shakespeares works do not embody any doctrine or set of beliefs as his critics have long been tempted to suggest but they do stage encounters with certain kinds of thinking ethical political epistemological even metaphysical that still concern us nowadays they can be shown to draw on ancient philosophies platonism stoicism scepticism either directly or through medieval and continental renaissance thought or their scenarios can be likened to those of other kinds of intellectual argument such as legal or theological discourse the essays collected in this volume demonstrate the value of thinking with shakespeare either as embodied in Shakespeares own creative programme or in our use of philosophical paradigms as an approach to his works the contributors are colin burrow terence cave gabriel josipovoci

judith h anderson conceives the intertext as a relation between or among texts that

encompasses both kristevan intertextuality and traditional relationships of influence imitation allusion and citation like the internet the intertext is a state or place of potential expressed in ways ranging from deliberate emulation to linguistic free play relatedly the intertext is also a convenient fiction that enables examination of individual agency and sociocultural determinism anderson s intertext is allegorical because spenser s faerie queene is pivotal to her study and because allegory understood as continued or moving metaphor encapsulates even as it magnifies the process of signification her title signals the variousness of an intertext extending from chaucer through shakespeare to milton and the breadth of allegory itself literary allegory in anderson s view is at once a mimetic form and a psychic one a process thinking that combines mind with matter emblem with narrative abstraction with history anderson s first section focuses on relations between chaucer s canterbury tales and spenser s the faerie queene including the role of the narrator the nature of the textual source the dynamics of influence and the bearing of allegorical narrative on lyric vision the second centers on agency and cultural influence in a variety of spenserian and medieval texts allegorical form a recurrent concern throughout becomes the pressing issue of section three this section treats plays and poems of shakespeare and milton and includes two intertextually relevant essays on spenser how paradise lost or shakespeare s plays participate in allegorical form is controversial spenser s experiments with allegory revise its form and this intervention is largely what shakespeare and milton find in his poetry and develop anderson s book the result of decades of teaching and writing about allegory especially spenserian allegory will reorient thinking about fundamental critical issues and the landmark texts in which they play themselves out

for jews and christians in antiquity beliefs about demons were integral to their reflections on fundamental theological questions but what kind of being did they consider demons to be to what extent were they thought to be embodied were demons thought of as physical entities or merely as metaphors for social and psychological realities what is the relation between demons and the hypostatization of abstract concepts fear impurity etc and baleful phenomenon such as disease these are some of the questions that this volume addresses by focussing on the nature and characteristics of demons what one might call demonic ontology

authentikos logos nhc vi 3 also known as authoritative teaching is a little studied story of a soul s descent and ascent in the nag hammadi library with her book ulla tervahauta fills a gap in the scholarship and provide the first monograph length study that has this writing as its primary focus the aim is to find a place and context for authentikos logos within early christianity but tervahauta also adds new insight into the scholarship of the nag hammadi library and study of early christianity contrary to the usual discussion of the nag hammadi writings from the viewpoint of gnostic studies she argues that authentikos logos is best approached from the context of christian traditions of late ancient egypt between the third and the fifth centuries tervahauta discusses the story of the soul s journey in light of various

christian and platonic writings also she analyses the relationship of authentikos logos with the valentinian wisdom myth and suggests that no firm evidence connects the writing closely with valentinian traditions and although a platonic mind set can be assumed the writing combines motifs in a unique manner for example the four epithets used in the writing the invisible soul the pneumatic soul the material soul and the rational soul are not found thus combined elsewhere discussion of matter hyle is connected with christian scriptural allusions and the focus is on ethics and the evilness of matter the body on the other hand is the soul s place of contest and progress the pauline term pneumatic body 1 cor 15 44 is used allusively and from a platonic perspective with this book ulla tervahauta makes an important contribution to the study of early christianity in late ancient egypt by discussing a writing that shows knowledge and creative combination of literary traditions that circulated in late ancient egypt

this book examines the method of meditative reading encouraged by john cassian c 360 435 in his ascetic writings the bulk of which are fictive dialogues that purportedly record the instruction he had received from egyptian christian monks this instruction was at its core an interactive experience depending upon both the discernment of the master and diligent application of instruction by the student driver examines cassian s understanding of the act of reading and suggests the implications of this for cassian s monastic teaching and it interprets cassian s method of reading in light of contemporary discussions of reading and the self

anderson succeeds in neatly fitting together selected pieces of the history of discernment of spirits to provide a valuable readable description of the contours of its evolution in the late middle ages debra l stoudt virginia polytechnic institute and state university the medieval review late medieval christians lived in a world of visions but they knew that not all visions came from god angels demons illness nature or passion could also inspire an apparent divine visitation during the thirteenth and fourteenth centuries the involvement of visionaries in everything from reform movements to military campaigns to papal schisms raised the political and spiritual stakes of determining whether or not a vision was truly from god in response a diverse group of medieval thinkers including men and women clergy and laity visionaries and theologians gradually began to transform the loose patristic readings of pauline discretio spirituum into a system with the potential to distinguish between true and false visions and between genuine and delusional visionaries wendy love anderson chronicles the historical political and spiritual struggles behind the flowering of late medieval mysticism and what came to be seen as the christian doctrine of discernment of spirits

will love examines four of shakespeare s love plays romeo and juliet troilus and cressida twelfth night and antony and cleopatra in light of the augustinian psychology at the heart of the theological romance tradition this tradition which shakespeare inherits from medieval

theologian poets such as boethius dante petrarch and chaucer issues from the idea initially expressed by augustine in his confessions that love functions as volitional weight as a kind of magnetism or almost gravitational force that it moves the lover in mysterious ways yet without diminishing his or her agency will love highlights shakespeare s conception of love in terms of motion and explores the metaphysical ethical psychological and dramatic implications of his doing so

in his analysis marvin rosenberg sets out to steer a path between the extremes of rome and egypt and all they stand for and to explore the relentless to and back confrontation of their different sets of values which leads ultimately to destruction

in the fourth century the deserts of egypt became the nerve center of a radical new movement what we now call monasticism groups of christians from illiterate peasants to learned intellectuals moved out to the wastelands beyond the Nile valley and in the famous words of saint athanasius made the desert a city in so doing they captured the imagination of the ancient world they forged techniques of prayer and asceticism of discipleship and spiritual direction that have remained central to christianity ever since seeking to map the soul s long journey to god and plot out the subtle vagaries of the human heart they created and inspired texts that became classics of western spirituality these desert christians were also brilliant storytellers some of christianity s finest this book introduces the literature of early monasticism it examines all the best known works including athanasius life of antony the lives of pachomius and the so called sayings of the desert fathers later chapters focus on two pioneers of monastic theology evagrius ponticus the first great theoretician of christian mysticism and john cassian who brought egyptian monasticism to the latin west along the way readers are introduced to path breaking discoveries to new texts and recent archeological finds that have revolutionized contemporary scholarship on monastic origins

included are fascinating snippets from papyri and from little known coptic syriac and ethiopic texts interspersed in each chapter are illustrations maps and diagrams that help readers sort through the key texts and the richly textured world of early monasticism geared to a wide audience and written in clear jargon free prose desert christians offers the most comprehensive and accessible introduction to early monasticism

offering fuller understandings of both dramatic representations and the complexities of religious culture this collection reveals the ways in which religion and performance were inextricably linked in early modern england its readings extend beyond the interpretation of straightforward religious allusions and suggest new avenues for theorizing the dynamic relationship between religious representations and dramatic ones by addressing the particular ways in which commercial drama adapted the sensory aspects of religious experience to its own symbolic systems the volume enacts a methodological shift towards a more nuanced semiotics of theatrical performance covering plays by a wide range of dramatists including shakespeare individual essays explore the material conditions of performance the intricate resonances between dramatic performance and religious ceremonies and the multiple valences of religious references in early modern plays additionally religion and drama in early modern england reveals the theater s broad interpretation of post reformation christian practice as well as its engagement with the religions of islam judaism and paganism

as the first monk in the desert antony became an early christian superstar eclipsing his many ascetic predecessors the introduction of asceticism into the wilderness also represented an encounter between christian and hellenistic ideas for centuries greeks had considered the uncultivated geography intrinsically primordial a chaotic place where man struggled to remain human the wilderness represented an eternal ordeal where man always faced fierce beasts disorder and death but also where simultaneously he could attain boundless wealth wisdom and even physical immortality through athanasius of alexandria s fourth century biography of antony we learn how the christian appropriation of greek ideas on geography bodies and immortality raised asceticism to an entirely new level placed in his uncultivated landscape antony became a true martyr an athlete of god and a holy man able to retrieve the bodily incorruptibility lost in the fall which all christians could look forward to at the end of times in this way athanasius employed a traditional greek worldview to demonstrate the superiority of christianity over paganism which never promised ordinary people anything but an eternal existence as dead and disembodied souls

the ladder of divine ascent the work of an otherwise shadowy figure john climacus meaning of the ladder abbot of st catherine s sinai ca 579 649 ce is one of the most popular and enduring classics of greek ascetic spiritual direction hailed as the great synthesis of early ascetic writings the ladder presents a spirituality self consciously rooted in the literary and theological tradition of the desert fathers and the great old men of gaza despite its incredible popularity among monastic and lay readers the ladder is virtually unknown in scholarship in this work jonathan l zecher offers a sustained study of the ladder s spiritual vision which is contextualized within an equally sustained genealogical survey of climacus own tradition the ladder is built up through the memory of death a term referring to admonitions of early authors to remember one s inevitable but unknowable death and to contemplate the divine judgment which would follow to cultivate particular ascetic christian lifestyles in their readers in the literature that formed climacus every aspect of the memory of death varied considerably but climacus draws these together in the ladder so that death and the judgment which follows defines a symbolic framework within which monks reflect on their past and approach the future climacus also took up metaphorical practices of dying to oneself and others to craft an idea of spiritual progress in the imitation of christ taking into account failure and frailty at the heart of this study is the abiding question of how tradition forms and in the ladder is an outstanding example of how unflinching fidelity to tradition results in a creative synthetic achievement

guide christians in the other articulated by urban christian leaders in contest with one another angels were morally stable characters described in the emerging canon of scripture available to enable readers to render scripture coherent with emerging theological positions muehlberger goes on to show how these two discourses did not remain isolated in separate spheres of cultivation and contestation but influenced one another and the wider christian culture she offers in depth analysis of popular biographies written in late antiquity of the community standards of emerging monastic communities and of the training programs developed to prepare christians to participate in ritual demonstrating that new ideas about angels shaped and directed the formation of the definitive institutions of late antiquity angels in late ancient christianity is a meticulous and thorough study of early christian ideas about angels but it also offers a different perspective on late ancient christian history arguing that angels were central rather than peripheral to the emergence of christian institutions and christian culture in late antiquity
