judaism makes the bold argument that the very concept of a religion of judaism is an invention of the christian church the intellectual journey of world renowned talmud scholar daniel boyarin this book will change the study of judaism an essential key word in jewish studies as we understand it today boyarin argues that although the world treats the word judaism as appropriate for naming an alleged religion of the jews it is in fact a christian theological concept only adopted by jews with the coming of modernity and the adoption of christian languages

in this book steven fraade explores the practice and conception of multilingualism and translation in ancient judaism interrogating the deep and dialectical relationship between them he situates representative scriptural and other texts within their broader synchronic greco roman context as well as diachronic context the history of judaism and beyond neither systematic nor comprehensive his selection of hebrew aramaic and greek primary sources here fluently translated into clear english best illustrate the fundamental issues and the performative aspects relating to translation and multilingualism fraade scrutinizes and analyzes the texts to reveal the inner dynamics and the pedagogical social implications that are implicit when multilingualism and translation are paired his book demonstrates the need for a more thorough and integrated treatment of these topics and their relevance to the study of ancient judaism than has been heretofore recognized

between 1780 and 1937 jews in germany produced numerous new translations of the hebrew bible into german intended for jews who were trilingual reading yiddish hebrew and german they were meant less for religious use than to promote educational and cultural goals not only did translations give jews vernacular access to their scripture without christian intervention but they also helped showcase the hebrew bible as a work of literature and the foundational text of modern jewish identity this book is the first in english to offer a close analysis of german jewish translations as part of a larger cultural project looking at four distinct waves of translations abigail gillman juxtaposes translations within each that sought to achieve similar goals through differing means as she details the history of successive translations we gain new insight into the opportunities and problems the bible posed for different generations and gain a new perspective on modern german jewish history

in readers and reading culture in the high roman empire william johnson examines the system and culture of reading among the elite in second century rome the investigation proceeds in case study fashion using the principal surviving witnesses beginning with the communities of pliny and tacitus with a look at pliny's teacher quintilian from the time of the emperor trajan johnson then moves on to explore elite reading during the era of the antonines including the medical community around galen the philological community around gellius and fronto with a look at the curious reading habits of fronto's pupil marcus aurelius and the intellectual communities lampooned by the satirist lucian along the way evidence from the papyri is deployed to help to understand better and more concretely both the mechanics of reading and the social interactions that surrounded the ancient book the result is a rich cultural history of individual reading communities that differentiate themselves in interesting ways even while in aggregate showing a coherent reading culture with fascinating similarities and contrasts to the reading culture of today

but the bible says is a common enough refrain in many conversations about christianity the written verses of the four canonical gospels are sometimes volleyed back and forth and taken as fact while the apocryphal and oral accounts of the life of jesus are taken as mere oddities early thinkers inside and outside the community of jesus followers similarly described a contentious relationship between the oral and the written though they often focused on the challenges of trusting the written word over the spoken socrates described the written word an illegitimate bastard compared to the spoken word of a teacher nevertheless the written accounts of the jesus tradition in the gospels have taken a far superior position in the christian faith to any oral tradition in the gospel as manuscript chris keith offers a new material history of the jesus tradition s journey from voice to page showing that the introduction of manuscripts played an underappreciated but crucial role in the reception history of the gospel from the textualization of mark in the first century ce until the eventual usage of liturgical readings as a marker of authoritative status in the second and third centuries early followers of jesus placed the gospel as manuscript on display by drawing attention to the written nature of their tradition many authors of gospels saw themselves in competition with other evangelists working to establish their texts as the quintessential gospel reading the texts aloud in liturgical settings and further established the literary tradition in material culture revealing a vibrant period of competitive development of the jesus tradition wherein the material status of the tradition frequently played as important a role as the ideas that it contained keith offers a thorough consideration of the competitive textualization and public reading of the gospels

a word conventionally imbued with melancholy meanings diaspora has been used variously to describe the cataclysmic historical event of displacement the subsequent geographical scattering of peoples or the conditions of alienation abroad and yearning for an ancestral home but as daniel boyarin writes diaspora may be more constructively construed as a form of cultural hybridity or a mode of analysis in a traveling homeland he makes the case that a shared homeland or past and traumatic dissociation are not necessary conditions for diaspora and that jews carry their homeland with them in diaspora in the form of textual interpretive communities built around talmudic

study for boyarin the babylonian talmud is a diasporist manifesto a text that produces and defines the practices that constitute jewish diasporic identity boyarin examines the ways the babylonian talmud imagines its own community and sense of homeland and he shows how talmudic commentaries from the medieval and early modern periods also produce a doubled cultural identity he links the ongoing productivity of this bifocal cultural vision to the nature of the book as the physical text moved between different times and places the methods of its study developed through contact with surrounding cultures ultimately a traveling homeland envisions talmudic study as the center of a shared jewish identity and a distinctive feature of the jewish diaspora that defines it as a thing apart from other cultural migrations
