slavery is america s family secret a partially hidden phantom that continues to haunt our national imagination remembering generations explores how three contemporary african american writers artistically represent this notion in novels about the enduring effects of slavery on the descendants of slaves in the post civil rights era focusing on gayl jones s *Corregidora* 1975 david bradley s *The Chaneysville Incident* 1981 and octavia butler s *Kindred* 1979 ashraf rushdy situates these works in their cultural moment of production highlighting the ways in which they respond to contemporary debates about race and family tracing the evolution of this literary form he considers such works as edward ball s *Slaves in the Family* 1998 in which descendants of slaveholders expose the family secrets of their ancestors remembering generations examines how cultural works contribute to social debates how a particular representational form emerges out of a specific historical epoch and how some contemporary intellectuals meditate on the issue of historical responsibility of recognizing that the slave past continues to exert an influence on

contemporary american society

human contradictions in octavia butler s work continues the critical discussions of butler s work by offering a variety of theoretical perspectives and approaches to butler s text this collection contains original essays that engage butler s series seed to harvest xenogenesis parables her stand alone novels kindred and fledgling and her short stories the essays explore new facets of butler s work and its relevance to philosophy sociology anthropology psychology cultural studies ethnic studies women s studies religious studies american studies and u s history the volume establishes new ways of reading this seminal figure in african american literature science fiction feminism and popular culture

rites of passage liminality and community in octavia e butler s science fiction novels explores the ways in which octavia butler s liminal protagonists undergo ritualized transformations while in exile from their home communities during this process they engage in psychological physical political and social transitions through what victor turner and mikhail bakhtin describe as carnivalesque identities using postcolonial feminist anti capitalist and african american theorists lin knutson examines how butler s imagined genesis and history carry echoes of american history slave history debt slavery and colonization

xenogenesis retitled lilith s brood in 2000 is one of butler s most important works and comprises the novels dawn 1987 adulthood rites 1988 and imago 1989 the notes cover octavia butler s life and work the background and structure of the trilogy black sf in relation to race and gender the tradition of dystopias and the work in genetics that is central to the plot the annotations pay special attention to the feminist and racial critique of human behaviour and to the scientific and religious themes that develop throughout the trilogy each of the three novels is dealt with book by book and chapter by chapter an essay called the strange determination of octavia butler considers the trilogy s two very different umbrella titles and butler s unusual use of genetic science especially the discovery of mitochondrial dna to critique racial essentialism it also argues for her use of cellular organelles as a metaphor for the african diaspora driven by slavery the bibliography provides a complete listing of works by octavia butler including short stories and work published on line it also has sections detailing works about octavia butler and sf and useful reference works

the crisis founded by w e b du bois as the official publication of the naacp is a journal of civil rights history politics and culture and seeks to educate and challenge its readers about issues that continue to plague african americans and other communities of color for nearly 100 years the crisis has been the magazine of opinion and thought leaders decision makers peacemakers and justice seekers it has chronicled informed educated entertained and in many instances set the economic political and social agenda for our nation and its multi ethnic citizens

rabaka explores funk as a distinct multiform of music aesthetics politics social vision and cultural rebellion that has been remixed and continues to influence contemporary black popular music and black popular culture especially rap music and the hip hop movement the funk movement was a sub movement within the larger black power movement and its artistic arm the black arts movement moreover the funk movement was also a sub movement within the black women s liberation movement between the late 1960s and late 1970s where women s funk especially chaka khan and betty davis s funk was understood to be a form of black musical feminism that was as integral to the movement as the black political feminism of angela davis or the combahee river collective and the black literary feminism of toni morrison or alice walker this book also demonstrates that more than any other post war black popular music genre the funk music of the 1960s and 1970s laid the foundation for the mercurial rise of rap music and the hip hop movement in the 1980s and 1990s this book is primarily aimed at scholars and students working in popular music studies popular culture studies american studies african american studies cultural studies ethnic studies critical race studies women s studies gender studies and sexuality studies

whenever we envision a world without war without prisons without capitalism we are producing speculative fiction organizers and activists envision and try to create such worlds all the time walidah imarisha and adrienne maree brown have brought twenty of them together in the first anthology of short stories to explore the connections between radical speculative fiction and movements for social change the visionary tales of octavia s brood span genres sci fi fantasy horror magical realism but all are united by an attempt to inject a healthy dose of imagination and innovation into our political practice and to try on new ways of understanding ourselves the world around us and all the selves and worlds that could be the collection is rounded off with essays by tananarive due and mumia abu jamal and a preface by sheree renée thomas

a national book award winning new york times best selling historian shows how girls who found self understanding in the natural world became women who changed america harriet tubman forced to labor outdoors on a maryland plantation learned a terrain for escape louisiana may alcott ran wild eluding gendered expectations in new england the indigenous women s basketball team from fort shaw montana recaptured a sense of pride in physical prowess as they trounced the white teams of the 1904 world s fair celebrating women like these who acted on their confidence outdoors wild girls also brings new context to misunderstood icons like sakakawea and pocahontas and to underappreciated figures like gertrude bonin dolores huerta and grace lee boggs for the girls at the center of this book woods prairies rivers ball courts and streets provided not just escape from degrees of servitude but also space to envision new spheres of action lyrically written and full of archival discoveries this book evokes landscapes as richly as the girls who roamed in them and argues for equal access to outdoor spaces for girls of every race and class today

first published in 2003 with essays by an international and interdisciplinary group of scholars dark horizons focuses on the development of

critical dystopia in science fiction at the end of the twentieth century in these narratives of places more terrible than even the reality produced by the neo conservative backlash of the 1980s and the neoliberal hegemony of the 1990s utopian horizons stubbornly anticipate a different and more just world the top notch team of contributors explores this development in a variety of ways by looking at questions of form politics the politics of form and the form of politics in a broader context the essays connect their textual and theoretical analyses with historical developments such as september 11th the rise and downturn of the global economy and the growth of anti capitalist movements

a breathtaking achievement this concise companion is a suitable crown to the astonishing production in african american literature and criticism that has swept over american literary studies in the last two decades it offers an enormous range of writers from sojourner truth to frederick douglass from zora neale hurston to ralph ellison and from toni morrison to august wilson it contains entries on major works including synopses of novels such as harriet jacobs s incidents in the life of a slave girl richard wright s native son and lorraine hansberry s a raisin in the sun it also incorporates information on literary characters such as bigger thomas coffin ed johnson kunta kinte sula peace as well as on character types such as aunt jemima brer rabbit john henry stackolee and the trickster icons of black culture are addressed including vivid details about the lives of

muhammad ali john coltrane marcus garvey jackie robinson john brown and harriet tubman here too are general articles on poetry fiction and drama on autobiography slave narratives sunday school literature and oratory as well as on a wide spectrum of related topics compact yet thorough this handy volume gathers works from a vast array of sources from the black periodical press to women s clubs making it one of the most substantial guides available on the growing exciting world of african american literature

freedom beyond confinement examines the cultural history of african american travel and the lasting influence of travel on the imagination particularly of writers of literary fiction and nonfiction using the paradox of freedom and confinement to frame the ways travel represented both opportunity and restriction for african americans the book details the intimate connection between travel and imagination from post reconstruction ca 1877 to the present analysing a range of sources from the black press and periodicals to literary fiction and nonfiction the book charts the development of critical representation of travel from the foundational press and periodicals which offered african americans crucial information on travel precautions and possibilities notably during the era of jim crow to the woefully understudied literary fiction that would later provide some of the most compelling and lasting portrayals of the freedoms and constraints african americans associated with travel travel experiences often challenging and vexed provided the raw data with which writers produced images and ideas meaningful as they learned to navigate negotiate and even challenge racialized and gendered impediments to their mobility in their writings african americans worked to realize a vision and state of freedom informed by those often difficult experiences of mobility in telling this story the book hopes to center literary fiction in studies of travel where fiction has largely remained absent

that word vacation makes me sweat coco chanel on taking a break you must do it irregardless or it will eat its way out of you zora neale hurston on writing one has to choose between the life and the project susan sontag on choosing art from vanessa bell and charlotte brontë to nina simone and jane campion here are over one hundred and forty female writers painters musicians sculptors poets choreographers and filmmakers on how they create and work barbara hepworth sculpted outdoors and janet frame wore earmuffs as she worked to block out noise kate chopin wrote with her six children swarming around her whereas the artist rosa bonheur filled her bedroom with the sixty birds that inspired her work louisa may alcott wrote so vigorously skipping sleep and meals that she had to learn to write with her left hand to give her cramped right hand a break from isak dinesen subsisting on oysters champagne and amphetamines to isabel allende s insistence that she begins each new book on 8 january here are the working routines of over 140 brilliant female painters composers sculptors writers filmmakers and performers filled with details of

the large and small choices these women made mason currey's daily rituals women at work is a source of fascination and inspiration an admirably succinct portrait of some distinctly uncommon lives meryle secrest

most human bodies have two arms two legs hands feet a head yet the body as we perceive it is ultimately a cultural construct defined by the values and meanings each individual and each culture ascribes to it beyond its corporeal realities the implications of the body how we adorn alter heal and please it are potentially endless limited only by the manner in which we frame it revealing how the human body has served as as metaphor for social process the anthology unveils the body as intrinsically configured by politics gender racial categories fears of pollution and commercial forces which exploit and regulate it historical snapshots of american bodies over the past two and a half centuries the essays in this volume cover such diverse subjects as sailor tattoos maritime cannibalism in the early 1800's birth control rest cures for neurasthenia and more recently anorexia boxing cyberpunk and plastic surgery drawing from history literary and cultural studies and film studies american bodies is an eclectic stimulating collection that will challenge many fundamental beliefs about our physical form

facing threats like climate change and nuclear warfare science fiction authors have conjured apocalyptic scenarios of human extinction can such gloomy fates help us make sense of our contemporary crises how important is the survival of our species if we wind up battling for an earth that has become an uninhabitable hellscape what other possible futures do narratives of the end of humanity allow us to imagine michael bérubé explores the surprising insights of classic and contemporary works of sf that depict civilizational collapse and contemplate the fate of homo sapiens in a lively conversational style he considers novels by writers including ursula k le guin margaret atwood liu cixin philip k dick and octavia butler as well as films that feature hostile artificial intelligence such as 2001 a space odyssey blade runner and the terminator and matrix franchises bérubé argues that these works portray a future in which we have become able to see ourselves from the vantage point of something other than the human though framed by the possibility of human extinction they are driven by a vision of the ex human a desire to imagine that another species is possible for all science fiction readers worried about the fate of humanity the ex human is an entertaining yet sobering account of how key novels and films envision the world without us

adopting a unique historical approach to its subject and with a particular focus on the institutions involved in the creation dissemination and reception of literature this handbook surveys the way in which the cold war shaped literature and literary production and how literature affected the course of the cold war to do so in addition to more traditional sources it uses institutions like mfa programs university literature departments book review sections of newspapers publishing houses non governmental cultural agencies libraries and literary magazines as a way to understand works of the period differently broad in both their geographical range and the range of writers they cover the book's essays examine

works of mainstream american literary fiction from writers such as roth updike and faulkner as well as moving beyond the u s and the u k to detail how writers and readers from countries including but not limited to taiwan japan uganda south africa india cuba the ussr and the czech republic engaged with and contributed to anglo american literary texts and institutions

in *Care at the End of the World* jina b kim develops what she calls crip of color critique bringing a disability lens to bear on feminist and queer of color literature in the aftermath of 1996 us welfare reform and the subsequent evisceration of social safety nets she examines literature by contemporary feminist queer and disabled writers of color such as jesmyn ward octavia butler karen tei yamashita samuel delany and aurora levins morales who each bring disability and dependency to the forefront of their literary freedom dreaming kim shows that in their writing liberation does not take the shape of the unfettered individual or hinge on achieving independence instead liberation emerges by recuperating dependency cultivating radical interdependency and recognizing the numerous support systems upon which survival depends at the same time kim demonstrates how theories and narratives of disability can intervene into state authored myths of resource parasitism such as the welfare queen in so doing she highlights the alternate structures of care these writers envision and their dreams of life organized around reciprocity and mutual support duke university press scholars of color first book award

this book examines how contemporary women novelists have successfully transformed and rewritten the conventions of post apocalyptic fiction since the dawn of the new millennium there has been an outpouring of writing that depicts the end of the world as we know it and women writers are no exception to this trend however the book argues that their fiction is distinctive contemporary women s work in this genre avoids conservatism a nostalgic mourning for the past and the focus on restoring what has been lost aspects key to much male authored apocalyptic fiction instead contemporary women writers show readers the ways in which patriarchy and neo colonialism are intrinsically implicated in the disasters they envision and offer qualified hope for a new beginning for society culture and literature after an imagined apocalyptic event exploring science nature and matter the posthuman body the maternal imaginary time narrative and history literature and the word and the post secular the book covers a wide variety of writers and addresses issues of nationality race and ethnicity as well as gender and sexuality

provides an overview of ways that utopian thinking has shaped american culture focusing on the need to remake imperial usa

for students scholars readers advisors and curious sf readers and fans this guide provides an easy to use launch pad for researching and learning more about science fiction writers and their work emphasizing the best popular and contemporary authors this book covers 100 sf writers providing for each a brief biographical sketch including a quote from theauthor awards etc a list of the author s major works including editions and other writings research sources biographies criticism research guides and web sites in addition you ll find read alike lists for selected authors for anyone wanting to find information on popular sf authors this should be the first stop

in fictions of land and flesh mark rifkin explores the impasses that arise in seeking to connect black and indigenous movements turning to speculative fiction to understand those difficulties and envision productive ways of addressing them against efforts to subsume varied forms of resistance into a single framework in the name of solidarity rifkin argues that black and indigenous political struggles are oriented in distinct ways following their own lines of development and contestation rifkin suggests how movement between the two can be approached as something of a speculative leap in which the terms and dynamics of one are disoriented in the encounter with the other futurist fiction provides a compelling

site for exploring such disjunctions through analyses of works by octavia butler walter mosley nalo hopkinson melissa tantaquidgeon zobel and others the book illustrates how ideas about fungibility fugitivity carcerality marronage sovereignty placemaking and governance shape the ways black and indigenous intellectuals narrate the past present and future in turning to speculative fiction rifkin illustrates how speculation as a process provides conceptual and ethical resources for recognizing difference while engaging across it

this volume examines historical views of stewardship that have sometimes allowed humans to ravage the earth as well as contemporary and futuristic visions of stewardship that will be necessary to achieve pragmatic progress to save life on earth as we know it the idea of stewardship human responsibility to tend the earth has been central to human cultures throughout history as evident in the judeo christian genesis story of the garden of eden and in a diverse range of parallel tales from other traditions around the world despite such foundational hortatory stories about preserving the earth on which we live humanity in the anthropocene is nevertheless currently destroying the planet with breathtaking speed much research on stewardship today in the disciplines of geography urban studies oceans research and green business practice offers insights that should help address the ecological challenges facing the planet simultaneous scholarship in the humanities and other fields reminds us that the damage done to the planet has often been carried out in the name of tending the land in order to make progress in environmental stewardship scholars must speak to each other across the disciplinary boundaries as they do in this volume
