this book is the first to make the case that women s changing role in european and american society was critical to dada

this groundbreaking collection of thirteen original essays analyzes connections between film and two highly influential twentieth century movements

this collection of critical essays celebrates the subversive and challenging creativity of the dada movement born in pacifist zurich in 1916 in violent reaction to the first world war it examines the collective and individual activities that took place under the name of dada in zurich cologne berlin paris new york and barcelona and explores the various creative forms employed including text collage photomontage objects dance performance and film the authors suggest new ways of understanding the work of the most famous dadaists while also casting light on the contribution of hitherto neglected figures far from attempting to reduce dada to a homogeneous movement or to define a unifying principle beneath and beyond the multiple directions taken by dadaists this collection aims to respect the diversity and heterogeneity of the movement s collective activities as well as the specificity of its individual actors

the avant garde movements of dada and surrealism continue to have a huge influence on cultural practice especially in contemporary art with its obsession with sexuality fetishism and shock tactics in this new treatment of the subject hopkins focuses on the many debates surrounding these movements the marquis de sade s surrealist deification issues of quality how good is dali the idea of the readymade attitudes towards the city the impact of freud attitudes to women fetishism and primitivism the international nature of these movements is examined covering the cities of zurich new york berlin cologne barcelona paris london and recently discovered examples in eastern europe hopkins explores the huge range of media employed by both dada and surrealism collage painting found objects performance art photography film whilst at the same time establishing the aesthetic differences between the movements he also examines the dadaist obsession with the body as mechanism in relation to the surrealists return to the fetishized eroticized body about the series the very short introductions series from oxford university press contains hundreds of titles in almost every subject area these pocket sized books are the perfect way to get ahead in a new subject quickly our expert authors combine facts analysis perspective new ideas and enthusiasm to make interesting and challenging topics highly readable

this volume focuses on the unstudied geographic margins of dada delving into the roots of dada in israel romania poland and north america contributors consider some of the practices and experiments that were conceived a century ago surfaced in art throughout the twentieth century and are still relevant today unearthing its israeli origins examining

dadaist expressions in poland and shedding light on overlooked facets of dadaist art in romania and north america the authors cast a spotlight on the less explored geographical peripheries of dada the book is organized around four thematic trajectories space language materiality and reception which are dissected through the lens of micro histories recognizing the continuing validity of questions raised by dadaist artists this volume argues that dada persists as an ongoing endeavor a continual reexamination of the fundamental tenets of art and its ever evolving potential manifestations the book will be of interest to scholars working in art history modernism and history of the twentieth and twenty first centuries

how dada is to break its cultural accommodation and containment today necessitates thinking the historical instances through revised application of critical and theoretical models the volume *dada culture* critical texts on the avant garde moves precisely by this motive bringing together writings which insist upon the continuity of the early twentieth century moment now at the start of the twenty first engaging the complex and contradictory nature of dada strategies instanced in the linguistic gaming and performativity of the movement s initial formation and subsequently isolating the specific from the general with essays focusing on ball tzara serner hausmann dix heartfield schwitters baader cravan and the exemplary duchamp the political philosophy of the avant garde is brought to bear upon our own contemporary struggle through critical theory to comprehend the cultural usefulness relevance validity and effective or otherwise oppositionality of dada s infamous anti stance the volume is presented in sections that progressively point towards the expanding complexity of the contemporary engagement with dada as what is often exhaustive historical data is forced to rethink realign and reconfigure itself in response to the analytical rigour and exercise of later twentieth century animal anarchic thought the testing and cultural placement of thoughts upon the virtual and the eventual implications for the once blissfully unproblematic idea of expression from the opening provocative proposition that historically dada may have been the falsest of all false paths the volume rounds to dispute such condemnation as demarcation continues not only of dada s embeddedness in western culture but more precisely of the location of *dada culture* ten critical essays by cornelius partsch john wall t j demos anna schaffner martin i gaughan curt germundson stephen c foster dafydd jones joel freeman and david cunningham are supplemented by the critical bibliography prepared by timothy shipe which documents the past decade of dada scholarship and in

so doing provides a valuable resource for all those engaged in dada studies today

offering new critical approaches to dada as quintessential part of the avant garde dada and existentialism the authenticity of ambiguity reassesses the movement as a form of proto existentialist philosophy dada is often dismissed as an anti art movement with a merely destructive theoretical impetus french existentialism is often condemned for its perceived quietist implications however closer analysis reveals a preoccupation with philosophy in the former and with art in the latter moreover neither was nonsensical or meaningless both reveal a rich individualist ethics aimed at the amelioration of the individual and society the first major comparative study of dada and existentialism this text contributes new perspectives on dada as movement historical legacy and field of study analysing dada works through existentialist literature across the themes of choice alienation responsibility freedom and truth the text posits that dada and existentialism both advocate the creation of a self that aims for authenticity through ambiguity

100 years after the dada soirées rocked the art world the author investigates the role that music played in the movement dada is generally thought of as noisy and unmusical but the music of dada shows that music was at the core of dada theory and practice music by schoenberg satie and many others performed on the piano played a central role in the soirées from the beginnings in zurich in 1916 to the end in paris and holland seven years later the music of dada provides a historical analysis of music at dada events and asks why accounts of dada have so consistently ignored music s vital presence the answer to that question turns out to explain how music has related to the other arts ever since the days of dada the music of dada is the key to understanding intermediality in our time

anarchism and the advent of paris dada sheds new light on paris dada s role in developing the anarchist and individualist philosophies that helped shape the cultural dialogue in france following the first world war drawing on such surviving documentation as correspondence criticism periodicals pamphlets and manifestoes this book argues that contrary to received wisdom dada was driven by a vision of social change through radical cultural upheaval the first book length study to interrogate the paris dadaists complex and often contested position in the postwar groundswell of anarcho individualism anarchism and the advent of paris dada offers an unprecedented analysis of paris dada literature and art in relation to anarchism and also revives a variety of little

known anarcho individualist texts and periodicals in doing so it reveals the general ideological diversity of the postwar french avant garde and identifies its anarchist concerns in addition it challenges the accepted paradigm that postwar cultural politics were monolithically nationalist by positioning paris dada in its anarchist context this volume addresses a long ignored lacuna in dada scholarship and more broadly takes its place alongside the numerous studies that over the past two decades have problematized the politics of modern art literature and culture

dada s subject and structure argues that dadaist praxis was far more theoretically incisive than previous scholarship has indicated the book combines theoretical frameworks surrounding ideological subject formation with critical media and genre histories in order to more closely read dadaist techniques e g montage irony nonsense etc across multiple works these readings reveal both dada s preternatural focus on the discursive aspects of subject formation linguistic sign literary manifesto photographic image commodity form aesthetics which comprise the project s chapters and on dada s performative sabotage and subversion of them in addition to highlighting commonalities between dadaist works artists and chapters previously imagined disparate the book shows how dada simultaneously prefigured structuralist theories of subject formation and pre performed post structuralist critiques of those theories

Dada magazines made Dada what it was diverse non-hierarchical transnational and defiant of the most fundamental artistic conventions this first volume entirely devoted to Dada periodicals retells the story of Dada by demonstrating the centrality of these graphically inventive provocative periodicals Dada New York Dada Dada Jok and dozens more that began crossing enemy lines during World War I the book includes magazines from well-known Dada cities like New York and Paris as well as Zagreb and Bucharest and reveals that Dada continued to inspire art journals into the 1920s anchored in close material analysis within a historical and theoretical framework Dada magazines models a novel multifaceted methodology for assessing many kinds of periodicals the book traces how the Dadaists Marcel Duchamp Tristan Tzara Dragan Aleksic Hannah Höch and many others compiled printed distributed and exchanged these publications at the same time it recognizes the journals as active agents that engendered the Dada network and its thematic chronological structure captures the constant exchanges that took place in this network with in-depth scrutiny of these magazines and 1970s Dadazines inspired by them Dada magazines is a vital source in the histories of art and design periodical studies and modernist studies

When Dada burst onto the European stage in 1916 it shocked and scandalized the public of its day with art forms ideas and attitudes which were so revolutionary that it is only in recent decades that they have begun to find recognition within the broad cultural movement known as postmodernism in fact many postmodern artistic and intellectual tendencies can be seen to have descended via an underground tradition from the experiments of the Dadaists earlier this century yet the existence of this close link has

been largely neglected by scholars this book for the first time examines in depth the link between modernism and postmodernism and demonstrates the extensive similarities as well as the few crucial differences between the ideas and art of the dadaists on the one hand and those of contemporary postmodern thinkers and artists on the other although they did not have access to postmodern terminology it is clear that many dadaists were essentially attempting to escape constrictive enlightenment and modernist structures in order to create a proto postmodern space of difference otherness and flux their successes failures and compromises in this respect are very illustrative for anyone interested in the progress of our own intellectual and artistic culture in its wavering between modern and postmodern this book offers a much needed historical perspective and solid basis for the on going debate on postmodernism

this valuable reference is an authoritative guide to 20th century french thought it considers the intellectual figures movements and publications that helped define fields as diverse as history psychoanalysis film philosophy and economics

arranged in alphabetical order these 5 volumes encompass the history of the cultural development of america with over 2300 entries

the dada movement revered as perhaps the purest form of cultural subversion and provocation in 20th century europe has been a victim of the readiness with which cultural historians have swallowed its own propaganda based on extensive close analysis of french language dada work in its original form and offering english translations throughout this major reappraisal looks at a broad range of media and topics including poetry film philosophy and quantum physics in order to get beyond dada's typecasting as avant garde anti hero work by women writers and other marginalized figures combines with that of canonical dadaists to present dada in a radically new set of guises poetic and textually subtle intellectually and philosophically meaningful peaceable and quasi buddhist and perhaps most uncomfortably of all conformist and reactionary

first published in 1972 the work provides an introduction to dada and surrealism it explores the two movements and their cultural significance it also looks at those who called themselves dadaists and surrealists including their aims and achievements in doing so the book identifies the meaning that the two terms have acquired which is often remote from the claims advanced by the chief adherents of each movement this book will be a valuable resource to those studying dada and surrealism and its relationship to modern literature

the first decades of the twentieth century were pivotal for the historical and formal relationships between early cinema and cubism mechanomorphism abstraction and dada to examine these relationships jennifer wild s interdisciplinary study grapples with the cinema s expanded identity as a modernist form defined by the concept of horizontality found in early methods of projection film exhibition and in the film industry s penetration into cultural life by way of film stardom advertising and distribution cinematic horizontality provides a new axis of inquiry for studying early twentieth century modernism shifting attention from the film to the horizon of possibility around behind and beyond the screen wild shows how canonical works of modern art may be understood as responding to the changing characteristics of daily life after the cinema drawing from a vast popular cultural cinematic and art historical archive wild challenges how we have told the story of modern artists earliest encounter with cinema and urges us to reconsider how early projection film stardom and film distribution transformed their understanding of modern life representation and the act of beholding by highlighting the cultural ideological and artistic forms of interpellation and resistance that shape the phenomenology of a wartime era the parisian avant garde in the age of cinema 1900 1923 provides an interdisciplinary history of radical form this book also offers a new historiography that redefines how we understand early cinema and avant garde art before artists turned to making films themselves the first decades of the twentieth century were pivotal for the historical and formal relationships between early cinema and cubism mechanomorphism abstraction and dada to examine these relationships jennifer

wild s interdisciplinary study grapples

this study of marianne moore and the visual arts focuses on how art productions serve to break down and re create cultural practice proving that culture is a mutable organism reluctant to change but not impervious to it in doing so author elisabeth w joyce shows that even though moore may have restricted herself to the quiet provincial life of brooklyn her poetry attests to her resistance to the constrictions imposed by the predominating bourgeoisie this study presents the bifurcation between modernism and the avant garde where while the modernists retreated from engagement in society the avant gardistes remained focused on political and social issues in order to critique stifling cultural phenomena so that art could effect cultural changes in taking this stance instead of viewing moore s poetry as typically and provincially american joyce places her in the international and radical art movements of the early twentieth century

martin puchner tells the story of political and artistic upheavals through the political manifestos of the 19th and 20th centuries he argues that the manifesto was the genre through which modern culture articulated its revolutionary ambitions and desires

a select anthology of the dada movement focusing mainly on visual artists features prose poetry and polemics from such notables as marcel duchamp max ernst tristan tzara hannah hoch george grosz and jean cocteau
