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after 1850 americans swarmed to take in a raft of new illustrated journals and papers engravings and drawings of buckskinned braves and indian princesses proved an immensely popular attraction for consumers of publications like frank leslie s illustrated newspaper and harper s weekly in indians illustrated john m coward charts a social and

cultural history of native american illustrations romantic violent racist peaceful and otherwise in the heyday of the american pictorial press these woodblock engravings and ink drawings placed native americans into categories that drew from venerable good indian and bad indian stereotypes already threaded through the culture coward s examples show how the genre cemented white ideas about how indians should look and behave ideas that diminished native americans cultural values and political influence his powerful analysis of themes and visual tropes unlocks the racial codes and visual cues that whites used to represent and marginalize native cultures already engaged in a twilight struggle against inexorable westward expansion

the author describes how he overcame alcohol addiction and rebuilt his life providing lessons to help others cope with anger separation alcohol abuse and grief

sociology of death and the american indian examines dying death disposal and bereavement practices and applies those concepts to select american indian tribes historically and currently supplemented with oral histories the focus is that learning about other cultures can enhance the understanding of one s own culture by comparing traditional and modern societies gerry r cox addresses the centuries of injustices committed against american indians that led to a neglect of learning about american indian cultures and attempts to fill the gaps in knowledge of american indian practices

native and christian is an anthology of essays by indigenous writers in the united states and canada on the problem of native christian identity this anthology documents the emergence of a significant new collective voice on the north american religious landscape it brings together in one volume articles originally published in a variety of sources many of them obscure or out of print including religious magazines scholarly journals and native periodicals

along with one previously unpublished manuscript

connection with a lawsuit brought against the federal government he returned to gleichen late in life to the home left to him by his mother and it was there that he began to reconnect with blackfoot language and culture and to write his story although the terrific adversity bear chief faced in his childhood made an indelible mark on his life his unyielding spirit is evident throughout his story

the editors undertook this project to promote the international conference on death grief and bereavement in la crosse wisconsin usa throughout its history the conference has attracted internationally known speakers this book illustrates the quality of their presentations
