to harness the power of nonverbal communication clinicians should employ a few practical strategies during interviews firstly they should strive for congruence between their verbal and nonverbal messages when both forms of communication align it promotes clarity and trust for instance if a clinician expresses empathy through words their body language such as nodding and maintaining appropriate eye contact should mirror that sentiment secondly clinicians should engage in active observation and reflection this involves attuning themselves to their clients nonverbal cues and considering their potential meanings regularly reflecting on these observations can deepen the understanding of the client s emotional states and facilitate more targeted responses lastly clinicians should remain aware of their own internal biases and preconceptions that may influence their interpretation of nonverbal cues personal experiences and cultural backgrounds shape how both clinicians and clients express themselves nonverbally openness to ongoing self reflection can help clinicians mitigate biases and foster more effective communication in conclusion nonverbal communication and body language are foundational elements of clinical interviewing that enrich the clinician client interaction by developing awareness and sensitivity to nonverbal cues clinicians can gain deeper insights into clients emotional states enhance rapport and ultimately facilitate more effective therapeutic outcomes through training and practice clinicians can hone these skills allowing them to leverage nonverbal communication as a powerful tool in the assessment and therapeutic process

for a research based pharmaceutical company to be successful in the 1990s it must have a strategic plan for the global development of new chemical entities global development can be defined as an attempt to reach all major markets as rapidly as possible and for many companies these will include the united states japan germany france italy uk and canada which together represent approximately 85% of the pharmaceutical market in the developed world the mutual acceptance of foreign clinical data would reduce the time and resources required to develop a new medicine for the international market by eliminating the requirement for the routine repetition of clinical studies in local populations in japan this has been largely based on the belief that genetic differences in responsiveness may result in a different benefit risk assessment for a new medicine while requests in europe and the united states for local data relate mainly to methodological and cultural considerations the importance of this issue has been recognised internationally as it was one of the topics discussed at the international conference on harmonisation in orlando october 1993 and it is currently on the programme for ich3 which will be convened in yokohama in november 1995

assessment is a key method of improving standards as well as establishing competency however despite major developments in the assessment of clinical competence there is still bad practice and ignorance of significant issues in this area than any other aspect of medical higher education this book covers all aspects of assessment

the european school of oncology came into existence to respond to a need for information education and training in the field of the diagnosis and treatment of cancer there are two main reasons why such an initiative was considered necessary firstly the teaching of oncology requires a rigorously multidisciplinary approach which is difficult for the universities to put into practice since their system is mainly disciplinary orientated secondly the rate of technological development that impinges on the diagnosis and treatment of cancer has been so rapid that it is not an easy task for medical faculties to adapt their curricula flexibly with its residential courses for organ pathologies and the seminars on new techniques laser monoclonal antibodies imaging techniques etc or on the principal therapeutic controversies conservative or mutilating surgery primary or adjuvant chemotherapy radiotherapy alone or integrated it is the ambition of the european school of oncology to fill a cultural and scientific gap and thereby create a bridge between the university and industry and between these two and daily medical practice one of the more recent initiatives of eso has been the institution of permanent study groups also called task forces where a limited number of leading experts are invited to meet once a year with the aim of defining the state of the art and possibly reaching a consensus on future developments in specific fields of oncology

stroke remains one of the major causes of death and long term disability worldwide currently the only approved therapy for the acute treatment of this disease is thrombolysis a strategy that can only be applied to a small percentage of patients due to its narrow therapeutic window unfortunately during the last years numerous promising drugs that showed neuroprotection in the experimental setting failed to translate into the clinic because of their toxicity or lack of efficacy researchers in the field now face the crucial need to develop effective stroke therapies and successfully translate novel strategies into the clinical setting rational basis for clinical translation in stroke therapy presents the most recent promising preclinical approaches and the most updated clinical evidence for treating stroke patients by bringing together the experience of accomplished stroke researchers and clinicians the book is a useful tool for improving the treatment and management of stroke patients the book describes current approaches for the management of stroke patients including thrombolysis and mechanical recanalization procedures as well as other clinically relevant topics such as diagnosis imaging risk factors and prevention also described are emerging interventions based on the use of stem cells botulinum toxin and antidepressants which complement emergency stroke treatment and conventional rehabilitation procedures clinical approaches are integrated with the most promising therapeutic opportunities based on targeting the immune system hypothermia and postconditioning the book also covers issues related to the improvement of r d strategies in stroke therapeutics aimed

at the implementation of preclinical approaches with stroke model guidelines and at the optimization of clinical trial design this volume is a reference for all those interested in the rational development of novel stroke therapeutics

psychologists offer an increasing variety of services to the public among these services psychological assessment of personality and behavior continues to be a central activity one main reason is that other mental health professionals often do not possess a high level of competence in this area and when dealing with children and adolescents psychological assessment seems to take on an even greater role therefore it follows that comprehensive graduate level instruction in assessment should be a high priority for educators of psychologists who will work with these youth this textbook is organized into three sections consistent with the authors approach to teaching part i provides students with the psychological knowledge base necessary for modern assessment practice including historical perspectives measurement science child psychopathology ethical legal and cultural issues and the basics of beginning the assessment process part ii gives students a broad review of the specific assessment methods used by psychologists accompanied by specific advice regarding the usage and strengths and weaknesses of each method in part iii we help students perform some of the most sophisticated of assessment practices integrating and communicating assessment results and infusing assessment practice with knowledge of child development and psychopathology to assess some of the most common types of behavioral and emotional disorders in youth a text focusing on assessment practices must be updated every four to six years to keep pace with advances in test development for example several of the major tests reviewed in the text such as the behavioral assessment system for children and the child behavior checklist have undergone major revisions since the publication of the last edition making the current content outdated further another major test the conners rating scales is undergoing substantial revisions that should be completed before publication of the next edition finally the evidence for the validity of the tests and the recommendations for their appropriate use evolve as research accumulates and requires frequent updating to remain current for example there was a special issue of the journal of clinical child and adolescent psychology published focusing on evidenced based assessment of the major forms of childhood psychopathology that will need to be integrated into the chapters in part 3 this latter point reflects an important trend in the field that should influence the marketing of the book that is there are several initiatives being started in all of the major areas of applied psychology e g school clinical and counseling to promote evidenced based assessment practices these initiatives have all emphasized the need to enhance the training of graduate students in this approach to assessment this has been the orientation of this textbook from its first edition that is clinical assessment of child and adolescent personality and behavior has focused on using research to guide all recommendations for practice the ability of the textbook to meet this training need should be an important focus of marketing the book to training programs across all areas of applied psychology
