this volume forms a part of the critical discourses in south asia series which deals with schools movements and discursive practices in major south asian languages it offers crucial insights into the making of the punjabi language and literature and its critical tradition across a century the book brings together english translation of major writings of influential figures dealing with literary criticism and theory aesthetic and performative traditions and re interpretations of primary concepts and categories in punjabi it presents 30 key texts in literary and cultural studies from punjab from the beginning of development of punjabi language to its present form with most of them translated for the first time into english these seminal essays cover interconnections with socio historical events in the medieval colonial and post independence period in punjab they discuss themes such as spiritual and aesthetic visions poetic and literary forms modernism progressivism feminism dalit literature power structures and social struggles ideological values cultural renovations and humanism comprehensive and authoritative this volume offers an overview of the history of critical thought in punjabi literature in south asia it will be essential for scholars and researchers of punjabi language and literature literary criticism literary theory comparative literature indian literature cultural studies art and aesthetics performance studies history sociology regional studies and south asian studies it will also interest the punjabi speaking diaspora and those working on the intellectual history of punjab and conservation of languages and culture

bhagat singh spent the last two years of his life in jail awaiting execution during this time he and his comrades fought one of the most celebrated court battles in the annals of national liberation struggles and used the court as a vehicle for the propagation of their revolutionary message they also struggled against the inhuman conditions in the colonial jail and faced torture and pain their heroism made them icons and figures of inspiration for generations to come all this is well known what is not so well known is that bhagat singh wrote four books in jail although they were smuggled out they were destroyed and are lost forever what survived was a notebook that the young martyr kept in jail full of notes and jottings from what he was reading in the year of his birth centenary leftword is proud to present his notebook in an elegant edition this edition has been checked against the copy preserved in the national archives of india the notebook is richly annotated by bhupender hooja and the annotations have been revised and updated for this edition also included are the most important texts that bhagat singh wrote in jail chaman lal s lucid introduction the new york daily worker s reports and periyar s editorial

this book moves away from originary myths of region and identity that have dominated academic and mediatized representations of punjab a land locked region divided between india and pakistan after the partition of 1947 and instead focuses on the role of the imagination in producing punjab it deconstructs punjab as an ethno spatial ethno linguistic and ethno cultural construct produced by the communities who dwell there those who have left it and those formed by new narratives of the region by isolating imaginings of punjab that are not centred on exclusivist regional linguistic sectarian or caste perspectives contributions to this book propose the concept of free flowing cartographies in relation to punjab which facilitate its imaginings as a geographical region a social construct and a state of consciousness the region is simultaneously imagined as a small place a neighbourhood a city and a village but also as a performative practice and a certain ways of doing things through focusing on a number of punjabi spaces and communities and engaging with punjab as a geographical region social construct and state of consciousness the papers in the book hope to contribute to broader debates on transnationalism postnationalism micronationalism and new identity narratives emerging in the twenty first century this book was originally published as a special issue of south asian diaspora

what is punjabiyat what are the different notions of punjab this volume analyses these ideas and explores the different aspects that constitute punjab as a region conceptually in history culture and practice each essay examines a different punjabi culture language based and literary religious and those that define a community rural urban and middle class and historical contemporary and cosmopolitan together these essays unravel the complex foundations of punjabiyat the volume also shows how the recent history of punjab partition aspirations of statehood and a large and assertive diaspora has had a discernible impact on the region s scholarship departing from conventional studies on punjab this book presents fresh perspectives and new insights into its regional culture

7500 entries on various topics literary trends and movements eminent authors and significant works the first three volume were edited by prof amaresh datta fourth and fifth volume by mohan lal and sixth volume by shrik c dutt

during the twentieth century at the height of the independence movement and after indian literary writing in english was entrusted with the task of consolidating the image of a unified seemingly caste free modernising india for consumption both at home and abroad this led to a critical insistence on the proximity of the national and the literary which in turn led to the canonisation of certain writers and themes and the dismissal of others examining english anthologies of indian literature as well as the establishment of the sahitya akademi the national academy of letters and the work of r k narayan and mulk raj anand among others rosemary marangoly george exposes the painstaking efforts that went into the elaboration of a national literature in english for independent india even while deliberating the fundamental limitations of using a nation centric critical framework for reading literary works

this book brings together new approaches to the study of sikh religion culture and ethnicity being pursued in the diaspora by sikh academics in western universities in britain and north america an important aspect of the volume is the diversity of topics that are engaged including film and gender theory theology hermeneutics deconstruction semiotics and race theory and brought to bear on the individual contributors specialism within sikh studies thereby helping to explode previously static dichotomies such as insider vs outsider or history vs tradition the volume should have strong appeal both to an academic market including students of politics religious studies and south asian studies and to a more general english speaking sikh readership

between love and freedom interprets the figure of the revolutionary in the hindi novel by establishing its lineage in representative bengali novels as well as in the contending moralities of mahatma gandhi and bhagat singh on the idea of violence it reveals how conventional social realism and emergent modernist modes were brought together in the novelistic tradition by extending the political ideal of anti colonial revolution into domains of sexual desire and subjective expression especially in the works of agyeya jainendra and yashpal this work will deeply interest scholars and students of literature modern indian history hindi and political science

modern sikh studies in punjab history and historiography had its roots in the british political and diplomatic interest about the sikh military and social rise in north india by the close of the eighteenth century john malcolm and charles t metcalfe dealt with the sikh misaldars between 1803 and 1804 a d like murray h t prinsep wade under william bentinck 1828 1835 took interest in sikh political formations and the khalsa traditions j d cunningham wrote his book entitled history of the sikh in 1849 after this the asiatic society of bengal took some interest in sikh literature by 1851 but it was confined only to the writings of guru gobind singh or the folklore in the region hope this book shall meet this difficulty of ignorance

this book is about the presence of the absent the tribes of punjab india many of them still nomadic constituting the poorest of the poor in the state drawing on exhaustive fieldwork and ethnographic accounts of more than 750 respondents it explores the occupational change across generations to prove their presence in the state before the criminal tribes act was implemented in 1871 the archival reports reveal the atrocities unleashed by the colonial government on these people the volume shows how the post colonial government too has proved no different it has done little to bring them into the mainstream society by not exploiting their traditional expertise or equipping them with modern skills this book will be of great interest to scholars of sociology social anthropology social history public policy development studies tribal communities and south asian studies

this book maps the journey of the indian poetic imagination in hindi panjabi and indian english from its original quasi spiritual longings to its activist interventions in the public domain as indian poetry of the post 1990s gravitates towards a non orientalised postcolonial nationalism it seeks to rewrite and disseminate the shifting coordinates of nationalist imagination in terms of the dissent of the subaltern discontents of the nation the book is interdisciplinary it studies indian poetry from the new emerging imperatives

the idea of an eternal india based on stable and unchanging villages has been in disarray for at least two decades however having demolished this myth historians have been rather less able to construct an alternative vision this volume sets out to do just that using the idea of circulation in relation to south asia in the colonial period it comprises a set of complementary essays which deal with merchant circulation pilgrimages cartography policing labor mobility and the movement of itinerant groups from colonial administrators to wandering bards demonstrating that the south asia of this period was made and remade by changing patterns and the logic of circulation once this perspective is integrated into the analysis of society new and disturbing questions emerge on issues such as culture identity and ethnogenesis which are normally treated in the context of fixed and stable societies the essays in this volume written by some of the leading authorities in south asian history break new ground in suggesting the outlines of a different framework for historical analysis this volume will interest not only south asianists but also those interested in historical method as well as wider comparative perspectives on early modern and contemporary history

in this book the author critically interrogates the construction of gender community and nation in the work of progressive women poets the book combines the study of nation and community through a close engagement with urdu literary culture in the twentieth century and particularly the work of pioneering literary women it argues that gender and sexuality become fixed signifiers in the trauma of partition and the formation of the post

partition islamic nation the story of literary women in pakistan taking up the mantle of public poets thus has to be understood in relation to the history of reform anti colonial resistance and a transnational islamicate culture the book examines the presence of feminist thought in the work of progressive women poets charting their interrogation of the clash between secular and sacred values and the increasing split between liberal and islamic nationalism the book suggests that through their writing and experiences women have negotiated sacred and secular spaces to move beyond a community that is subservient to nationalist ideology

in a revised edition of his original book j s grewal brings the history of the sikhs from its beginnings in the time of guru nanak the founder of sikhism right up to the present day against the background of the history of the punjab the volume surveys the changing pattern of human settlements in the region until the fifteenth century and the emergence of the punjabi language as the basis of regional articulation subsequent chapters explore the life and beliefs of guru nanak the development of his ideas by his successors and the growth of his following the book offers a comprehensive statement on one of the largest and most important communities in india today

this volume gathers scholars who focus on gender through a variety of disciplines and approaches to sikh studies the intersections of religion and gender are here explored based on an understanding that both are socially constructed far from being static as so often presented in world religions textbooks religious traditions are constantly in flux responding to historical cultural and social contexts so too is the sikh tradition in terms of practices ideologies rituals and notions of identity we here conclude that a sikh tradition does not exist instead there are numerous forms thereof in this volume sikhism is presented as a collection of sikh traditions gender studies in line with women s liberation masculine and feminist studies have long examined and have long deconstructed the patriarchy but also move to identify other subordinate dominant relations between individuals indeed there are numerous forms of discrimination and power structures that simultaneously create a multiplicity of oppression intersectionality has become the basis of an increasingly systematized production of contemporary discourses on feminism and gender analysis as is evidenced by the varied contributions in this volume

how does a writer discuss her creative process and her views on a writer s role in society how do her comments on writing relate to her works the hindi writer krishna sobti 1925 2019 is known primarily as a novelist however she also extensively wrote about her views on the creative process the figure of the writer historical writing and the position of writers within the public sphere this study is the first to examine in detail the relationship between sobti s views on poetics as exposed in her non fictional texts and her own literary practice the writer s self representation is analysed through her use of metaphors to explain her creative process sobti s construction of the figure of the writer is then put in parallel with her idiosyncratic use of language as a representation of the

heterogeneous voices of her characters and with her conception of literature as a space where time and memory can be held at the same time by delving into sobti s position in the debate around women s writing especially through the creation of a male double the failed writer hashmat and into her views on literature and politics this book also reflects on the literary debates of the post independence hindi literary sphere

a nuanced notion of the internal diaspora to look at the complex relationships between home host and community as an important addition to the study of sikhism this book fills a significant gap and widens the frontiers of sikh studies it will be indispensable for students and researchers of sociology and social anthropology history migration and diaspora studies religion especially sikh studies cultural studies as well as the sikh diaspora worldwide

in attempting to carve out a place for themselves in local and global contexts young sikhs mobilize efforts to construct choose and emphasize different aspects of religious and cultural identification depending on their social setting and context young sikhs in a global world presents current research on young sikhs with multicultural and transnational life styles and considers how they interpret shape and negotiate religious identities traditions and authority on an individual and collective level with a particular focus on the experiences of second generation sikhs as they interact with various people in different social fields and cultural contexts the book is constructed around three parts family and home public display and gender and reflexivity and translations new scholarly voices and established academics present qualitative research and ethnographic fieldwork and analyse how young sikhs try to solve social intellectual and psychological tensions between the family and the expectations of the majority society between punjabi culture and religious values

ruskin bond is known internationally as one of india s most prolific writers in english for children young adults and adults this literary biography analyzes the impact of personal social geographical political and literary influences on bond s worldview aesthetic principles and writings connecting the development of bond s writing career over the past 50 years to the evolution of the publishing industry in india khorana details the author's pioneering work in the field of children's and young adult literature and his contribution to diasporic and postcolonial post independence literatures she concludes that it is bond s versatile original and elegant writing in a variety of genres that continue to endear him to readers around the world according to the author despite bond s british background he does not write about india from a eurocentric perspective having lived the majority of his life in india he knows the country as an insider writing with an authenticity and emotional engagement about the land and the people of the himalayas and small town india khorana analyzes his novels and short stores and highlights his juxtaposition of his protagonists individual dramas against larger social moral and metaphysical issues in addition she reveals how the autobiographical and regional elements in bond s work provide insight into universal themes such as the tension between past and present city life versus rural values the dignity of ordinary folk preservation of the environment and living in harmony with nature
