in terms of public opinion new religious movements are considered controversial for a variety of reasons their social organization often runs counter to popular expectations by experimenting with communal living alternative leadership roles unusual economic dispositions and new political and ethical values as a result the general public views new religions with a mixture of curiosity amusement and anxiety sustained by lavish media emphasis on oddness and tragedy rather than familiarity and lived experience this updated and revised second edition of controversial new religions offers a scholarly dispassionate look at those groups that have generated the most attention including some very well known classical groups like the family unification church scientology and jim jones s people s temple some relative newcomers such as the kabbalah centre the order of the solar temple branch davidians heaven s gate and the falun gong and some interesting cases like contemporary satanism the raelians black nationalism and various pagan groups each essay combines an overview of the history and beliefs of each organization or movement with original and insightful analysis by presenting decades of scholarly work on new religious movements written in an accessible form by established scholars as well as younger experts in the field this book will be an invaluable resource for all those who seek a view of new religions that is deeper than what can be found in sensationalistic media stories

the study of new religious movements nrms is one of the fastest growing areas of religious studies and since the release of the first edition of the oxford handbook of new religious movements in 2003 the field has continued to expand and break new ground in this all new volume james r lewis and inga b tøllefson bring together established and rising scholars to address an expanded range of topics covering traditional religious studies topics such as scripture charisma and ritual while also applying new theoretical approaches to nrm topics other chapters cover understudied topics in the field such as the developmental patterns of nrms and subcultural considerations in the study of nrms the first part of this book examines nrms from a social scientific perspective particularly that of sociology in the second section the primary factors that have put the study of nrms on the map controversy and conflict are considered the third section investigates common themes within the field of nrms while the fourth examines the approaches that religious studies researchers have taken to nrms as nrm

studies has grown subfields such as esotericism new age studies and neo pagan studies have grown as distinct and individual areas of study and the final section of the book investigates these emergent fields

when james r lewis one of the editors of the current collection first moved to norway in late 2009 he was unprepared to discover that so many researchers in nordic countries were producing innovative scholarship on new religions and on the new age subculture in fact over the past dozen years or so an increasingly disproportionate percentage of new religions scholars have arisen in nordic countries and teach at universities in denmark finland norway sweden and the baltic countries nordic new religions co edited with inga b tøllefson surveys this rich field of study in this area of the world focusing on the scholarship being produced by scholars in this region of northern europe

confused by end of the world readings or put off by the dense and mysterious imagery many readers hesitate to explore the book of revelation unveiling empire offers a new entree into this troubling and controversial book of the bible by examining the roots and social purposes of apocalyptic literature and revelations own use of traditional imagery in this way the authors provide readers with the tools for deciphering the texts message and its urgent applications for christians today living amidst a new kind of empire

americans have never been more religious than they are now at the dawn of the twenty first century by all reports attendance rates at traditional places of worship are high and rising the influx of new immigrant religions has revitalized standard faiths and drawn in those who had strayed from them popular television shows like the simpsons feature characters who go to church every sunday and speak to god special events like the 1998 outdoor mass in worcester massachusetts for a comatose girl believed to have miraculous powers attract thousands of people this collection is both part of this ferment and an intellectual reflection upon it religion and cultural studies features essays by major scholars from the fields of anthropology history literary criticism and religion in order to enrich critical discourse about religion and culture despite the variety of disciplines represented by this group of scholars and the variety of cultures explored in their essays from fifteenth century flemish

asceticism and nineteenth century african american spiritualism to russian blood libel trials and alien abduction reports in the twentieth century their common ground is the question of religion s place in current american academic analysis and more broadly in american life today the volume s range of vocabulary and subject matter is aimed at vitalizing scholarly interest in the field of religion and cultural studies and deepening intellectual inquiry in the contemporary academy the contributors are eytan bercovitch karen mccarthy brown gillian feeley harnik richard wightman fox jenny franchot giles gunn geoffrey galt harpham bruce b lawrence jack miles susan l mizruchi and jonathan z smith

this four volume work provides a detailed multicultural survey of established as well as new american religions and investigates the fascinating interactions between religion and ethnicity gender politics regionalism ethics and popular culture this revised and expanded edition of religion and american cultures tradition diversity and popular expression presents more than 140 essays that address contemporary spiritual practice and culture with a historical perspective the entries cover virtually every religion in modern day america as well as the role of religion in various aspects of u s culture readers will discover that americans aren t largely protestant catholic or jewish anymore and that the number of popular religious identities is far greater than many would imagine and although most americans believe in a higher power the fastest growing identity in the united states is the nones those americans who elect none when asked about their religious identity thereby demonstrating how many individuals see their spirituality as something not easily defined or categorized the first volume explores america s multicultural communities and their religious practices covering the range of different religions among anglo americans and euro americans as well as spirituality among latino african american native american and asian american communities the second volume focuses on cultural aspects of religions addressing topics such as film generation x public sacred spaces sexuality and new religious expressions the new third volume expands the range of topics covered with in depth essays on additional topics such as interfaith families religion in prisons belief in the paranormal and religion after september 11 2001 the fourth volume is devoted to complementary primary source documents

religions flourish everywhere around the planet shaping people s lives providing meaning and spiritual guidance in a perplexing world giving comfort in times of distress divided into 52 sections and grouped into four chapters religion a crash course takes a geographical approach it covers the ancient religions that emanate from the indian subcontinent such as hinduism buddhism and jainism through to the abrahamic faiths of the jews christians and muslims of arabia and europe the third section looks at the way indian religions found their way to china and japan mingling taoism confucianism and shinto finally the less well documented tribal religions of africa australasia and the americas are explored as well as recent phenomena in the new world the mormons rastafarians and pentecostalists

spirits of the space age details the historical emergence of the valley of the dawn a highly eclectic new religious movement known for its spectacular material culture and all encompassing aesthetics drawing on extensive ethnographic fieldwork kelly e hayes offers a narrative portrait of a new religious movement as seen in and through the lives of its founder aunt neiva her most important collaborators and contemporary adherents

utilizing contemporary scholarship on secularization individualism and consumer capitalism this book explores religious movements founded in the west which are intentionally fictional discordianism the church of all worlds the church of the subgenius and jediism their continued appeal and success principally in america but gaining wider audience through the 1980s and 1990s is chiefly as a result of underground publishing and the internet this book deals with immensely popular subject matter jediism developed from george lucas star wars films the church of the flying spaghetti monster founded by 26 year old student bobby henderson in 2005 as a protest against the teaching of intelligent design in schools discordianism and the church of the subgenius which retain strong followings and participation rates among college students the church of all worlds focus on gaia theology and environmental issues makes it a popular focus of attention the continued success of these groups of invented religions provide a unique opportunity to explore the nature of late post modern religious forms including the use of fiction as part of a bricolage for spirituality identity formation and personal orientation

cults examines the history and current status of cults across the united states europe and east asia focusing on the principal controversial religions and movements that have attracted major media attention the book also includes profiles of hundreds of minority religions from jesus people and rastafarians to voodoo practitioners and the human cloning raelians all the issues central to the practice and the fear of cults are examined apocalypticism deprogramming social isolation cults and the media the use and threat of violence child custody libel tax evasion solicitation and the techniques of persuasion and conviction as are the many charismatic cult leaders cults presents a comprehensive and authoritative reference offering a balanced view of the controversy surrounding these new religious movements assessing the movements themselves as well as the legal and governmental responses to them including attempts to quantify membership

especially his enigmatic analysis of the emergence mystical religion which presciently provides helpful insights into understanding the contemporary alternative religious milieu against sociologists such as bryan wilson and steve bruce this and the subsequent chapter argues that rather than being insignificant new forms of spirituality are actually proving to be a significant part of western re enchantment chapter 3 constructs a general theory of the re enchantment of the west chris partridge argues that western society is permeated by a broad occulture by which he means a reservoir of ideas beliefs theories and practices to which new religions unorthodox spiritualities film and popular music all draw attention this re enchantment of the west should not be seen as a superficial secondary development in the shadow of christianity in many ways it is a religious phenomenon in its own right partridge s arguments in this regard are well put and i warmly welcome this timely book mikhael rothstein university of copenhagen denmark

sometimes millennial expectations are expressed in peaceful ways other times millennialists become involved in violence the oxford handbook of millennialism begins with a section that examines four primary types of millennialism chapters in the next section examine key issues such as charismatic leadership use of scripture prophetic failure gender roles children tension with society and violence the rest of the book explores millennialism in a wide variety of places and times from ancient near eastern movements to contemporary apocalyptic and new age movements including the roles played by millennialism in national and international conflicts this handbook will be a valuable resource for scholars of religious studies sociology psychology history and new religious movements

one of the most influential theorists of religion jonathan z smith is best known for his analyses of religious studies as a discipline and for his advocacy and refinement of comparison as the basis for the history of religions relating religion gathers seventeen essays four of them never before published that together provide the first broad overview of smith s thinking since his seminal 1982 book imagining religion smith first explains how he was drawn to the study of religion outlines his own theoretical commitments and draws the connections between his thinking and his concerns for general education he then engages several figures and traditions that serve to define his interests within the larger setting of the discipline the essays that follow consider the role of taxonomy and classification in the study of religion the construction of difference and the procedures of generalization and redescription that smith takes to be key to the comparative enterprise the final

we live in an era of exploding scientific knowledge about the universe and our place and future within it much of this new knowledge conflicts with earlier wisdom and some has frightening implications cosmic evolution space exploration the search for extraterrestrial life and concerns about humanity's future prompt us to seek new answers to old existential questions where did we come from why are we here are we alone what will become of us in our search for answers we turn to science religion myth and varying combinations thereof exploring an ambiguous region between recognized findings and unfettered imagination Starstruck explores the multifaceted far reaching and often contentious attempts of people with contrasting worldviews to develop convincing and satisfying interpretations of rapidly accumulating discoveries in physics astronomy and biology

the book also covers the milestones in the history of alternative American religions from the infamous Salem witch trials and mass suicide murder at Jonestown to the positive ways in which these religions have affected racial relations and the empowerment of women book jacket

on February 28 1993 the United States Bureau of Alcohol Tobacco and Firearms BATF launched the largest assault in its history against a small religious community in central Texas one hundred agents armed with automatic and semi automatic weapons invaded the compound purportedly to execute a single search and arrest warrant the raid went badly four agents were killed and by the end of the day the settlement was surrounded by armored tanks and combat helicopters after a fifty one day standoff the United States Justice Department approved a plan to use CS gas against those barricaded inside whether by accident or plan tanks carrying the CS gas caused the compound to explode in fire killing all seventy four men women and children inside could the tragedy have been prevented was it

necessary for the batf agents to do what they did what could have been done differently armageddon in waco offers the most detailed wide ranging analysis of events surrounding waco leading scholars in sociology history law and religion explore all facets of the confrontation in an attempt to understand one of the most confusing government actions in american history the book begins with the history of the branch davidians and the story of its leader david koresh chapters show how the davidians came to trouble authorities why the group was labeled a cult and how authorities used unsubstantiated allegations of child abuse to strengthen their case against the sect the media s role is examined next in essays that considering the effect on coverage of lack of time and resources the orchestration of public relations by government officials the restricted access to the site or to countervailing evidence and the ideologies of the journalists themselves several contributors then explore the relation of violence to religion comparing waco to jonestown finally the role played by experts and consultants in defining such conflicts is explored by two contributors who had active roles as scholarly experts during and after the siege the legal and consitutional implications of the government s actions are also analyzed in balanced clearly written detail

this is a source of reliable information on the most important new and alternative religions covering history theology impact on the culture and current status it includes a chapter on the branch davidians

the label suicide cults has been applied to a wide variety of different alternative religions from jonestown to the solar temple to heaven s gate additionally observers have asked if such group suicides are in any way comparable to islamist suicide terrorism or to historical incidents of mass suicide such as the mass suicide of the ancient community of masada organizationally and ideologically diverse it turns out that the primary shared trait of these various groups is a common stereotype of religion as an irrational force that pushes fanatics to undertake acts of suicidal violence offering a valuable perspective on new religious movements and on religion and violence sacred suicide brings together contributions from a diverse range of international scholars of sociology religious studies and criminology

this book includes a collection of articles by leading researchers on the topic of religious contact in the study of religion resulting from the final conference of the käte hamburger kolleg dynamics in the history of religions one of the largest research initiatives in the interdisciplinary study of religion worldwide in recent years 2008 2020 this book encapsulates the twofold aim of this conference first to step back and reflect upon the merits and challenges of studying religious dynamics as a result of intra inter and extra religious contact and second to look beyond and pave ways for future approaches to study religion as a social phenomenon

apocalypse observed is about religious violence by analyzing five of the most notorious cults of

recent years the authors present a fascinating and revealing account of religious sects and conflict cults covered include the apocalypse at jonestown the branch davidians at waco the violent path of aum shinrikyo the mystical apocalypse of the solar temple the mass suicide of heaven's gate through comparative case studies and in depth analysis the authors show how religious violence can erupt not simply from the beliefs of the cult followers or the personalities of their leaders but also from the way in which society responds to the cults in its midst

conversion has been an important issue for most of the universal religions those usually associated with a founder such as christianity buddhism islam and judaism which have a mission to spread their message other religions have been less concerned with conversion except in so far as it has been a negative force for them to confront this study explores how conversion has been understood by different religions during different eras and includes a survey of the textual legal ritual historic and experiential dimensions of the phenomenon of conversion

christians wait for prayers to be answered for an afterlife in heaven for the virgin mary to appear and for god to speak they wait to be liberated from oppression to be saved or born again for easter morning to dawn for healing for conversion and for baptism waiting and the disappointment and hope that often accompany it are explained in terms that are at first glance remarkably invariant across christian traditions what will happen will happen on god's time a study of sources from across christian traditions shows that there is considerable complexity beneath this surface claim understandings of free will and personal agency alongside shifts in institutional and theological commitments change the ways waiting is understood and valued waiting is often considered a positive state to be endured as long as god wills and that fundamental understanding helps keep the promises at the heart of christianity alive scholars have long overlooked the problem and promise of waiting despite or perhaps because of its prevalence indeed there are relatively few mystics few who have undergone sudden conversion and few who have attained saintly status many however have waited and that problem remains prominent and its solutions remain influential in christian traditions today

the sage encyclopedia of the sociology of religion takes a look at the role of religion in society unpacking and evaluating the significance of religion in and on human history and tracing and outlining the social forces and influences that shape religion

the twentieth century was a period of rapid change for religion secularisation resulted in a dramatic fall in church attendance in the west and the 1950s and 1960s saw the introduction of new religions including the international society for krishna consciousness iskcon the church of scientology and the children of god new religions were regarded with suspicion by society in general and religious studies scholars alike until the 1990s when the emergence of a second generation of new new

religions based on popular cultural forms including films novels computer games and comic books and highly individualistic spiritualities confirmed the utter transformation of the religio spiritual landscape indeed scientology and iskcon appeared almost traditional and conservative when compared to the radically de institutionalised eclectic parodic fun loving and experimental fiction based invented and hyper real religions in this book scholarly treatments of cutting edge religious and spiritual trends are brought into conversation with contributions by representatives of dudeism the church of all worlds the temple of the jedi order and tolkien spirituality groups this book will simultaneously entertain shock challenge and delight scholars of religious studies as well as those with a wider interest in new religious movements

a significant number of americans spend their weekends at ufo conventions hearing whispers of government cover ups at new age gatherings learning the keys to enlightenment or ambling around historical downtowns learning about resident ghosts in tourist targeted ghost walks they have been fed a steady diet of fictional shows with paranormal themes such as the x files supernatural and medium shows that may seek to simply entertain but also serve to disseminate paranormal beliefs the public hunger for the paranormal seems insatiable paranormal america provides the definitive portrait of americans who believe in or have experienced such phenomena as ghosts bigfoot ufos psychic phenomena astrology and the power of mediums however unlike many books on the paranormal this volume does not focus on proving or disproving the paranormal but rather on understanding the people who believe and how those beliefs shape their lives drawing on the baylor religion survey a multi year national random sample of american religious values practices and behaviors as well as extensive fieldwork including joining hunts for bigfoot and spending the night in a haunted house authors christopher bader f carson mencken and joseph baker shed light on what the various types of paranormal experiences beliefs and activities claimed by americans are whether holding an unconventional belief such as believing in bigfoot means that one is unconventional in other attitudes and behaviors who has such experiences and beliefs and how they differ from other americans and if we can expect major religions to emerge from the paranormal brimming with engaging personal stories and provocative findings paranormal america is an entertaining yet authoritative look at a growing segment of american religious culture

this book offers a comprehensive account of the nature and expression of contemporary forms of religion in western societies drawing both on recent original work and classical and contemporary conceptual frameworks it examines the beliefs practices patterns of organisation and significant trends in both mainstream and fringe religions including cults and quasi religions competing arguments and theories about key developments are treated fully and fairly and there is a clear sense throughout of the social context the approach is broadly sociological and the well paced jargon free writing style and clearly sectioned chapters make this an ideal text for teaching and study purposes

both in sociology and religious studies amongst the themes and concerns covered are what we mean in the first place by religion secularisation and new expressions of religiosity the effect of religion on society and the relationship between religion and social change the links between belief belonging and social identity contemporary christianity and the religions of ethnic minorities in the west globalisation religious pluralism and postmodernity stephen j hunt is senior lecturer in sociology at the university of west of england bristol he has written widely on contemporary christianity and new religious movements
