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the study shows in chronological fashion how african women writers in the past five decades have introduced a new autobiographical discourse around their experience of excision bringing nuance and vitality to the fgm debate

like the bestsellers princess and not without my daughter do they hear you when you cry tells the dramatic compulsively readable story of a woman fighting to free herself from the injustices of her culture fauziya kassindja s harrowing story begins in togo africa where she enjoyed a sheltered childhood shielded by her progressive father from the tribal practice of polygamy and genital mutilation but when her father died in 1993 fauziya s life changed dramatically at the age of seventeen she was forced to marry a man she barely knew who already had three wives and prepare for the tribal ritual practice of genital mutilation a practice that is performed without painkillers or antibiotics but hours before the ritual was to take place fauziya s sister helped her escape to germany and from there she travelled to the united states seeking asylum and freedom instead she was stripped shackled and imprisoned for sixteen months by the immigration and naturalization service enter layli miller bashir a twenty three year old law student who took on fauziya s case when the two women met layli found a broken emaciated girl with whom she forged an extraordinary friendship putting her heart into fauziya s case layli enlisted help from the american university international human rights clinic the clinic s acting director karen musalo an expert in refugee law assembled a team to fight on fauziya s behalf ultimately in a landmark decision that has given hope to many seeking asylum on the grounds of gender based persecution fauziya was granted asylum on 13 june 1996 here for the first time is fauziya s dramatic personal story told in her own words vividly detailing her life as a young woman in togo and her nightmarish day to day existence in american prisons it is a story of faith and freedom courage and inspiration one that you will not easily forget

forsaken females describes the varied types of violence women experience throughout the life course from female infanticide and genital mutilation to sexual slavery and trafficking from a truly global perspective the book illuminates the diverse ideologies and cultural conditions that condone and perpetuate such brutality against women in their own compelling words women describe their personal experiences victimization and horrors this book also addresses the physical emotional and economic impact of such violence and each chapter concludes with examples of promising policies and practices developed to address and reduce violence against women book jacket

this extraordinary memoir details the monumental journey of one young gambian woman from survivor of fgm and forced child marriage to global activist and political leader who became un women s first goodwill ambassador for africa one of time magazine s 100 most influential people and among the youngest people nominated for the nobel peace prize on the wedding night of her first arranged marriage fifteen year old jaha learned that she had undergone female genital mutilation fgm as an infant that painful discovery coupled with her experiences with a second arranged marriage set jaha on her path as an activist a courageous mission that would require her to brave hostility in her community and family and even attempts on her

life despite the challenges and with ever growing determination jaha founded safe hands for girls an organization that succeeded in having fgm banned in gambia she is now working to eradicate fgm and forced child marriage worldwide by 2030 and running to be the next president of the gambia i will scream to the world recounts jaha s ongoing uphill journey to be seen as a survivor activist but most of all as a human she dives into her childhood to show the root causes of her crusading shares her personal and professional life and explores as only a survivor can a practice that while violent and troubling is often culturally misunderstood above all jaha s unflinchingly honest memoir is a story of resilience and extraordinary fearlessness of the strength that comes with learning to love oneself and of the power within everyone to create meaningful and lasting change

having ovaries unabashed gutsy feisty playful challenging full of chutzpah mettlesome naughty victorious straight from the hip full flavored outrageous righteous loving inspiring bold as brass self assured self confident self possessed daring heroic wild wanton crazy optimistic unflappable pushy unstoppable impressive rebellious kick ass carefree having moxie having heart having no fear that takes balls are words of praise usually reserved for a man who has done something tough fearless and maybe a little crazy someone who pushes the boundaries or breaks a few rules but when it comes to hotheaded courage impassioned activism quirky wisdom or bold confrontation women have got what it takes and then some that takes ovaries is a lively fun and often touching celebration of women and girls doing their thing their way kathleen who reduced a would be burglar to tears by lecturing him about black pride all while standing in her underwear elaine a sky surfer who plunges from airplanes on a 30 inch surfboard rachel a high school junior who organized 100 high school girls to take on the boys who harassed them denise a teenage cashier who faced down an irate gun wielding gangbanger in an inner city fast food joint joani a public health educator who opened the country s first women oriented sex toys store eva who made the dangerous illegal journey from central america to the united states in order to give her children a better life now that takes ovaries

while scouting locations for a film documentary on arizona s apache wars private investigator lena jones and oscar winning director warren quinn discover the mutilated body of a young girl the gruesome manner of the child s death evokes memories of lena s own rough childhood defying the local law lena investigates the child s death and uncovers a small town with a big secret founded by the descendants of pioneers who fought geronimo los perdidos now holds a significant population of documented and undocumented foreign born residents who live and work at a modern plant lena senses a sinister force at work in the town but where when two more girls disappear from los perdidos lena is tempted to implement some frontier justice of her own to battle a cruel and ancient practice

u s foreign policy and muslim women s human rights explores the integration of american concerns about women s human rights into u s policy toward islamic countries since 1979 reframing u s islamic relations and challenging assumptions about the drivers of american foreign policy

to the western eye there is something jarringly incongruous even shocking about the image of a six year old girl being held down by loving relatives so that her genitals can be cut yet two million girls experience this each year most westerners upon learning of the

practice of female circumcision have responded with outrage those committed to improving the status of women have gone beyond outrage to action by creating various programs for eradicating the practice but few understand the real life complexities families face in deciding whether to follow the traditional practices or to take the risk of change in the female circumcision controversy ellen gruenbaum points out that western outrage and western efforts to stop genital mutilation often provoke a strong backlash from people in the countries where the practice is common she looks at the validity of western arguments against the practice in doing so she explores both outsider and insider perspectives on female circumcision concentrating particularly on the complex attitudes of the individuals and groups who practice it and on indigenous efforts to end it gruenbaum finds that the criticisms of outsiders are frequently simplistic and fail to appreciate the diversity of cultural contexts the complex meanings and the conflicting responses to change drawing on over five years of fieldwork in sudan where the most severe forms of genital surgery are common gruenbaum shows that the practices of female circumcision are deeply embedded in sudanese cultural traditions in religious moral and aesthetic values and in ideas about class ethnicity and gender her research illuminates both the resistance to and the acceptance of change she shows that change is occurring as the result of economic and social developments the influences of islamic activists the work of sudanese health educators and the efforts of educated african women that does not mean that there is no role for outsiders gruenbaum asserts and she offers suggestions for those who wish to help facilitate change by presenting specific cultural contexts and human experiences with a deep knowledge of the tremendous variation of the practice and meaning of female circumcision gruenbaum provides an insightful analysis of the process of changing this complex highly debated practice

this volume features a collection of papers from the second annual intercultural horizons conference held in october 2012 in new york city usa the 2012 conference was the second in what is becoming an annual series of meetings and the present volume therefore is a companion to one issued last year by cambridge scholars publishing intercultural horizons best practices in intercultural competence development 2012 the papers included in this volume reflect a diversity of approaches both to intercultural education in the north american setting and to its application in service learning and related contexts in diverse cultural settings in other nations our authors provide faculty and student perspectives primarily from the level of postsecondary education but including a look as well at intercultural education at the primary level many of the papers focus in one way or another on issues of curriculum teaching and learning in relation to developing intercultural competence in students in north american colleges and universities particularly though not exclusively through the use of service learning all of the papers touch in one way or another on another important development now affecting almost all institutions of higher education in north america and increasingly in other nations worldwide that of the university's engagement with the community during the past thirty years such engagement has moved from the periphery to the core of many north american colleges and universities similar efforts are now emerging among many asian universities and in europe as well the paper in this volume on the polisocial initiative at the politecnico di milano in italy is a good example of how the theme of university community engagement is taking hold in a city and nation facing similar intercultural and economic challenges to those in north america and serves as a

this book offers critical perspectives on global literacies connecting research theory and practice an emerging concept in the literacy field many scholars agree on the need for students to develop global literacies yet few agree on a widely accepted definition based on a synthesis of the literature the editors formulate a definition of global literacies with four dimensions including literacy as a human right in all nations around the world critical reading and creation of multimodal texts about global issues intercultural communication and reciprocal collaboration with globally diverse others and transformative action for social and environmental justice that traverses borders taking this shared proposed definition as a starting point the chapters then offer contextualized examples of global literacies from k 12 and teacher education classrooms to make explicit links between research and practice the contributors interact with and interrogate the book's definition of global literacies using a common framework of critical theory as such this book provides both emerging and established scholars with critical frameworks for positioning global literacies in ways that are relevant dynamic and forward thinking

this volume features a collection of papers from the first annual intercultural horizons conference held in may 2011 in siena italy the 2011 conference was entitled best practices in intercultural competence development and featured speakers and participants from over 15 countries including leaders in the field such as janet bennett of the intercultural communication institute alvino fantini of the school for international training andrew furco of the university of minnesota and carol ma of the center for service learning at lingnan university hong kong the authors of these papers provide perspectives on intercultural communication and related issues from viewpoints as varied as the traditional researcher the teacher in fields as diverse as second language acquisition music and the culinary arts and the administrator of a specific program or at the senior level of a college or university together they form a representative sample of the themes discussed during the 2011 conference the editors consider this first meeting to be the dawn so to speak of intercultural horizons which aspires to become a respected venue for scholars and practitioners to exchange ideas techniques and pedagogies on intercultural communication in years to come

studying postcolonial literatures in english can and indeed should

make a human rights activist of the reader there is after all any amount of evidence to show the injustices and inhumanity thrown up by processes of decolonization and the struggle with past legacies and present corruptions yet the human rights aspect of postcolonial literary studies has been somewhat marginalized by scholars preoccupied with more fashionable questions of theory the present collection seeks to redress this neglect whereby the definition of human rights adopted is intentionally broad the volume reflects the human rights situation in many countries from mauritius to new zealand from the cameroon to canada it includes a focus on the malawian writer jack mapanje the contributors concerns embrace topics as varied as denotified tribes in india female genital mutilation in africa native residential schools in canada political violence in northern ireland the south african truth and reconciliation commission and the discourse of the treaty of waitangi the editors hope that the very variety of responses to the invitation to reflect on questions of literature and human rights will both stimulate further discussion and prompt action contributors are edward o ako hilarious n ambe ken arvidson jogamaya bayer maggie ann bowers chandra chatterjee lindsey collen g n devy james gibbs j u jacobs karen king aribisala sindiwe magona lee maracle stuart marlow don mattera wumi raji lesego rampolokeng dieter riemenschneider ahmed saleh jamie s scott mark shackleton johannes a smit peter o stummer robert sullivan rajiva wijesinha chantal zabus

explores the role of women s status bodies and sexuality in global conflicts women s bodies have become a battleground around the world people argue about veiling schooling for afghan girls and slutwalk protests all of which involve issues of women s sexuality and freedom globalization with its emphasis on human rights and individuality heats up these arguments in of virgins and martyrs david jacobson takes the reader on a fascinating tour of how self identity developed throughout history and what individualism means for muslim societies struggling to maintain a sense of honor in a globalized twenty first century some patriarchal societies have come to see women s control of their own sexuality as a threat to a way of life that goes back thousands of years many trace their lineage to tribal cultures that were organized around the idea that women s virginity represents the honor of male relatives and the good of the community at large anyone or anything that influences women to the contrary is considered a corrupting and potentially calamitous force jacobson analyzes the connection between tribal patriarchy and muslim radicalism through an innovative tool the tribal patriarchy index this index helps to illuminate why women s sexuality dress and image so compel militant muslim outrage and sometimes violent action revealing a deeper human story of how women s status defines competing moral visions of society and why this present clash is erupting with such ferocity

a kenyan woman theologian examines arguments for and against the controversial practice of female circumcision based on interviews with 50 kenyan women representing christianity islam african initiated churches and traditional religion wangila emphasizes the importance of understanding the gender relationships and cultural beliefs behind the practice and the important role played by religion wangila calls for eradication of the practice to carefully designed educational efforts sensitive to religious and cultural beliefs

women filing gender based asylum claims long faced skepticism and outright rejection within the united states immigration system despite erratic progress the united states still fails to recognize gender as an established category for experiencing persecution gender exists in a sort of limbo segregated from other aspects of identity and experience sara l mckinnon exposes racialized rhetorics of violence in politics and charts the development of gender as a category in american asylum law starting with the late 1980s when gender based requests first emerged in case law mckinnon analyzes gender and sexuality related cases against the backdrop of national and transnational politics her focus falls on cases as diverse as guatemalan and salvadoran women sexually abused during the dirty wars and transgender asylum seekers from around the world fleeing brutally violent situations she reviews the claims evidence testimony and message strategies that unfolded in these legal arguments and decisions and illuminates how legal decisions turned gender into a political construct vulnerable to american national and global interests she also explores myriad related aspects of the process including how subjects are racialized and the effects of that racialization and the consequences of policies that position gender as a signifier for women via normative assumptions about sex and heterosexuality wide ranging and rich with human detail gendered asylum uses feminist immigration and legal studies to engage one of the hotly debated issues of our time

according to susan deller ross many human rights advocates still do not see women s rights as human rights yet women in many countries suffer from laws practices customs and cultural and religious norms that consign them to a deeply inferior status advocates might conceive of human rights as involving torture extrajudicial killings or cruel and degrading treatment all clearly in violation of international human rights and think those issues irrelevant to women yet is female genital mutilation practiced on millions of young girls and even infants not a gross violation of human rights when a family decides to murder a daughter in the name of honor is that not an extrajudicial killing when a husband rapes or savagely beats his wife knowing the legal authorities will take no action on her behalf is that not cruel and degrading treatment women s human rights is the first human rights casebook to focus specifically on women s human rights rich with interdisciplinary material the book advances the study of the deprivation and violence women suffer due to discriminatory laws religions and customs that deny them their most fundamental freedoms it also provides present and future lawyers the legal tools for change demonstrating how human rights treaties can be used to obtain new laws and court decisions that protect women against discrimination with respect to employment land ownership inheritance subordination in marriage domestic violence female genital mutilation polygamy child marriage and the denial of reproductive rights ross examines international and regional human rights treaties in depth including treaty language and the jurisprudence and general interpretive guidelines developed by human rights bodies by studying how international human rights law has been and can be implemented at the domestic level through local courts and legislatures readers will understand how to call upon these newly articulated human rights to help bring about legislation court decisions and executive action that protect women from human rights violations
