of what the enlightenment actually was in contrast to some popular second hand ideas today

this anthology gathers 368 poems by 80 british women poets of the long eighteenth century few of these poems have been reprinted since originally published and all are crucial to understanding fully the literary history of women writers paula r backscheider and catherine e ingrassia demonstrate the enormous diversity of poetry produced during this time by organizing the poems in three broad and deliberately overlapping categories by genre establishing that women wrote in all of the forms that men did with equal mastery and creativity by theme offering a revisionary look at the range of topics these writers addressed including war ecology friendship religion and the stages of life and by the poems more specific focus on the women s experiences as writers backscheider and ingrassia have selected poems that represent the best work of skilled poets creating a wonderful mix of canonical and little known pieces they include the complete texts of longer poems that are abridged or omitted in other collections their substantial part introductions textual notes bibliographical information and biographical sketches situate the poets and their writings within the cultural and political milieu in which they appeared to generate further scholarship on this subject this essential anthology puts primary texts in front of students scholars and general readers it fills the persistent need to document women s poetic expression during the long eighteenth century and to rewrite the literary history of the period a history from which women have largely been excluded

although there were no self avowed british atheists before the 1780s authors including jonathan swift alexander pope sarah fielding phebe gibbes and william cowper worried extensively about atheism s dystopian possibilities and routinely represented atheists as being beyond the pale of human sympathy challenging traditional formulations of secularization that equate modernity with unbelief reeves reveals how reactions against atheism rather helped sustain various forms of religious belief throughout the age of enlightenment he demonstrates that hostility to unbelief likewise produced various forms of religious ecumenicalism with authors depicting non christian theists from around britain s emerging empire as sympathetic allies in the fight against irreligion godless fictions in the eighteenth century traces a literary history of atheism in eighteenth century britain for the first time revealing a relationship between atheism and secularization far more fraught than has previously been supposed

this concise companion presents fresh perspectives on eighteenth century literature contributes to current debates in the field on subjects such as the public sphere travel and exploration scientific rhetoric gender and the book trade and historical versus literary perceptions of life on london streets searches out connections between the remarkable number of new genres that appeared in the eighteenth century crosses conventional disciplinary lines demonstrates that philosophy history politics and social theory both influence and are influenced by literature

in recent years there has been a considerable revival of interest in music in eighteenth century britain this interest has now expanded beyond the consideration of composers and their music to include the performing institutions of the period and their relationship to the wider social scene the collection of essays presented here offers a portrayal of concert life in britain that contributes greatly to the wider understanding of social and cultural life in the eighteenth century music was not merely a pastime but was irrevocably linked with its social political and literary contexts the perspectives of performers organisers patrons audiences publishers copyists and consumers are considered here in relation to the concert experience all of the essays taken together construct an understanding of musical communities and the origins of the modern concert system this is achieved by focusing on the development of music societies the promotion of musical events the mobility and advancement of musicians systems of patronage the social status of musicians the repertoire performed and published the role of women pianists and the topography

of concerts in this way the book will not only appeal to music specialists but also to social and cultural historians

no human society has ever been perfect a fact that has led thinkers as far back as plato and st augustine to conceive of utopias both as a fanciful means of escape from an imperfect reality and as a useful tool with which to design improvements upon it the most studied utopias have been proposed by men but during the eighteenth century a group of reform oriented female novelists put forth a series of work that expressed their views of and their reservations about ideal societies in women s utopias of the eighteenth century alessa johns examines the utopian communities envisaged by mary astell sarah fielding mary hamilton sarah scott and other writers from britain and continental europe uncovering the ways in which they resembled and departed from traditional utopias johns demonstrates that while traditional visions tended to look back to absolutist models women s utopias quickly incorporated emerging liberal ideas that allowed far more room for personal initiative and gave agency to groups that were not culturally dominant such as the female writers themselves women s utopias johns argues were reproductive in nature they had the potential to reimagine and perpetuate themselves

the eighteenth century looms large in the scottish imagination it is a century that saw the doubling of the population rapid urbanisation industrial growth the political union of 1707 the jacobite rebellions and the enlightenment events that were intrinsic to the creation of the modern nation and to putting scotland on the international map the impact of the era on modern scotland can be seen in the numerous buildings named after the luminaries of the period adam smith david hume william robertson the endorsement of robert burns as the national poet hero the preservation of the culloden battlefield as a tourist attraction and the physical geographies of its major towns yet while it is a century that remains central to modern constructions of national identity it is a period associated with men until recently the history of women in eighteenth century scotland with perhaps the honourable exception of flora mcdonald remained unwritten over the last decade however research on women and gender in scotland has flourished and we have an increasingly full picture of women s lives at all social levels across the century as a result this is an appropriate moment to reflect on what we know about scottish women during the eighteenth century to ask how their history affects the traditional narratives of the period

and to reflect on the implications for a national history of scotland and scottish identity divided into three sections covering women s intimate intellectual and public lives this interdisciplinary volume offers articles on women s work criminal activity clothing family education writing travel and more applying tools from history art anthropology cultural studies and english literature it draws on a wide range of sources from the written to the visual to highlight the diversity of women s experiences and to challenge current male centric historiographies

eighteenth century britain thought of itself as a polite sentimental enlightened place but often its literature belied this self image this was an age of satire and the century s novels poems plays and prints resound with mockery and laughter with cruelty and wit the street level invective of grub street pamphleteers is full of satire and the same accents of raillery echo through the high scepticism of the period s philosophers and poets many of whom were part time pamphleteers themselves the novel a genre that emerged during the eighteenth century was from the beginning shot through with satirical colours borrowed from popular romances and scandal sheets this handbook is a guide to the different kinds of satire written in english during the long eighteenth century it focuses on texts that appeared between the restoration of the stuart monarchy in 1660 and the outbreak of the french revolution in 1789 outlier chapters extend the story back to first decade of the seventeenth century and forward to the second decade of the nineteenth the scope of the volume is not confined by genre however so prevalent was the satirical mode in writing of the age that this book serves as a broad and characteristic survey of its literature the oxford handbook of eighteenth century satire reflects developments in historical criticism of eighteenth century writing over the last two decades and provides a forum in which the widening diversity of literary intellectual and socio historical approaches to the period s texts can come together

this volume re examines traditional interpretations of the rise of modern aesthetics in eighteenth century britain and germany it provides a new account that connects aesthetic experience with morality science and political society in doing so it challenges long standing teleological narratives that emphasize disinterestedness and the separation of aesthetics from moral cognitive and political interests the chapters are divided into three thematic parts the

chapters in part i demonstrate the heteronomy of eighteenth century british aesthetics they chart the evolution of aesthetic concepts and discuss the ethical and political significance of the aesthetic theories of several key figures namely the third earl of shaftesbury david hume and adam smith part ii explores the ways in which eighteenth century german and german oriented thinkers examine aesthetic experience and moral concerns and relate to the work of their british counterparts the chapters here cover the work of kant moses mendelssohn alexander gottlieb baumgarten and madame de staël finally part iii explores the interrelation of science aesthetics and a new model of society in the work of goethe johann wilhelm ritter friedrich hölderlin and william hazlitt among others this volume develops unique discussions of the rise of aesthetic autonomy in the eighteenth century in bringing together well known scholars working on british and german eighteenth century aesthetics philosophy and literature it will appeal to scholars and advanced students in a range of disciplines who are interested in this topic the introduction and chapters 2 10 and 12 of this book are freely available as downloadable open access pdfs at taylorfrancis.com under a creative commons attribution non commercial no derivatives cc by nc nd 4.0 license

this work offers firstly a fresh historical philosophical and cultural interpretation of the relation between the eighteenth century discourse of sensibility the sublime and the theory and practice of eighteenth century law secondly the work exposes and explores the influence of this combination of discourses upon the formation of gender identities in this period the author argues that it is only through a study of the convergence of these key eighteenth century discourses that changing conceptualisations of femininity can fully be understood thirdly it examines the presence within eighteenth century fiction by women of a new female subject novels by women in this period chaplin posits begin to reveal that the female subject position constructed through the discourses of law sensibility and the sublime gives rise for women to a feminine ontological crisis that may be seen to anticipate by two hundred years the trauma of the post modern male subject unable to present a unified subjectivity to himself or to the world this feminine crisis finds expression within a range of female fiction of the mid to late eighteenth century in charlotte lennox's anti romance satire frances sheridan's conduct book novels the gothic romances of radcliffe and eliza fenwick and the sensationalistic horror fiction of charlotte dacre concentrating upon these writers chaplin argues that their works speak of dread

on behalf of women in this period and to varying degrees challenge discourses that construct femininity as a highly unstable barely tenable subject position combining the works of lyotard and irigaray to formulate a new feminist reading of the eighteenth century discourse of the sublime this study offers fresh insights into the culture and politics of the eighteenth century it presents highly original readings of well known and lesser known literary texts that interrogate from fresh perspectives the complex theoretical issues pertaining to

pithy and wide ranging this study provides a fresh new lens through which to reinvestigate the whole of early modern english literature library journal in this striking social history barbara m benedict draws on the texts of the early modern period to discover the era s attitudes toward curiosity a trait we learn was often depicted as an unsavory form of transgression or cultural ambition

we know more about men who sought and had sex with men in eighteenth century paris than in any other city at the time police records provide information about thousands of sodomites who were arrested and thousands more who were not michel rey explored the sodomitical culture of the capital in five articles based on one set of sources published from 1982 to 1994 no one has completed his pioneering work in the archives and challenged his anachronistic conclusions about identity community and effeminacy this book the first on the subject based on extensive research in all of the relevant series of police records explores patterns and changes in the lives of men who desired men and in the surveillance and punishment of same sex relations across the century chapters 1 and 2 offer a more systematic skeptical and subtle analysis of complex questions about mentalities than rey did chapters 3 and 4 discuss the ways in which sodomites made connections through solicitation in public spaces and networking in private places and the ways in which the police tracked them chapters 5 and 6 analyze the operations of agents who entrapped sodomites and the procedures of magistrates who judged them the book examines what the extant sources do and do not tell us about the heads hearts and hands of men detained or mentioned by the police to that end it includes a generous selection of documents that allow us to hear voices from the archives including many that require us to rethink what we thought we knew about the subculture

focusing on several distinct genres of eighteenth century irish song henigan demonstrates in each case that the interaction between the elite and vernacular the written and oral is pervasive and characteristic of the irish song tradition to the present day

consumers in eighteenth century england were firmly embedded in an expanding world of goods one that incorporated a range of novel foods tobacco chocolate coffee and tea and new supplies of more established commodities including sugar spices and dried fruits much has been written about the attraction of these goods which went from being novelties or expensive luxuries in the mid seventeenth century to central elements of the british diet a century or so later they have been linked to the rise of britain as a commercial and imperial power whilst their consumption is seen as transforming many aspects of british society and culture from mealtimes to gender identity despite this huge significance to ideas of consumer change we know remarkably little about the everyday processes through which groceries were sold bought and consumed in tracing the lines of supply that carried groceries from merchants to consumers sugar and spice reveals how changes in retailing and shopping were central to the broader transformation of consumption and consumer

practices but also questions established ideas about the motivations underpinning consumer choices it demonstrates the dynamic nature of eighteenth century retailing the importance of advertisements in promoting sales and shaping consumer perceptions and the role of groceries in making shopping an everyday activity at the same time it shows how both retailers and their customers were influenced by the practicalities and pleasures of consumption they were active agents in consumer change shaping their own practices rather than caught up in a single socially inclusive cultural project such as politeness or respectability

this volume charts the rise of consumer culture in europe during the 17th and 18th centuries essays are included on france and holland but the focus is primarily on britain themes discussed include art markets collecting and display and are set alongside those of value and luxury

objects of liberty explores the prevalence of souvenirs in british women s writing during the french revolution and napoleonic era it argues that women writers employed the material and memorial object of the souvenir to circulate revolutionary ideas and engage in the masculine

realm of political debate while souvenir collecting was a standard practice of privileged men on the eighteenth century grand tour women began to partake in this endeavor as political events in france heightened interest in travel to the continent looking at travel accounts by helen maria williams mary wollstonecraft catherine and martha wilmot charlotte eaton and mary shelley this study reveals how they used souvenirs to affect political thought in britain and contribute to conversations about individual and national identity at a time when gendered beliefs precluded women from full citizenship they used souvenirs to redefine themselves as legitimate political actors objects of liberty is a story about the ways that women established political power and agency through material culture

david hayton examines the political culture of the anglo irish ruling class which had settled in ireland in different ways over a long period and had differing degrees of attachment to england and shows how its multi faceted identity evolved

following the appointment of its first aristocratic grand masters in the 1720s and in the wake of its connections to the scientific enlightenment free and accepted masonry became part of britain s national profile and the largest and most influential of britain s extensive clubs and societies the organisation did not evolve naturally from the mediaeval guilds and religious orders that pre dated it but was reconfigured radically by a largely self appointed inner core at london s most influential lodge the horn tavern freemasonry became a vehicle for the expression of their philosophical and political views and the craft attracted an aspirational membership across the upper middling and gentry through an examination of previously unexplored primary documentation foundations contributes to an understanding of contemporary english political and social culture and explores how freemasonry became a mechanism that promoted the interests of the hanoverian establishment and connected the metropolitan and provincial elites the book explores social networks centred on the aristocracy parliament the learned and professional societies and the magistracy and provides pen portraits of the key individuals who spread the masonic message foundations and schism sussex academic 2013 have been described as the most important books on english freemasonry published in recent times providing a precise social context for the invention of english freemasonry berman s analysis throws a new and original light on the formation and development of what rapidly became a national and international phenomenon
