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a leading theorist on literature and media reveals a new and productive aspect of benjamin s thought by focusing on the critical suffix ability that benjamin so tellingly deploys in his work the result is an illuminating perspective on benjamin s thought by way of his language

this open access book examines children s participation in dialectical reciprocity with place based institutional practices by presenting empirical research from australia brazil china poland norway and wales underpinned by cultural historical theory the analysis reveals how outdoors and nature form unique conditions for children s play formal and informal learning and cultural formation the analysis also surfaces how inequalities exist in societies and communities which often limit and constrain families and children s access to and participation in outdoor spaces and nature the findings highlight how institutional practices are shaped by pedagogical content teachers training institutional regulations and societal perceptions of nature children and suitable sustainable education for young children due to crises such as climate change and the recent pandemic specific focus on the outdoors and nature in cultural formation is timely for the cultural historical theoretical tradition in doing so the book provides empirical and theoretical support for policy makers researchers educators and families to enhance increase and sustain outdoor and nature education

in benjamin s library jane o newman offers for the first time in any language a reading of walter benjamin s notoriously opaque work origin of the german tragic drama that systematically attends to its place in discussions of the baroque in benjamin s day taking into account the literary and cultural contexts of benjamin s work newman recovers benjamin s relationship to the ideologically loaded readings of the literature and political theory of the seventeenth century baroque that abounded in germany during the political and economic crises of the weimar years to date the significance of the baroque for origin of the german tragic drama has been glossed over by students of benjamin most of whom have neither read it in this context nor engaged with the often incongruous debates about the period that filled both academic and popular texts in the years leading up to and following world war i armed with extraordinary historical bibliographical philological and orthographic research newman shows the extent to which benjamin participated in these debates by reconstructing the literal and figurative history of sixteenth and seventeenth century books that benjamin analyzes and the literary art historical and art theoretical and political theological discussions of the baroque with which he was familiar in so doing she challenges the exceptionalist even hagiographic approaches that have become common in benjamin studies the result is a deeply learned book that will infuse much needed life into the study of one of the most influential thinkers of the twentieth century

realism has been endowed with a certain orthodox status as the aesthetic counterpart of china's modernization and studies of chinese film history have largely accepted a master narrative of realism as the guiding aesthetic of mainland chinese cinema this book argues however that alternative aesthetics to realism have always existed in chinese cinema throughout its history from the early silent era to the new century the alternative aesthetics are closely linked to the indigenous chinese ontology of cinema namely shadowplay yingxi 影戏 the author presents an alternative account through a close examination of four distinct visual narrative and stylistic devices or themes that recur in different periods of chinese film history the dream representation the doubling of characters the device of self reflexivity and the allegorical construction of space by considering specific films and scenes as problematic sites where history politics and aesthetics collide this book also seeks to elucidate the relationship between cinema and the multifaceted experiences of chinese modernity with respect to subjectivity ideology identity and nationality this book will be of interest to scholars and students of chinese cinema's realism and modernism

the oxford handbook of carl schmitt collects thirty original chapters on the diverse oeuvre of one of the most controversial thinkers of the twentieth century carl schmitt 1888 1985 was a german theorist whose anti liberalism continues to inspire scholars and practitioners on both the left and the right despite schmitt's rabid anti semitism and partisan legal practice in nazi germany the appeal of his trenchant critiques of among other things aestheticism representative democracy and international law as well as of his theoretical justifications of dictatorship and rule by exception is undiminished uniquely located at the intersection of law the social sciences and the humanities this volume brings together sophisticated yet accessible interpretations of schmitt's sprawling thought and complicated biography the contributors hail from diverse disciplines including art law literature philosophy political science and history in addition to opening up exciting new avenues of research the oxford handbook of carl schmitt provides the intellectual foundations for an improved understanding of the political legal and cultural thought of this most infamous of german theorists a substantial introduction places the trinity of schmitt's thought in a broad context

this book explores the implications for today's critical concerns of the work of walter benjamin 1892 1940 one of the most powerful and influential thinkers of the 20th century

why play is a productive expressive way of being a form of understanding and a fundamental part of our well being what do we think about when we think about play a pastime games childish activities the opposite of work think again if we are happy and well rested we may approach even our daily tasks in a playful way taking the attitude of play without the activity of play so what then is play in play matters miguel sicart argues that to play is to be in the world playing is a form of understanding what surrounds us and a way of engaging with others play goes beyond games it is a mode of being human we play games but we also play with toys on playgrounds with technologies and design sicart proposes a theory of play that doesn't derive from a particular object or activity but is a portable tool for being not tied to objects but brought by people to the complex interactions that form their daily lives it is not separated from reality it

is part of it it is pleasurable but not necessarily fun play can be dangerous addictive and destructive along the way sicart considers playfulness the capacity to use play outside the context of play toys the materialization of play instruments but also play pals playgrounds play spaces that enable all kinds of play beauty the aesthetics of play through action political play from maradona s goal against england in the 1986 world cup to the hactivist activities of anonymous the political aesthetic and moral activity of game design and why play and computers get along so well

in this book alison ross engages in a detailed study of walter benjamin s concept of the image exploring the significant shifts in benjamin s approach to the topic over the course of his career using kant s treatment of the topic of sensuous form in his aesthetics as a comparative reference ross argues that benjamin s thinking on the image undergoes a major shift between his 1924 essay on goethe s elective affinities and his work on the arcades project from 1927 up until his death in 1940 the two periods of benjamin s writing share a conception of the image as a potent sensuous force able to provide a frame of existential meaning in the earlier period this function attracts benjamin s critical attention whereas in the later he mobilises it for revolutionary outcomes the book gives a critical treatment of the shifting assumptions in benjamin s writing about the image that warrant this altered view it draws on hermeneutic studies of meaning scholarship in the history of religions and key texts from the modern history

of aesthetics to track the reversals and contradictions in the meaning functions that benjamin attaches to the image in the different periods of his thinking above all it shows the relevance of a critical consideration of benjamin s writing on the image for scholarship in visual culture critical theory aesthetics and philosophy more broadly

literary theory flourished in central and eastern europe throughout the twentieth century but its relation to western literary scholarship is complex this book sheds light on the entangled histories of exchange and influence both within the region known as central and eastern europe and between the region and the west the exchange of ideas between scholars in the east and west was facilitated by both personal and institutional relations both official and informal encounters for the longest time however intellectual exchange was thwarted by political tensions that led to large parts of central and eastern europe being isolated from the west a few literary theories nevertheless made it into western scholarly discourses via exiled scholars some of these scholars such as mikhael bakhtin become widely known in the west and their thought was transposed onto new western cultural contexts others such as olga freidenberg were barely noticed outside of russian and poland this volume draws attention to the schools circles and

concepts that shaped the development of theory in central and eastern europe as well as the histoire croisée the history of translations transformations and migrations that conditioned its relationship with the west

benjamin has organised a reunion dinner with seven special guests during dinner they discover that under his usual gentleness and kindness benjamin hides a malaise and convince him to discuss it with them the discussion turns to the subject of the tragedy of life and everyone expresses his her view on how best to deal with boredom and pain which according to arthur schopenhauer undermine the pursuit of happiness benjamin enjoys the discussion and wakes up from his apathy and presents to his guests an idea for a new life arrangement

this book investigates the discursive practices of philosophy and theater performance on the basis of actual encounters between representatives of these two fields

media screens film video and computer screens have increasingly pervaded both artistic production and everyday life since the 1960s yet the nature of viewing artworks made from these media along with their subjective effects remains largely unexplored screens addresses this gap offering a historical and theoretical framework for understanding screen reliant installation art and the spectatorship it evokes examining a range of installations created over the past fifty years that investigate the rich terrain between the sculptural and the cinematic including works by artists such as eija liisa ahtila doug aitken peter campus dan graham valie export bruce nauman and michael snow kate mondloch traces the construction of screen spectatorship in art from the seminal film and video installations of the 1960s and 1970s to the new media artworks of today's digital culture mondloch identifies a momentous shift in contemporary art that challenges key premises of spectatorship brought about by technological objects that literally and metaphorically filter the subject's field of vision as a result she proposes that contemporary viewers are quite literally screen subjects and offers the unique critical leverage of art as an alternative way to understand media culture and contemporary visuality
