active in the uk survivor movement

look back in anger is one of the few works of drama that are indisputably central to british culture in
general and its name is one of the most well known in postwar cultural history its premiere in 1956
sparked off the first new wave of kitchen sink drama and the cultural phenomenon of the angry young man
the play's anti hero jimmy porter became the spokesman of a generation osborne's play is a key
milestone in new writing for british theatre and the royal court which produced the play has since
become one of the most important new writing theatres in the uk

anyone who's never watched someone die is suffering from a pretty bad case of virginity look back in
anger premiered at the royal court theatre london in 1956 john osborne didn't contribute to british
theatre he set off a landmine called look back in anger and blew most of it up alan sillitoe a story of
youthful insecurity inflamed by lack of opportunity and the terrifying destabilizing force of love
jimmy porter could fill an opera house with his bellowing hunger for a bigger better life and a loyal
love to share it with new york times look back in anger presents post war youth as it really is to have
done this at all would be a signal achievement to have done it in a first play is a minor miracle all

the qualities are there qualities one had despaired of ever seeing on the stage the drift towards anarchy the instinctive leftishness the automatic rejection of official attitudes the surrealist sense of humour the casual promiscuity the sense of lacking a crusade worth fighting for and underlying all these the determination that no one who dies shall go unmourned i doubt if i could love anyone who did not wish to see look back in anger it is the best young play of its decade kenneth tynan observer how bracing and yes even shocking its white hot fury remains the times this edition includes an introduction by michael billington and an afterword by david hare

peter buse illuminates the relationship between modern british drama and contemporary critical and cultural theory he demonstrates how theory allows fresh insights into familiar drama pairing well known plays with classic theory texts the theoretical text is more than applied to the dramatic text instead buse shows how they reflect on each other drama theory provides not only provides new interpretations of popular plays but of the theoretical texts as well

for british playwright john osborne there are no brave causes only people who muddle through life who hurt and are often hurt in return this study deals with osborne s complete oeuvre and critically examines its form and technique the function of the gaze its construction of gender and the relationship between osborne s life and work gilleman has also traced the evolution of osborne s reception by turning to critical reviews at the beginning of each chapter

this book first published in 1981 sets out the critical reaction to some fifty key post war productions of the british theatre as gauged primarily through the contemporary reviews of theatre critics the plays chosen are each in their different ways important in their contribution to the development of the british theatre covering the period from immediately after the second world war when british theatre fell into decline through the revival of the late 1950s to the time in which this book was first published in which british theatre enjoyed a high international reputation for its diversity and quality this book is ideal for theatre studies students as well as for the general theatre goer

the essays collected in posting the male examine representations of masculinity in post war and contemporary british literature focussing on the works of writers as diverse as john osborne joe orton james kelman ian rankin carol ann duffy alan hollinghurst ian mcewan graham swift and jackie kay the collection seeks to capture the current historical moment of crisis at which masculinity loses its universal transparency and becomes visible as a performative gender construct rather than denoting just one fixed polarised point on a hierarchised axis of strictly segregated gender binaries masculinity is revealed to oscillate within a virtually limitless spectrum of gender identities characterised not by purity and self containment but by difference and alterity as the contributors demonstrate rather than a gender in crisis millennial manhood is a gender in transition patriarchal strategies of man making are gradually being replaced by less exclusionary patterns of self identification inspired by feminism men have begun to recognise themselves as gendered beings and as a result masculinity has been set in motion

children born and raised on the religious fringe are a distinctive yet largely unstudied social phenomenon they are irreversibly shaped by the experience having been thrust into radical religious cultures that often believe children to be endowed with heightened spiritual capabilities the religious group is all encompassing it accounts for their family their school social networks and everything that prepares them for their adult life using research gathered from over fifty in depth interviews amanda van eck duymaer van twist explores the lives of individuals born into new religious groups some of whom have stayed in these groups and some of whom have left the groups she considers include the brudershof scientology the family international the unification church and the international society for krishna consciousness the book draws on the author s visits to these groups their schools and homes and support websites maintained by those who left the religious groups that raised them it also details her experiences at conferences held by ngos concerned with the welfare of children in cults the arrival of a second generation of participants in new religious movements raises new concerns and legal issues

whether they stay or leave children raised on the religious fringe experience a unique form of segregation in adulthood perfect children examines the ways these movements adapt to a second generation how children are socialized what happens to these children as they mature and how their childhoods have affected them amanda van eck duymaer van twist is the deputy director of inform a non profit information center specializing in minority religious movements spiritualities and fringe political movements based at the london school of economics and political science in london as part of her work she has encountered and researched a range of topics and issues dealing with minority and or new religions

now in paperback the hugely acclaimed authorised biography of britain s most popular playwright alan ayckbourn is britain s most popular playwright and its most private he has won numerous awards for his plays and has worked with some of theatre s most celebrated names yet he spends most of his time away from the limelight in a yorkshire seaside town not writing at all but running a small repertory theatre this is a portrait of a man who from relatively speaking in 1965 to his double play house and garden at the national theatre in 2000 has chronicled human behaviour our aspirations and insecurities while shaping the theatrical experience of millions mr allen s book makes me want to start reading the entire ayckbourn canon over again splendid stuff hugh leonard sunday independent paul allen has come up with a wise well informed book that not only persuades us of ayckbourn s genius but also helps to explain this complex driven man michael billington country life lucid meticulously researched this impressively detailed account benefits from paul allen s rich inside knowledge of theatre terry eagleton times literary supplement thorough and enjoyable christopher hirst independent

in this expanded second edition of her book ajda bastan explores the various forms of violence depicted

in british theatre during the latter half of the twentieth century she offers a comprehensive analysis that presents the complex interplay between theatre society and the multifaceted nature of violence in the dramatic arts the book includes commentary on physical emotional sexual economic and self directed violence examining these themes in nine plays by eight prominent british playwrights the plays covered in chronological order are look back in anger the birthday party entertaining mr sloane saved vinegar tom plenty blasted shopping and fucking and cleansed

kenneth tynan 1927 1980 lived one of the most intriguing theatre lives of the twentieth century a brilliant writer critic and agent provocateur he made friends or enemies of nearly every major actor playwright impresario and movie mogul of the 1950s 60s and 70s working on each side of the atlantic during various periods in his career tynan wrote for the evening standard the observer and the new yorker was lured by laurence olivier in the early 1960s to become dramaturg of britain s newly formed national theatre and spent his final years in los angeles this biography offers the first complete appraisal of tynan s powerful contribution to post war british theatre set against the context of the fifties sixties and seventies of his own turbulent life shellard proves beneath the celebrity myths to uncover tynan the private man and theatre genius he draws on tynan s own extensive personal papers and diaries taped interviews with theatre professionals who knew him and fascinating letters to such correspondents as tennessee williams marlene dietrich george devine peter brook alec guinness and terence rattigan shellard highlights tynan s early writings when the brilliant young critic came to national prominence and discusses how tynan gained a left wing readership took his place at the vanguard of the new realist movement and helped to establish subsidized theatre he shows how through indefatigable battles against theatre censorship and railings against the myopia of a politically and culturally insular britain tynan helped create some of the most controversial theatrical events of the 1960s and 70s including oh calcutta exploring the public and private sides of tynan shellard reveals an outspoken explicit and sometimes savage critic who ranks among the most influential theatre figures of the twentieth century

further family sorrow soon to follow with the deaths of both corin and lynn redgrave the story of this amazing family is explosive throughout from the tangled private life of tony richardson natasha s father who directed major films such as look back in anger to vanessa and corin s complicated involvement with the workers revolutionary party to the emergence of a fourth generation of fine actors with natasha and joely there is truly never a dull moment but plenty of scandal melodrama tragedy and intrigue in the story of this remarkable dynasty whose contribution to british drama and film has been immense

resemblance and reality in greek thought follows the construction of reality from homer into the hellenistic era and beyond not only in didactic poetry or philosophical works but in practically all genres from the time of homer onwards greek literature has shown an awareness of the relationship between verbal art and the social historical or cultural reality that produces it an awareness that this relationship is an approximate one at best and a distorting one at worst this central theme of resemblance and its relationship to reality draws together essays on a range of greek authors and shows how they are unified or allied in posing similar questions to classical literature
