exhibiting the archive examines the role that exhibition plays in archives and analyses the impact they are understood to have on how users and visitors experience the archive drawing on research conducted in europe north america and australia the book analyses the key theoretical and social influences on exhibition making in archives today and discusses the role of exhibitions in the archives of tomorrow this is the first in depth study to consider exhibition as more than outreach or advocacy it frames exhibition as an encounter with archives and with people and interprets it as a mechanism for change within the archive against a backdrop of increasing digital activity lester asks what experience within the physical space of the archive could be drawing on ideas of spatiality and embodiment as well as social justice and activism lester considers the role of exhibitions within the physical archive and the part they can play in reshaping how experience is understood to happen within it exhibiting the archive offers a new perspective on the archive that will be of interest to academics and students engaged in the study of archives and records the discussions of cutting

writing has long been linked to power for early modern people on both sides of the atlantic writing was also the province of notaries men trained to cast other people s words in official forms and make them legally true thus the first thing columbus did on american shores in october 1492 was have a

notary record his claim of territorial possession it was the written notarial word backed by all the power of castilian enforcement that first constituted spanish american empire even so the spaniards who invaded america in 1492 were not fond of their notaries who had a dismal reputation for falsehood and greed yet spaniards could not do without these men contemporary scholars also rely on the vast paper trail left by notaries to make sense of the latin american past how then to approach the question of notarial truth kathryn burns argues that the archive itself must be historicized using the case of colonial cuzco she examines the practices that shaped document making notaries were businessmen selling clients a product that conformed to local custom as well as spanish templates clients for their part were knowledgeable consumers with strategies of their own for getting what they wanted in this inside story of the early modern archive burns offers a wealth of possibilities for seeing sources in fresh perspective

dedicated to art practices that mobilize the model of the archive staging the archive demonstrates the ways in which such archival artworks probe the possibilities of what art is and what it can do through a variety of media methodologies and perspectives the artists surveyed here also challenge the principles on which the notions of organization evidence and documentation are built the earliest examples of the modern archival artwork were made in the 1930s but only since the 1960s have artists really embraced archival principles to inform structure and shape their works this includes practices that consist of archive construction archaeological investigation record keeping and the use of archived materials but also interrogations of the principles claims and effects of the archive staging the archive shows how artists read the concept of the archive against the grain questioning not only what the archive is and can be but what materials images or ideas can be archived ernst van alphen examines these archival artists and artworks in detail setting them within their social political and aesthetic contexts exploring the works of marcel duchamp marcel broodthaers christian boltanski annette messenger fiona tan and sophie calle among others he reveals how modern and contemporary artists have used and contested the notion of the archive to establish new relationships to history information and data

the archive as a crucible of twentieth century modernism and key for understanding contemporary art the typewriter the card index and the filing cabinet these are technologies and modalities of the archive to the bureaucrat archives contain little more than garbage paperwork no longer needed to the historian on the other hand the archive's content stands as a quasi objective correlative of the living past twentieth century art made use of the archive in a variety of ways from what spieker calls marcel duchamp's anemic archive of readymades and el lissitzky's demonstration rooms to the compilations of photographs made by such postwar artists as susan hiller

and gerhard richter in the big archive sven spieker investigates the archive as both bureaucratic institution and index of evolving attitudes toward contingent time in science and art and finds it to be a crucible of twentieth century modernism dadaists constructivists and surrealists favored discontinuous nonlinear archives that resisted hermeneutic reading and ordered presentation spieker argues that the use of archives by such contemporary artists as hiller richter hans peter feldmann walid road and boris mikhailov responds to and continues this attack on the nineteenth century archive and its objectification of the historical process spieker considers archivally driven art in relation to changing media technologies the typewriter the telephone the telegraph film and he connects the archive to a particularly modern visuality showing that the avant garde used the archive as something of a laboratory for experimental inquiries into the nature of vision and its relation to time the big archive offers us the first critical monograph on an overarching motif in twentieth century art

foreword by anne j gilliland university of california evaluating archives in a post truth society in recent years big data initiatives not to mention hollywood the video game industry and countless other popular media have reinforced and even glamorized the public image of the archive as the ultimate repository of facts and the hope of future generations for uncovering what actually happened the reality is however that for all sorts of reasons the record may not have been preserved or survived in the archive in fact the record may never have even existed its creation being as imagined as is its contents and even if it does exist it may be silent on the salient facts or it may obfuscate mislead or flat out lie the silence of the archive is written by three expert and knowledgeable archivists and draws attention to the many limitations of archives and the inevitability of their having parameters silences or gaps in archives range from details of individuals lives to records of state oppression or of intelligence operations the book brings together ideas from a wide range of fields including contemporary history family history research and shakespearean studies it describes why these silences exist what the impact of them is how researchers have responded to them and what the silence of the archive means for researchers in the digital age it will help provide a framework and context to their activities and enable them to better evaluate archives in a post truth society this book includes discussion of enforced silences expectations and when silence means silenced digital preservation authenticity and the future dealing with the silence possible solutions challenging silence and acceptance the meaning of the silences are things getting better or worse user satisfaction and audience development this book will make compelling reading for professional archivists records managers and records creators postgraduate and undergraduate students of history archives librarianship and information studies as well as academics and other users of archives

archives have the potential to change people s lives they are a fundamental bulwark of our democracy our culture our community and personal identity national council of archives archives and archivists in 20th century england innovatively focuses on the multifunctional reasons behind the creations of archives they enable the conduct of business and support accountability whilst also meeting the demands of a democratic society s expectations for transparency and the protection of rights they are the raw material of our history and memory while archivists and records managers are the professionals responsible for ensuring that these qualities are protected and exploited for the public good this volume will be of key interest to anyone working with archives

archives bring to mind rooms filled with old papers and dusty artifacts but for scientists the detritus of the past can be a treasure trove of material vital to present and future research fossils collected by geologists data banks assembled by geneticists weather diaries trawled by climate scientists libraries visited by historians these are the vital collections assembled and maintained over decades centuries and even millennia which define the sciences of the archives with science in the archives lorraine daston and her co authors offer the first study of the important role that these archives play in the natural and human sciences reaching across disciplines and centuries contributors cover episodes in the history of astronomy geology genetics philology climatology medicine and more as well as fundamental practices such as collecting retrieval and data mining chapters cover topics ranging from doxology in greco roman antiquity to nsa surveillance techniques of the twenty first century thoroughly exploring the practices politics economics and potential of the sciences of the archives this volume reveals the essential historical dimension of the sciences while also adding a much needed long term perspective to contemporary debates over the uses of big data in science

on the occasion of the 100th anniversary of the foundation of the institute for social research in frankfurt am main in 1923 this book aims at shedding light on the archives of some of the key thinkers of critical theory of society also well known as frankfurt school to pay homage to this current of thought this contributed volume aims to make the archives speak for themselves to show the public the quantity of unpublished material still existing by the authors of the critical theory which are now in funds in different parts of the world in germany in italy or in the united states and to show that critical theory remains alive 100 years after its inception the volume starts by presenting the archives of karl marx and friedrich engels the thinkers who inspired critical theory and the archives of the institute for social research itself then it dedicates separate sections to the archives of walter benjamin max horkheimer theodor w adorno friedrich pollock herbert marcuse leo löwenthal and jürgen habermas the book is composed of chapters written by researchers and editors who worked in the different fonds as well as chapters written by or interviews with researchers who were or are in charge of some of the archives or who are especially familiar with the material the archives of critical theory will be an invaluable tool for researchers in many disciplines working with critical theory of society such as sociology anthropology political science philosophy history education law and cultural studies among others readers will find information about the content of each archive and the history of its constitution the various contributions present many ways in which the materials may be explored and explain how such explorations affected or may yet affect the state of the research

focussing upon both canonical figures such as woolf eliot pound and stein and emergent themes such as christian modernism intermedial modernism queer harlem renaissance this volume brings together previously unseen materials from various archives to bear upon cutting edge interpretation of modernism it provides an overview of approaches to modernism via the employment of various types of primary source material correspondence manuscripts and drafts memoirs and production notes reading notes and marginalia and all manner of useful contextualising sources like news reports or judicial records while having much to say to literary criticism more broadly this volume is closely focused upon key modernist figures and emergent themes in light of the discipline s archival turn termed in a unifying introduction achivalism an essential ingredient separating the above recent tendency from a much older and better established new historicism in modernist studies at least is that the literary canon remains an important starting point whereas new historicism is interested in history as represented and recorded in written documents and tends toward a parallel study of literature and non literary texts archival criticism tends toward recognised oftentimes canonical or critically lauded writers presented in part 1 sidestepping the vicissitudes of canon formation manuscript scholars tend to gravitate toward leading modernist authors james joyce ezra pound

virginia woolf gertrude stein t s eliot and samuel beckett part of the reason is obvious known authors frequently leave behind sizeable literary estates which are then acquired by research centres a second section then applies the same empirical methodology to key or emergent themes in the study of modernism including queer modernism spatial modernism little magazines and online finding aids structuring them and the role of faith and or emotions in the construction of modernism as we know it

transhumanism by analyzing how julian huxley's transhumanism develops and why it does at this particular point in time by placing it firmly within the context of his specific scientific and sociopolitical milieu starting roughly in the interwar years and stretching over the second world war to the 1970s continuing the study then focuses on the new transhumanists of the 1970s 1980s and 1990s and investigates continuity in mode of thinking contributing to a more coherent understanding of transhumanism its history and of modern projects of human enhancement the book captures how scientific and technological development in relation to society and social order shapes images and expectations of the future and of what future is desirable

in this book the editors brought together outstanding articles concerning intercultural aesthetics the concept intercultural aesthetics creates a home space for an artistic cross fertilization between cultures and for heterogeneity but it is also firmly linked with the intercultural turn within western and non western philosophy the book is divided into two parts yet one can sense a clear unity throughout the whole book this unity is related to the underlying subject that the different authors each in their own way and from their own background try to reveal they use related and overlapping terms such as the suchness of things dancing and shaping lives presenting a meaning beyond words presenting the unrepresentable experiencing in order to bring to our awareness the genuine importance of the non conceptual next to the conceptual several authors moreover take on a reflective and at times even a self reflective stance pointing to the intrinsic relation between cultural aesthetics and ethics making this book unique in its kind
