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this book analyzes and describes the development and aspects of imagery techniques a primary mode of mystical experience in twentieth century jewish mysticism these techniques in contrast to linguistic techniques in medieval kabbalah and in contrast to early hasidism have all the characteristics of a full screenplay a long and complicated plot woven together from many scenes a kind of a feature film research on this development and nature of the imagery experience is carried out through comparison to similar developments in philosophy and psychology and is fruitfully contextualized within broader trends of western and eastern mysticism

in ad 66 a local disturbance in caesarea caused by greeks sacrificing birds in front of a local synagogue exploded into a pan jewish revolt against their roman overlords gaining momentum the rebels successfully occupied jerusalem and drove off an attack by the roman legate of syria cestus gallius who was defeated at the battle of beth horon the emperor nero dispatched the roman general vespasian along with reinforcements and having crushed the revolt in galilee he became embroiled in the events of the year of the four emperors that would lead to his assumption of the imperial throne his son titus was left to carry on the war which culminated in the dramatic siege of jerusalem in ad 70 remorselessly the legions strangled the life out of the defense street by street leaving nothing but rubble and ashes in their wake the apotheosis of the conflict was the final stand of the last holdouts in the temple precinct itself and the utter annihilation of this the physical manifestation of judaism itself the last remnants held out in the mountain fortress of masada until ad 73 when with the romans breaking down the walls the defenders committed mass suicide bringing the revolt to an end

end of days is both a meditation on jewish morality in the age of israeli jewish power and a cri du coeur by an orthodox israeli jew a former combat officer in the idf for israelis to look into the jewish religious ethical tradition for an alternative to the secular and religious zionism that sanctifies power statehood and sovereignty appealing to a wealth of jewish sources from the bible to the present including medieval jewish ethical literature rabbinic sources jewish law and contemporary israeli thought the book presents an argument against israel s occupation of the palestinians and the suppression of their rights from the perspective of a modern israeli religious jew

illuminating the history of jews and jewish catholic relations in rome intimate strangers investigates the unusual and uninterrupted relationship between jews and catholics as it has developed from the first century ce to the present

in jews judaism and success robert eisen attempts to solve a long standing mystery that has fascinated many how did jews become such a remarkably successful minority in the modern western world eisen argues that jews achieved such success because they were unusually well prepared for it by their religion in particular rabbinic judaism or the judaism of the rabbis rooted in the talmud this form of judaism instilled in jews key values that paved the way for success in modern western society autonomy freedom of thought worldliness and education the book carefully analyses the evolution of these four values over the past two thousand years in order to demonstrate that they had a longer and richer

many jewish groups of late antiquity assumed that they were obligated to observe the divine law this book attempts to study the various rationales offered by these groups to explain the authority that the divine law had over them second temple groups tended to look towards philosophy or metaphysics to justify the divine law s authority the tannaim though formulated legal arguments that obligate israel to observe the divine law while this turn towards legalism is pan tannaitic two distinct legal arguments can be identified in tannaitic literature these specific arguments about the divine law s authority link to a set of issues regarding the tannaim s conception of divine law and of israel s election

techniques for example their choice to emphasize either literal reflections of the hebrew or distinctive elements of the vernacular language and their underlying rationales as he highlights distinctive features of jewish bible translations he offers new insights regarding their shared characteristics and their limits additionally greenspoon shows how profoundly jewish translators and interpreters influenced the style and diction of the king james bible accessible and authoritative for all from beginners to scholars jewish bible translations enables readers to make their own informed evaluations of individual translations and to holistically assess bible translation within judaism

darwin provoked jewish as well as christian thinkers so that many felt obliged to establish oppositional alternative synthetic or complimentary models relating jewish religion to his theory of natural selection this book examines a range of leading nineteenth and early twentieth century american progressive jewish thinkers with the primary focus being rabbis kohler wise hirsch krauskopf and hahn although many others are covered key themes include the widespread commitment to universal evolutionism that is the application of biological evolutionary theory to other realms e g history religion cosmic and the particular fascination with the evolution of ethical systems within human societies bearing in mind mankind s bestial origins and the new challenges for understanding religious authority and revelation it is argued that reform jewish discussions about the nature of god have been more profoundly shaped by engagement with evolutionary theory than has been recognized before and that evolutionary thought provides the key framework for understanding reform judaism itself the precise nature of jewish reform engagement with christian proponents of theistic evolution are important as are their interest in alternative evolutionists to darwin such as spencer and haeckel

this book collects twenty two previously published essays and one new one by erich s gruen who has written extensively on the literature and history of early judaism and the experience of the jews in the greco roman world his many articles on this subject have however appeared mostly in conference volumes and festschriften and have therefore not had wide circulation by putting them together in a single work this will bring the essays to the attention of a much broader scholarly readership and make them more readily available to students in the fields of ancient history and early judaism the pieces are quite varied but develop a number of connected and related themes jewish identity in the pagan world the literary representations by jews and pagans of one another the interconnections of hellenism and judaism and the jewish experience under hellenistic monarchies and the roman empire

coherent judaism begins by excavating the theologies within the torah and tracing their careers through the jewish enlightenment of the eighteenth century any compelling contemporary judaism must cohere as much as possible with traditional judaism and everything else we believe to be true about our world the challenge is that over the past two centuries our understandings of both the torah and nature have radically changed nevertheless much jewish wisdom can be translated into a contemporary idiom that both coheres with all that we believe and enriches our lives as individuals and within our

communities coherent judaism explains why pre modern judaism opted to privilege consensus around jewish behavior halakhah over belief the stresses of modernity have conspired to reveal the incoherence of that traditional approach in our post darwinian and post holocaust world theology must be able to withstand the challenges of science and history traditional jewish theologies have the resources to meet those challenges coherent judaism concludes by presenting a philosophy of halakhah that is faithful to the covenantal aspiration to live long on the land that the lord our god has given us

judaism is a religion and a way of life that combines beliefs as well as practical commandments and traditions encompassing all spheres of life some of the numerous precepts emerge directly from the torah the law of moses others are commanded by oral law rulings of illustrious jewish legal scholars throughout the generations and rabbinic responsa composed over hundreds of years and still being written today like other religions judaism has also developed unique symbols that have become virtually exclusive to it such as the star of david and the menorah this book argues that judaism impacts human geography in significant ways it shapes the environment and space of its believers thus creating a unique jewish geography

previous scholars have largely approached wisdom and torah in the second temple period through a type of reception history whereby the two concepts have been understood as signifiers of independent earlier biblical streams of tradition that later came together in the hellenistic and roman eras largely under the process of a so called torahization of wisdom recent studies critiquing the nature of wisdom and wisdom literature as operative categories for understanding scribal cultures in early judaism as well as newer approaches to conceptualizing torah and authorizing compositional practices related to the pentateuchal texts however have challenged the foundations on which the previous models of wisdom and torah rested this volume therefore brings together several essays that aim to reexamine and rethink the ways we can describe the developments of texts categorized as wisdom that proliferated during the second temple period and whose contents point to an engagement with a torah discourse by asking anew the question of whether wisdom was transformed by into torah during this period this volume offers reformulations on the discursive space between wisdom and torah through analyzing new identifications confluences and transformations

the book narrates the last days of the once prominent jewish community of thessaloniki the overwhelming majority of which was transported to the nazi death camp of auschwitz in 1943 focusing on the holocaust of the jews of thessaloniki this book maps the reactions of the authorities the church and the civil society as events unfolded in so doing it seeks to answer the questions did the christian society of their hometown stand up to their defense and did they try to undermine or object to the nazi orders utilizing new sources and interpretation schemes this book will be a great contribution to the local efforts underway seeking to reconcile thessaloniki with its jewish past and honour the victims of the holocaust the first study to examine why 95 percent of the jews of thessaloniki perished one of the highest percentages in europe this book will appeal to students and scholars of

the holocaust european history and jewish studies recipient of the 2021 vashem yad international book prize for holocaust research in view of the important contribution that this study makes to the understanding of the holocaust in thessaloniki in particular and more broadly in greece the international committee for the yad vashem book prize decided to award the 2021 prize to dr leon saltiel

some two thousand years ago as the story goes a rabbi named yochanan makes the epitome of pragmatic gambles wagering the entire fate of the jewish people in dialogue with the soon to be roman emperor vespasian yochanan tacitly acknowledges the romans planned destruction of jerusalem in return for a plot of land in a town called yavneh there after the razing of jerusalem jews will join with their teacher to reenvision a new judaism one not based on temple rites but on real life in exile laying the groundwork for today s vibrant judaism in rabbi marc katz s novel examination pragmatism is itself an authentic jewish strategy for addressing moral questions the rabbis of the talmud model the process by demonstrating how to think situationally weigh competing values and make hard compromises leading rabbis ask what will work alongside what is right they birth a malleable and nuanced system of law halakhah that is faithful to their received tradition and to the people and circumstances before them by investigating how the rabbis navigate their own ethical challenges determining truth upholding compromise convincing others keeping peace with neighbors avoiding infighting weighing sinning in hopes of promoting a greater good yochanan s gamble forges a new jewish path forward for resolving moral conundrums in our day

in the sixteenth century the famous kabbalist isaac luria transmitted a secret trove of highly complex mystical practices to a select groups of students these meditations were designed to capitalize on sleep and death states in order to effectively split one s soul into multiple parts and which when properly performed permitted the adept to free oneself from the cycle of rebirth through an in depth analysis of these contemplative practices within the broader context of lurianic literature zvi ish shalom guides us on a penetrating scholarly journey into a realm of mystical teachings and practices never before available in english illuminating a radically monistic vision of reality at the heart of kabbalistic metaphysics and practice

the present book is a sequel to ephraim chamiel s two previous works the middle way and the dual truth studies dedicated to the middle trend in modern jewish thought that is those positions that sought to combine tradition and modernity and offered a variety of approaches for contending with the tension between science and revelation and between reason and religion the present book explores contemporary jewish thinkers who have adopted one of these integrated approaches namely the dialectical approach some of these thinkers maintain that the aforementioned tension the rift within human consciousness between intellect and emotion mind and heart can be mended others however think that the dialectic between the two poles of this tension is inherently irresolvable a view reminiscent of the medieval dual truth approach some thinkers are unclear on this point and those who study them debate whether or not they successfully

resolved the tension and offered a means of reconciliation the author also offers his views on these debates this book explores the dialectical approaches of ray kook ray soloveitchik rabbi abraham joshua heschel samuel hugo bergman leo strauss ernst simon emil fackenheim rabbi mordechai breuer his uncle isaac breuer tamar ross rabbi shagar moshe meir micah goodman and elchanan shilo it also discusses the interpretations of these thinkers offered by scholars such as michael rosenak avinoam rosenak eliezer schweid aviezer ravitzky avi sagi binyamin ish shalom ehud luz dov schwartz rabbi yuval cherlow lawrence kaplan and haim rechnitzer the author questions some of these approaches and offers ideas of his own this study concludes that many scholars bore witness to the dialectical tension between reason and revelation only some believed that a solution was possible that being said and despite the paradoxical nature of the dual truth approach which maintains that two contradictory truths exist and we must live with both of them in this world until a utopian future or the advent of the messiah increasing numbers of thinkers today are accepting it in doing so they are eschewing delusional and apologetic views such as the identicality and compartmental approaches that maintain that tensions and contradictions are unacceptable

moving away from focusing on wisdom as a literary genre this book delves into the lived embodied and formative dimensions of wisdom as they are delineated in jewish sources from the persian hellenistic and early roman eras considering a diverse body of texts beyond later canonical boundaries the book demonstrates that wisdom features not as an abstract quality but as something to be performed and exercised at both the individual and community level the analysis specifically concentrates on notions of a wise person including the rise of the sage as an exemplary figure it also looks at how ancestral figures and contemporary teachers are imagined to manifest and practice wisdom and considers communal portraits of a wise and virtuous life in so doing the author demonstrates that the previous focus on wisdom as a category of literature has overshadowed significant questions related to wisdom behaviour and social life jewish wisdom is also contextualized in relation to its wider ancient mediterranean milieu making the book valuable for biblical scholars classicists scholars of religion and the ancient near east and theologians

thematically organized essays discuss topics including the spaces where jews lived worked and worshiped jewish languages and literatures ethnicities and identities and questions about gender and the body central to jewish culture and judaism offering original scholarship and fresh insights on late ancient jewish history and culture this unique volume offers a one volume exploration of second temple greco roman and rabbinic periods and sources explores jewish life across most of the geographic places where jews or judaeans were known to have lived features original maps of areas cited in every essay including maps of jewish settlement throughout late antiquity includes an outline of major historical events further readings and full references a companion to late ancient jews and judaism 3rd century bce 7th century ce is a valuable resource for students instructors and scholars of jewish studies religion literature and ethnic identity as well as general readers with interest in jewish history world religions classics and late antiquity

one cannot think of judaism without taking some stance relating to israel s special status its election the present collection highlights the challenges that judaism faces as it continues to uphold a sense of chosenness and as it seeks to engage the world beyond it nations as well as religions the challenge is captured by the dual implication of election divine love on the one hand and enmity with others on the other israel s election mission and vocation are played out within this tension of love grounded in god and extending to humanity and the opposite of love as this finds expression in israel s relations with others israel must work out the purpose of its election and its realization in history in the tension between these two extremes this challenge takes on great urgency in the context of advances in interfaith relations these lead us to reflect on the meaning of israel s election as part of developing a contemporary jewish theology of world religions
