jeweiligen stadtteilebens repräsentieren in den blick nimmt die ergebnisse werden kartographisch aufbereitet und vor dem theoretischen hintergrund bisheriger und teils kontrovers diskutierter forschungsbeiträge wissenschaftsgeschichtlich eingebettet und bewertet variation wird dabei sowohl mit gruppen und ortsspezifischen faktoren in verbindung gebracht als auch unter berücksichtigung möglicher pragmatischer auslassungsstrukturen erörtert

das interesse an den dialekten und der dialektologie hat sich im letzten jahrzehnt wieder verstärkt dafür gibt es auch erwissenschaftliche und wissenschaftsimmanente ursachen in der sprachwissenschaft hat man die ursachen für diese entwicklung in der wiederentdeckten historizität und regelhaften heterogenität der sprachen zu suchen dem sprachwandel dem varieties spectrum und dem variierenden sprachgebrauch in kommunikativen handlungssituationen zu b gilt in der sprachwissenschaft jetzt gerade aufmerksamkeit die erforschung dieser gegenstandsbereiche kann durch den rückgriff auf die datensammlungen und ergebnisse der dialektologie sowie durch berücksichtigung und weiterentwicklung dialektologischer methoden entscheidend gefördert werden im Hinblick auf solche entwicklungstendenzen innerhalb der wissenschaftlichen diskussion über sprache sprachen und sprechen will das handbuch zur dialektologie wissenschaftsgeschichtliche entwicklungsschwerpunkte herausarbeiten methodologische problemfelder aufzeigen arbeitsverfahren für die forschungspraxis vermitteln die wichtigsten forschungsergebnisse zu den deutschen dialekten zusammenfassen übersichten und zusammenfassungen für die hochschullehre anbieten neuere forschungsansätze aufgreifen und damit perspektiven andeuten um diese ziele zu erreichen haben 90 autoren 104 handbuchartikel geschrieben die zu 15 kapiteln geordnet wurden einen zugang zur terminologie ermöglicht ein register im zweiten halbband

today s interest in social history and private life is often seen as a twentieth century innovation most often lucien febre and the annales school in france are credited with making social history a widely accepted way for historians to approach the past in lost worlds historian jonathan dewald shows that we need to look back further in time into the nineteenth century when numerous french intellectuals developed many of the key concepts that historians employ today according to dewald we need to view febre and other annales historians as participants in an ongoing cultural debate over the shape and meanings of french history rather than as inventors of new topics of study he closely examines the work of charles augustin sainte beuve hippolyte taine the antiquarian alfred franklin febre himself the twentieth century historian philippe ari[?] s and several others a final chapter compares specifically french approaches to social history with those of german historians between 1930 and 1970 through such close readings dewald looks beyond programmatic statements of historians intentions to reveal how history was actually practiced during these years a bold work of intellectual history lost worlds sheds much needed light on how contemporary ideas about the historian s task came into being understanding this larger context enables us to appreciate the ideological functions performed by historical writing through the twentieth century
