why would an honest self respecting practitioner of energy healing call herself a superquack do i really consider myself a quack well no however there are quite a number of people who consider the work of energy healing to be quackery and at one time i was one of them after years of extensive study and success in my practice i have changed my mind while i do take my work seriously i don't take myself seriously on that score i am willing to use humor to get my point across this book is the story of my journey from a cold skeptic to a curious explorer to a believer with such passion that i have made energy healing my life's work the accounts range from my introduction to energy work and my personal experiences beyond the physical senses to sharing information from sessions with clients using energy in the body and in the mind in order to relieve distress welcome to my world

metromarxism discusses marxism's relationship with the city from the 1850s to the present by way of biographical chapters on figures from the marxist tradition including marx walter benjamin guy debord and david harvey each chapter combines interesting biographical anecdotes with an accessible analysis of each individual's contribution to an always transforming marxist theory of the city he suggests that the interplay between the city as center of economic and social life and its potential for progressive change generated a major corpus of work that work has been key in advancing progressive political and social transformations

literature and materialisms sheds light on the current new wave of materialisms and assesses the impact on literary theory and criticism it maps the similarities and differences between speculative realism object oriented philosophy and vitalism a genealogy of materialisms vitalisms empiricisms and realist approaches from heraclitus to badiou including lucretius spinoza marx althusser barad spivak deleuze bennett harman and other contemporary thinkers puts these new trends into

perspective this book investigates the relations between literature from marquis de sade to objectivist poetry and materialism and analyses the material aspects of literature its structure and texture its commodification and its capacity to resist market imperatives it explores how literary style might be understood as a mediation between the immaterial and the concrete features of a text this volume provides students and academics with an accessible overview of the study of literature and materialism

a contemporary follow up to the groundbreaking power of maps this book takes a fresh look at what maps do whose interests they serve and how they can be used in surprising creative and radical ways denis wood describes how cartography facilitated the rise of the modern state and how maps continue to embody and project the interests of their creators he demystifies the hidden assumptions of map making and explores the promises and limitations of diverse counter mapping practices today thought provoking illustrations include u s geological survey maps electoral and transportation maps and numerous examples of critical cartography participatory gis and map art the book will be important reading for geographers and others interested in maps and their political uses it will also serve as a supplemental text in advanced undergraduate and graduate level courses such as cartography gis geographic thought and history of geography

in this fascinating book donna stonecipher doubles down on the development of prose poetry and the city tactically her sweeping complex yet meticulous essay engages baudelaire s sudden or is it sudden incursion from the constraints of verse into the roominess of prose paragraphs of place while linking civic horizontality and corporate verticality tracking possibilities in using everything from architecture to landscape to cookbooks fl neur like her essay exuberantly and expertly gathers together rhizomatic threads of thinkers and poets of the last two centuries reads like a song norma cole this fascinating exploration of the prose poem begins with a question that most other studies have overlooked or taken for granted what if anything do cities and prose poetry have to do with each other donna stonecipher s touchstone for this question is charles baudelaire s prose poems in le spleen de paris but her excavation of the relationship between the built environment of prose poem and city moves backwards to ancient greece and forwards to the new sentence as stonecipher unpacks the dialogic space of the prose poem her essay moves vertically and horizontally providing histories of the skyscraper and the aesthetics and ethics of vertical ascension and much else as she moves nimbly through large swaths of intellectual architectural urban and aesthetic history stonecipher engages debates central to poetics and to modernity itself taking seriously the challenge of considering how aesthetic forms register respond to and transform their built social and historical environments an indispensable and enlightening guide that is also a pleasure to read susan rosenbaum

studies of compact cities have evolved along with the rising awareness of climate change and sustainable development relevant debates however reveal that the prevailing definitions and practices of compact cities are tied primarily to traditional western urban forms this book reinterprets compact city and develops a ground breaking discourse of vertical urbanism a concept that has never been critically articulated it emphasizes vertical urbanism as a dynamic design strategy instead of a static form distinguishing it from the stereotyped concept of vertical city or towers in the park dominant in china and elsewhere and suggests its adaptability to different geographic and cultural contexts using chinese cities as laboratories of investigation this book explores the design ecological and sociocultural dimensions of building compact cities and addresses important global urban issues through localized design solutions such as the relationship between density and vitality the integration of horizontal and vertical dimensions of design and the ecological and social adaptability of combinatory mega forms in addition through discussions with scholars from the united states china and japan this book provides an insight into the theoretical debates surrounding compact city and vertical urbanism in the global context scholars and students in architecture and urban planning will be attracted by this book also it will appeal to readers with an interest in urban development and asian studies

northern irish poetry and domestic space explores why houses in some ways the most private of spaces have taken up such visibly public positions in the work of a range of prominent poets from northern ireland examining the work of seamus heaney michael longley derek mahon and medbh mcguckian

taylor has taken on the most delicate and exacting of philosophical questions the question of who we are and how we should live and he has made this an adventure of self discovery for his reader martha nussbaum new republic in this extensive inquiry into the sources of modern selfhood charles taylor demonstrates just how rich and precious those resources are the modern turn to subjectivity with its attendant rejection of an objective order of reason has led it seems to many to mere subjectivism at the mildest and to sheer nihilism at the worst many critics believe that the modern order has no moral backbone and has proved corrosive to all that might foster human good taylor rejects this view he argues that properly understood our modern notion of the self provides a framework that more than compensates for the abandonment of substantive notions of rationality the major insight of sources of the self is that modern subjectivity in all its epistemological aesthetic and political ramifications has its roots in ideas of human good after first arguing that contemporary philosophers have ignored how self and good connect the author defines the modern identity by describing its genesis his effort to uncover and map our moral sources leads to novel interpretations of most of the figures and movements in the modern tradition taylor shows that the modern turn inward is not disastrous but is in fact the result of our long efforts to define and reach the good

at the heart of this definition he finds what he calls the affirmation of ordinary life a value which has decisively if not completely replaced an older conception of reason as connected to a hierarchy based on birth and wealth in telling the story of a revolution whose proponents have been augustine montaigne luther and a host of others taylor s goal is in part to make sure we do not lose sight of their goal and endanger all that has been achieved sources of the self provides a decisive defense of the modern order and a sharp rebuff to its critics

prose poetry in theory and practice vigorously engages with the why and the how of prose poetry a form that is currently enjoying a surge in popularity with contributions by both practitioners and academics this volume seeks to explore how its distinctive properties guide both writer and reader and to address why this form is so well suited to the early twenty first century with discussion of both classic and less well known writers the essays both illuminate prose poetry s distinctive features and explore how this outsider form can offer a unique way of viewing and describing the uncertainties and instabilities which shape our identities and our relationships with our surroundings in the early twenty first century combining insights on the theory and practice of prose poetry prose poetry in theory and practice offers a timely and valuable contribution to the development of the form and its appreciation amongst practitioners and scholars alike largely approached from a practitioner perspective this collection provides vivid snapshots of contemporary debates within the prose poetry field while actively contributing to the poetics and craft of the form

modernist objects literature art culture is a unique mix of cultural studies literature and visual arts applied to the discrete materiality of modernist objects contributors explore the many tensions surrounding the modernist relationship to objects things products and artefacts through the prism of poetry prose visual arts culture and crafts

in the late twentieth and early twenty first centuries concerns about the environment and the future of global capitalism have dominated political and social agendas worldwide the culture of excess underlying these concerns is particularly evident in the issue of trash which for environmentalists has been a negative category heavily implicated in the destruction of the natural world however in the context of the arts trash has long been seen as a rich aesthetic resource and more recently particularly under the influence of anthropology and archaeology it has been explored as a form of material culture that articulates modes of identity construction in the context of such shifting often ambiguous attitudes to the obsolete and the discarded this book offers a timely insight into their significance for representations of

social and personal identity the essays in the book build on scholarship in cultural theory sociology and anthropology that suggests that social and personal experience is embedded in material culture but they also focus on the significance of trash as an aesthetic resource the volume illuminates some of the ways in which our relationship to trash has influenced and is influenced by cultural products including art architecture literature film and museum culture

this book draws upon domestication science to undertake a radical reappraisal of the jurisprudence of property and intellectual property bringing together animal studies and legal philosophy it articulates a critique of dominant property models and relationships from the perspective of cognitive ethology domestication science and animal behaviour in doing so a radical new picture of property emerges focusing on the emergence of property models through prevailing ideas of human domestication and settlement the book challenges the anthropocentrism that informs standard approaches to ownership and to authorship utilising a wide range of examples from ethology and animal studies the book thus rethinks the very nature of property as uniquely human this highly original contribution to the fields of property and intellectual property will appeal not only to legal scholars in these areas as well as in animal law but also to legal theorists and others working in the social sciences with interests in posthumanism and animal studies

this is one of the first books to trace the development of roberto bolaño's work from the beginning to the end of his career it will appeal to graduates and researchers working on bolaño and latin american literature generally particularly the novel and twentieth and twenty first century literature

what role does place have in a world marked by increased mobility on a global scale what strategies are there for representing place in the age of globalization what is the relationship between place and the varied mobilities of migrancy tourism travel and nomadism these are some of the questions that run through the ten essays in this collection the combined effect of these essays is to participate in the contemporary project of subjecting the links between place mobility identity representation and practice to critical interdisciplinary scrutiny such notions are not the property of particular disciplines in the era of globalization transnationalism and readily acknowledged cultural hybridity these links are more important than ever they are important because of the taken for grantedness of the universal impact of globalization the receding importance of place and the centrality of mobile identities this taken for grantedness masks the ways place continues to be important and ways in which mobility is differentiated by race gender ethnicity nationality and many other social markers this book is a concerted attempt to stop taking for granted these themes of the age material discussed in the essays include the creation of cultural routes in europe the video's of fiona tan artistic and literary representations of the north african desert the production of indigenous videos in mexico mobile forms of ethnography the film *esistenza* jamaica kincaid's writing on gardens the video representation of sex tourism and ways of imagining the global authors include tim cresswell ginette verstraete ernst van alphen ursula biemann laurel c smith nick couldry isabel hoving ren e van de vall inge e boer and kevin hetherington



winner of the 2010 margaret atwood society best book prize in engendering genre renowned margaret atwood scholar reingard m nischik analyzes the relationship between gender and genre in atwood s works she approaches atwood s oeuvre by genre poetry short fiction novels criticism comics and film and examines them individually she explores how atwood has developed her genres to be gender sensitive in both content and form and argues that gender and genre are inherently complicit in atwood s work they converge to critique the gender biased designs of traditional genres this combination of gender and genre results in the recognizable atwoodian style that shakes and extends the boundaries of conventional genres and explores them in new ways the book includes the first in depth treatment of atwood s cartoon art as well as the first survey of her involvement with film and concludes with an interview with margaret atwood on her career from survivalwoman to literary icon

capitalism s eye is an extremely ambitious cultural history of how people experienced commodities in the era of industrial expansion writing against the dominant argument that the society of the spectacle emerged fully formed in the mid nineteenth century kevin hetherington explains that the emergence of a culture of mass consumption dominated by visual experience was a much slower process not truly ascendant until after the first world war looking at the department stores home life and the great exhibitions around the turn of the last century capitalism s eye promises to transform how we understand both the cultural history of capitalism in america and europe and the historical roots of the mediated spectacle that dominates our world today

this companion offers readers an accessible survey of the historical and symbolic relationships between literature and the city

today the media arts not only address the great themes of our times they inhabit the very media of which they speak the contemporary is global but only because of the media that enable globalisation those media are almost nowhere apparent in the mainstream practice of art that we see in biennials from venice to sao paulo the media arts reflect back to us our present condition and in the archive present us with the ghosts of what we were and what we failed to become this book brings the reader into the centre of these strange encounters introducing us to the rich legacies and futures of the most important arts of the last hundred years it also looks ahead to the future and asks what happens to the condition of being human within the new constellation into which we are entering

overnight code is a must read for anyone seeking inspiration to overcome social barriers and to shatter glass ceilings carolyn porter marcel s letters a font and the search for one man s fate georgia author of the year award 2022 winner in biography the inspiring story of a groundbreaking african american female engineer who created the first computer designed ship for the us navy raye montague was an ambitious little girl in segregated little rock she grew to be a woman who spent a lifetime educating herself both inside and outside of the classroom so that she could become the person and professional she aspired to be where some saw roadblocks montague only saw hurdles that needed to be overcome her mindset helped her become the first person to draft a naval ship design by computer using a program she worked late nights to debug she did this as a single mother during the height of the cold war all the while imbuing her son with the hard won wisdom she had accumulated throughout the years equal parts coming of age tale civil rights history and reflection on the power of education overnight code is a tale about persistence and perseverance when the odds against you seem insurmountable

a book about despair climate change zombie films multiple apocalypses the everyday city dwelling zombies walking and walk performance imperialism sex zombie literature refugees popular culture and zombies

decadent conservatism argues that both literary decadence and political conservatism in britain at the turn of the twentieth century was driven by a common drive to find alternatives to liberal modernity thematic chapters offer a new and much messier picture of fin de siècle literary politics

this volume offers transdisciplinary perspectives on the study of acting and performance in moving image forms it assembles 26 international scholars from dance theatre film media and cultural studies art history and philosophy to investigate the art of acting and the presence of the human body in analog and digital film animation and video art the volume includes classical case studies and essays devoted to acting history and acting and genres but its particular emphasis is on introducing a wide range of groundbreaking theoretical approaches from continental and analytic philosophy to new media theory and cognitivist research all of which interrogate the fundamental conceptions of act and actor that underwrite both popular and academic notions of performance in moving image culture

the blind man a phantasmography examines the complicated forces of perception imagination and phantasms of encounter in the contemporary world in considering photographs he took while he was traveling in france anthropologist and writer robert desjarlais reflects on a few pictures that show the features of a man apparently blind who begs for money at a religious site in paris frequented by tourists in perceiving this stranger and the images his appearance projects he begins to imagine what this man s life is like and how he perceives the world around him written in journal form the book narrates desjarlais s pursuit of the man portrayed in the photographs he travels to paris and tries to meet with him eventually desjarlais becomes unsure as to what he sees hears or remembers through these interpretive dilemmas he senses the complexities of perception where all is multiple shifting spectral a surge of phantasms in which the actual and the imagined are endlessly blurred and intertwined his mind shifts from thinking about photographs and images to being fixed on the visceral force of apparitions his own vision is affected in a troubling way composed of an intricate weave of text and image the blind man attends to pressing issues in contemporary life the fraught dimensions of photographic capture encounters with others and alterity the politics of looking media images of violence and abjection and the nature of fantasy and imaginative construal through a wide ranging inquiry into histories of imagination desjarlais inscribes the need for a phantasmography a writing of phantasms a graphic inscription of the flows and currents of fantasy and fabulation

a poetry handbook rooted in theory history and philosophy

despite creating an extensive and innovative body of work over the last 30 years aki kaurism ki remains relatively neglected in anglophone scholarship this international collection of original essays aims to redress such neglect by assembling diverse critical inquiries into kaurism ki s oeuvre the first anthology on kaurism ki to be published in english it offers a range of voices responding to his politically and aesthetically compelling cinema deploying various methodologies to

explore multiple facets of his work the films of aki kaurismäki will come to be seen as the definitive book on kaurismäki

in 1859 charles baudelaire is writing the poetry and criticism of the new urban cultural and social world which would make him described by a number of historians as the first modern indeed it is he who coined the term modernity in the east ivan turgenev with *on the eve* begins reflections about russia and modernity which would result in his next novel set in 1859 *fathers and sons* the latter still resonates today in switzerland jacob burckhardt is inventing the renaissance as a means of understanding what is happening in his own time indeed we never talked about a renaissance until burckhardt published his *the civilization of the renaissance in italy* in 1860 something he wrote in order to better understand his own times in the west several important and central works of european culture are being written in england by both british writers and exiles marx is researching *das capital* and writing a contribution to the critique of political economy mazzini is writing his major work on modern nationalism *the duties of man* just as italy is beginning its decade of unification and the european map is beginning a period of extraordinary change john stuart mill published his *on liberty* in early 1859 still the work that is the modern ground of democratic ideas dealing with the relationship between liberty and authority and in november 1859 one of the dozen or so most influential works of all of european history and science one that shattered many pre modern concepts *the origin of species* was published by charles darwin the thinkers who were prominent at the time were in a full sense public intellectuals their works were read debated applauded feared defended and scorned in the public forums what philosophers sometimes called the marketplace it was in 1859 that modernity the world as we now know it gets confronted and encountered as a result concepts and ideas we still use then new get thought about and become part of the public discourse from this point on the dialogue is forever transformed
