this book develops a naturalistic aesthetic theory that accounts for aesthetic phenomena in mathematics in the same terms as it accounts for more traditional aesthetic phenomena building upon a view advanced by james mcallister the assertion is that beauty in science does not confine itself to anecdotes or personal idiosyncrasies but rather that it had played a role in shaping the development of science mathematicians often evaluate certain pieces of mathematics using words like beautiful elegant or even ugly such evaluations are prevalent however rigorous investigation of them of mathematical beauty is much less common the volume integrates the basic elements of aesthetics as it has been developed over the last 200 years with recent findings in neuropsychology as well as a good knowledge of mathematics the volume begins with a discussion of the reasons to interpret mathematical beauty in a literal or non literal fashion which also serves to survey historical and contemporary approaches to mathematical beauty the author concludes that literal approaches are much more coherent and fruitful however much is yet to be done in this respect two chapters are devoted to the revision and improvement of mcallister s theory of the role of beauty in science these antecedents are used as a foundation to formulate a naturalistic aesthetic theory the central idea of the theory is that aesthetic phenomena should be seen as constituting a complex dynamical system which the author calls the aesthetic as process theory the theory comprises explications of three central topics aesthetic experience in mathematics aesthetic value and aesthetic judgment the theory is applied in the final part of the volume and is used to account for the three most salient and often used aesthetic terms often used in mathematics beautiful elegant and ugly this application of the theory serves to illustrate the theory in action but also to further discuss and develop some details and to showcase the theory s explanatory capabilities

the richness of art is manifested in contrast contrast with other works of art other features of human experience other times and places and other forms of judgment and understanding the possibilities of contrast are inexhaustible every being shares this inexhaustibility of openness to novel possibilities although inexhaustibility is most fully realized in art the general theory of art and aesthetic value developed in this book is based on the notions of inexhaustibility and contrast and has important forebears in kant coleridge and whitehead the theory allows art to be located relative to other spheres of judgment science action and

philosophy the theory allows a new perspective on interpretation and criticism ross presents and defines a new synthetic form of understanding works of art that offers an alternative to the skepticism that haunts so many theories of interpretation

no values figure as pervasively and intimately in our lives as beauty and other aesthetic values they animate the arts as well as design fashion food and entertainment they orient us upon the natural world and we even find them in the deepest insights of science and mathematics for centuries however philosophers and other thinkers have identified beauty with what brings pleasure concerned that aesthetic hedonism has led us to question beauty s significance dominic mciver lopes offers an entirely new theory of beauty in this volume beauty engages us in action in concert with others in the context of social networks lopes s network theory explains the social dimension of aesthetic agency the tie between beauty and pleasure the importance of disagreement in matters of taste and the reality of aesthetic values as denizens of the natural world the two closing chapters shed light on why aesthetic engagement is so important to quality of life and why it deserves and gets lavish public support being for beauty offers a fresh contribution to aesthetics but also to thinking about metanormativity the metaphysics of value and virtue theory

the main purpose of this book is to explicate the problematic relationship between the heterogeneity of what is experienced as beautiful and the homogeneity of the conceptualization of that experience or attempt at such a conceptualization in the era of modern philosophy while the heterogeneity of what is experienced as beautiful was permitted and indeed celebrated in the dominant ancient conception for example in the symposium and phaedrus of plato the need for homogenization in the later appropriation of plato and in the enlightenment period relegated the beautiful to the privileged domain of artworks in her analysis agnes heller provides a unique and significant emphasis on the original life content of the experience of the beautiful which becomes lost in the modern system of the arts this book details the history of the concept of the beautiful starting with what agnes heller distinguishes between the warm metaphysics of beauty and the cold one inspired by plato s janus faced relationship to beauty and ending with a fragmented yet hopeful vision propagated by friedrich nietzsche walter benjamin and theodor w adorno among others in between these two historical parentheses the metaphysical plato on one hand and the post metaphysical nietzsche benjamin and adorno on the other hand lay a plenitude of figures and intellectual developments all of which contributed to the demise of the concept of the beautiful in the western metaphysical tradition the most important of

these figures and developments are examined in this book

explaining why he embraced the theory of relativity the nobel prize winning theoretical physicist p a m dirac stated it is the essential beauty of the theory which i feel is the real reason for believing in it how reasonable and rational can science be when its practitioners speak of revolutions in their thinking and extol certain theories for their beauty james w mcallister addresses this question with the first systematic study of the aesthetic evaluations that scientists pass on their theories using a wealth of other examples mcallister explains how scientists aesthetic preferences are influenced by the empirical track record of theories describes the origin and development of aesthetic styles of theorizing and reconsiders whether simplicity is an empirical or an aesthetic virtue of theories mcallister then advances an innovative model of scientific revolutions in opposition to that of thomas s kuhn three detailed studies demonstrate the interconnection of empirical performance beauty and revolution one examines the impact of new construction materials on the history of architecture another reexamines the transition from the ptolemaic system to kepler s theory in planetary astronomy and the third documents the rise of relativity and quantum theory in the twentieth century
