from the sixteenth to the early nineteenth centuries the spanish crown sponsored missions staffed by members of different catholic missionary orders to evangelize the indigenous populations and engage in social engineering in line with royal policy the

missionaries directed the construction of building complexes that included churches leaving behind an important historical and architectural legacy this visual catalog documents the surviving complexes on selected missions on the frontiers of spanish america in what today is mexico and parts of south america it also presents basic historical data on the mission communities including demographic data and documents damage to early mission buildings by the earthquakes of september 7 and september 19 2018

a fascinating account of the twisted threads of murder ethnic violence and mob justice in 19th century southern california jill leovy author of ghettoside a history of murder in america in the los angeles times los angeles is a city founded on blood once a small mexican pueblo teeming with californios indians and americans all armed with bowie knives and colt revolvers it was among the most murderous locales in the californian frontier in eternity street violence and justice in frontier los angeles a vivid disturbing portrait of early los angeles publishers weekly john mack faragher weaves a riveting narrative of murder and mayhem featuring a cast of colorful characters vying for their piece of the city these include a newspaper editor advocating for lynch laws to enact a crude manner of racial justice and a mob of latinos preparing to ransack a county jail and murder a texan outlaw in this groundbreaking true west look at american history faragher shows us how the city of angels went from a lawless outpost to the sprawling metropolis it is today

this sweeping history explores the growing latino presence in the united states over the past two hundred years it also debunks common myths about silicon valley one of the world s most influential but least understood places far more than any label of the moment the devil of racism has long been silicon valley s defining force and stephen pitti argues that ethnic mexicans rather than computer programmers should take center stage in any contemporary discussion of the new west pitti weaves together the experiences of disparate residents early spanish mexican settlers gold rush miners farmworkers transplanted from texas chicano movement activists and late twentieth century musicians to offer a broad reevaluation of the american west based on dozens of oral histories as well as unprecedented archival research the devil in silicon valley shows how san josé santa clara and other northern california locales played a critical role in the ongoing development of latino politics this is a transnational history in addition to considering the past efforts of immigrant and u s born miners fruit cannery workers and janitors at high tech firms many of whom retained strong ties to mexico pitti describes the work of such well known valley residents as césar chavez he also chronicles the violent opposition ethnic mexicans have faced in santa clara valley in the process he reinterprets not only california history but the latino political tradition and the story of american labor this book follows california race relations from the franciscan missions to the gold rush from the new almaden mine standoff to the apple janitorial strike as the first sustained account of northern california s mexican american history it challenges conventional thinking and tells a fascinating story bringing

the past to bear on the present the devil in silicon valley is counter history at its best

this vivid panoramic history continues the exciting story begun in wilderness at dawn tracing through the eyes and adventures of ordinary people the saga of the settlement of the united states embraces the texture and the drama of the west in all its heartbreak and heroism booklist photos maps

this illustrated encyclopedia examines the unique influence and contributions of women in every era of american history from the colonial period to the present it not only covers the issues that have had an impact on women but also traces the influence of women s achievements on society as a whole divided into three chronologically arranged volumes the set includes historical surveys and thematic essays on central issues and political changes affecting women s lives during each period these are followed by a z entries on significant events and social movements laws court cases and more as well as profiles of notable american women from all walks of life and all fields of endeavor primary sources and original documents are included throughout

the west especially the intermountain states ranks among the whitest places in america but this fact obscures the more complicated history of racial diversity in the region in making the white man s west author jason e pierce argues that since the time of the louisiana purchase the american west has been a racially contested space using a nuanced theory of historical whiteness he examines why and how anglo americans dominated the region for a 120 year period in the early nineteenth century critics like zebulon pike and washington irving viewed the west as a dumping ground for free blacks and native americans a place where they could be segregated from the white communities east of the mississippi river but as immigrant populations and industrialization took hold in the east white americans began to view the west as a refuge for real whites the west had the most diverse population in the nation with substantial numbers of american indians hispanics and asians but anglo americans could control these mostly disenfranchised peoples and enjoy the privileges of power while celebrating their presence as providing a unique regional character from this came the belief in a white man s west a place ideally suited for real americans in the face of changing world the first comprehensive study to examine the construction of white racial identity in the west making the white man s west shows how these two visions of the west as a racially diverse holding cell and a white refuge shaped the history of the region and influenced a variety of contemporary social issues in the west today

two historians robert v hine and john mack faragher present the american west as both frontier and region real and imagined old and new and they show how men and women of all ethnic groups were affected when different cultures met and clashed their concise and engaging survey of frontier history traces the story from the first columbian contacts between indians and europeans

to the multicultural encounters of the modern southwest profusely illustrated with contemporary drawings posters and photographs and written in lively and accessible prose the book not only presents a panoramic view of historical events and characters but also provides fascinating details about such topics as western landscapes environmental movements literature visual arts and film

merciless killing in the nineteenth century american west as this unusual book shows was not as simple as depicted in dime novels and movie westerns the scholars interviewed here experts on violence in the west embrace a wide range of approaches and perspectives and challenge both traditional views of western expansion and politically correct ideologies the battle of the little big horn the sand creek massacre the battle of the washita and the mountain meadows massacre are iconic events that have been repeatedly described and analyzed but the interviews included in this volume offer new points of view other events discussed here are little known today such as the camp grant massacre in which anglo americans mexican americans and tohono o odham indians killed more than a hundred pinal and aravaipa apache men women and children in addition to specific events the interviews cover broader themes such as violence in early california hostilities between the frontier army and the sioux including the santee sioux revolt and wounded knee and violence between european americans and great basin tribes such as the bear river massacre the scholars interviewed include academic historians public historians an anthropologist and a journalist the interview format provides insights into the methodology and tools of historical research and allows questions and speculations often absent from conventional written accounts the scholars share their latest thoughts on long standing controversies address the political uses often made of history and discuss the need to incorporate multiple viewpoints scholars and students of history and historiography will be fascinated by the nuts and bolts information about the practice of history revealed in these interviews in addition readers with specific interests in the events discussed will gain much new information and many fresh insights

for four hundred years from the first spanish assaults against the arawak people of hispaniola in the 1490s to the u s army s massacre of sioux indians at wounded knee in the 1890s the indigenous inhabitants of north and south america endured an unending firestorm of violence during that time the native population of the western hemisphere declined by as many as 100 million people indeed as historian david e stannard argues in this stunning new book the european and white american destruction of the native peoples of the americas was the most massive act of genocide in the history of the world stannard begins with a portrait of the enormous richness and diversity of life in the americas prior to columbus s fateful voyage in 1492 he then follows the path of genocide from the indies to mexico and central and south america then north to florida virginia and new england and finally out across the great plains and southwest to california and the north pacific coast stannard reveals that wherever europeans or white americans went the native people were caught between imported plagues and barbarous atrocities typically resulting in

the annihilation of 95 percent of their populations what kind of people he asks do such horrendous things to others his highly provocative answer christians digging deeply into ancient european and christian attitudes toward sex race and war he finds the cultural ground well prepared by the end of the middle ages for the centuries long genocide campaign that europeans and their descendants launched and in places continue to wage against the new world s original inhabitants advancing a thesis that is sure to create much controversy stannard contends that the perpetrators of the american holocaust drew on the same ideological wellspring as did the later architects of the nazi holocaust it is an ideology that remains dangerously alive today he adds and one that in recent years has surfaced in american justifications for large scale military intervention in southeast asia and the middle east at once sweeping in scope and meticulously detailed american holocaust is a work of impassioned scholarship that is certain to ignite intense historical and moral debate

genocide has scarred human societies since antiquity in the modern era genocide has been a global phenomenon from massacres in colonial america africa and australia to the holocaust of european jewry and mass death in maoist china in recent years the discipline of genocide studies has developed to offer analysis and comprehension the oxford handbook of genocide studies is the first book to subject both genocide and the young discipline it has spawned to systematic in depth investigation thirty four renowned experts study genocide through the ages by taking regional thematic and disciplinary specific approaches chapters examine secessionist and political genocides in modern asia others treat the violent dynamics of european colonialism in africa the complex ethnic geography of the great lakes region and the structural instability of the continent s northern horn south and north america receive detailed coverage as do the ottoman empire nazi occupied europe and post communist eastern europe sustained attention is paid to themes like gender memory the state culture ethnic cleansing military intervention the united nations and prosecutions the work is multi disciplinary featuring the work of historians anthropologists lawyers political scientists sociologists and philosophers uniquely combining empirical reconstruction and conceptual analysis this handbook presents and analyses regions of genocide and the entire field of genocide studies in one substantial volume

an anthology of essays about 20th century women living in the western u s showing that the image of the pioneer woman has been replaced not with another dominant one but with many

beginning with the 1760s when lynching and vigilantism came into existence in what is now the united states this bibliography fills a void in the history of american collective violence it covers over 4 200 works dealing with vigilante movements and lynchings including books articles government documents and unpublished theses and dissertations following a chapter listing general works the book is arranged into four chronological chapters a chapter on the frontier west a chapter on anti lynching and chapters on

literature and art the book opens with a chapter devoted to general works it then includes chapters on the period from the colonial era to the civil war the civil war through 1881 and the periods from 1882 to 1916 and 1917 to 1996 the work then turns to the frontier west and to anti lynching bills laws organizations and leaders finally the book includes chapters on vigilantism in literature and art

now in its third edition first americans has been fully updated to trace native americans experiences through the 2020 election and the biden administration the covid 19 pandemic and the crisis of murdered and missing indigenous women this book provides a comprehensive history of native americans from their earliest appearances in north america to the present highlighting the complexity and diversity of their cultures and experiences contrasting the misconception that native americans were consistently victims without power native voices permeate the text and shape its narrative underlining the vitality of native peoples and cultures in the context of regional continental and global developments the new edition highlights the role of native americans as agents of resistance and progress rooted in the perspective that their activism has been instrumental throughout history and in the present day to enrich student understanding the book also includes a variety of pedagogical tools including short biographical profiles key review questions a rich series of maps and illustrations chapter chronologies a glossary and recommendations for further reading spanning centuries of developments into the present day first americans is the approachable essential student introduction to native american history

a broad exploration of the colonial roots of global capitalism and the worldwide quest of indigenous people for liberation through decolonization

this study examines the way americans of chinese descent were portrayed in american literature between 1850 and 1940 their depictions are compared to historical events that were occurring at the time the works of literature were published this edition has additions and corrections compared to the original hardback edition published in 1982 excerpt my purpose in writing this work has been to explore the depiction of chinese immigrants and their descendants in american fiction from the mid nineteenth century entry of the first chinese immigrants in significant numbers to the eve of world war ii i consider both the immigrant chinese and the american born generations that followed them to be chinese americans but will sometimes identify the groups separately in

recognition of the fact that the historical experience and treatment of the immigrants in fiction has been different from that of their descendants the fiction treated in this study includes short stories and novels both by white americans and asian americans i am defining the term yellow peril as the threat to the united states that some white american authors believed was posed by the people of east asia as a literary theme the fear of this threat focuses on specific issues including possible military invasion from asia perceived competition to the white labor force from asian workers the alleged moral degeneracy of asian people and the potential genetic mixing of anglo saxons with asians who were considered a biologically inferior race by some intellectuals of the nineteenth century the chinese immigrants were the first target of this attention since they were the first asian immigrants to reach the united states in large numbers this study will focus on american fiction about chinese americans in an attempt to analyze the growth and development of attitudes about them my thesis is that the yellow peril is the overwhelmingly dominant theme in american fiction about chinese americans in the years with which this study is concerned it is expressed through the variety of images of the chinese americans that appear especially in their relation to and their role as part of the united states the historical causes and literary subject matter change but the theme neither disappears nor abates each work of fiction has been studied individually for the images it contains prior to the turn of the century the yellow peril is perceived only as stemming from the chinese in the twentieth century especially in the pulps the japanese joined the chinese as a perceived menace to europe and north america the overall process of evaluation relies primarily on detailed analyses of the characters under consideration this has been done with an awareness that the american public as a whole sometimes did not distinguish carefully among asian ethnic groups so that events involving one asian ethnic group often affected the image of another some works are obscure and these have been quoted at greater length than more available ones relatively few critical sources have been cited this is due to a dearth of relevant studies the less important works of fiction have naturally received little critical attention and often when such attention was concerned with pertinent stories the authors had little or nothing to say about the depiction of chinese americans this observation is intended only as an explanation and not as a value judgement of earlier scholarship with different goals

via time travel charlotte makee a 21st century anthropologist meets an elderly coast miwok curer named sekiak in the hills near olompali in marin county california charlotte wishes to learn about coast miwok life before their society was disrupted and then destroyed by catholic priests spanish soldiers settlers and other foreigners over less than 100 years once sekiak decides to work with charlotte she administers a potion that renders her visitor invisible to all but sekiak and one or two others that potion also allows charlotte to comprehend miwok speech and she embarks on ethnographic fieldwork listening and observing in the nearby settlements with sekiak as her primary teacher of local customs and history as the two women move back and forth through time

charlotte fills dozens of notebooks with data about coast miwok life that she intends to draw upon to tell the story of what happened to the people of coyote s land but as margery wolf s novel ethnography unfolds an ominous air settles over the research enterprise comparable to the ominous air of death and devastation that demolish a once thriving society this experimental ethnography joins fiction to historical and cultural data helping us to feel and see what happened as the coast miwok world turned upside down and then was altered beyond recognition

an ethnography of urban native americans in the silicon valley that looks at the creation of social networks and community events that support tribal identities

in the early 1870s hubert h bancroft and his assistants set out to record the memoirs of early californios one of them being eighty three year old don jose maria amador a former forty niner during the california gold rush and soldado de cuera at the presidio of san francisco amador tells of reconnoitering expeditions into the interior of california where he encountered local indigenous populations he speaks of political events of mexican california and the widespread confiscation of the californios goods livestock and properties when the united states took control a friend from mission santa cruz lorenzo asisara also describes the harsh life and mistreatment the indians faced from the priests both the amador and asisara narratives were used as sources in bancroft s writing but never published themselves gregorio mora torres has now rescued them from obscurity and presents their voices in english translation with annotations and in the original spanish on facing pages this bilingual edition will be of great interest to historians of the west california and mexican american studies
