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the answers to these questions and much much more are to be found in the changing room which traces the origins and variations of theatrical cross dressing through the ages and across cultures it examines tribal rituals and shamanic practices in the balkans and chinese tibet the gender bending elements of greek and early christian religion the homosexual appeal of the boy actor on the traditional stage of china japan and england the origins of the dame comedian the principal boy the glamour drag artiste and the male impersonator artists such as david bowie boy george charles ludlam dame edna everage lily savage candy darling julian clary and the new york dolls lavishly illustrated with unusual and rare pictures this is the first ever cross cultural study of theatrical transvestism it is a must for anyone interested in cross dressing theatre and gender

margaret mead made me gay is the intellectual autobiography of cultural anthropologist esther newton a pioneer in gay and lesbian studies chronicling the development of her ideas from the excitement of early feminism in the 1960s to friendly critiques of queer theory in the 1990s this collection covers a range of topics such as why we need more precise sexual vocabularies why there have been fewer women doing drag than men and how academia can make itself more hospitable to queers it brings together such classics as the mythic mannish lesbian and dick less tracy and the homecoming queen with entirely new work such as theater gay anti church newton s provocative essays detail a queer academic career while offering a behind the scenes view of academic homophobia in four sections that correspond to major periods and interests in her life drag and camp lesbian feminism butch and queer anthropology the volume reflects her successful struggle to create a body of work that uses cultural anthropology to better understand gender oppression early feminism theatricality and performance and the sexual and erotic dimensions of fieldwork combining personal theoretical and ethnographic perspectives margaret mead made me gay also includes photographs from newton s personal and professional life with wise and revealing discussions of the complex relations between experience and philosophy the personal and the political and identities and practices margaret mead made me gay is important for anyone interested in the birth and growth of gay and lesbian studies

for two years ester newton did field research in the world of drag queens homosexual men who make a living impersonating women newton spent time in the noisy bars the chaotic dressing rooms and the cheap apartments and hotels that make up the lives of drag queens interviewing informants whose trust she had earned and compiling a lively first hand ethnographic account of the culture of female impersonators mother camp explores the distinctions that drag queens make among themselves as performers the various kinds of night clubs and acts they depend on for a living and the social organization of their work a major part of the book deals with the symbolic geography of male and female styles as enacted in the homosexual concept of drag sex role transformation and camp an important humor system cultivated by the drag queens themselves newton s fascinating book shows how study of the extraordinary can brilliantly illuminate the ordinary that social sexual division of personality appearance and activity we usually take for granted jonathan katz author of gay american history a trenchant statement of the social force and arbitrary

nature of gender roles martin s weinberg contemporary sociology

using oral history and rich narrative voices this groundbreaking collection of essays brings to life the vibrant lesbian gay and bisexual communities that existed all over the country in days before stonewall contributors include brett beemyn george chauncey allen drexel john howard david johnson liz kennedy marc stein and roey thorpe illustrations

drawing substantially on original ethnographic fieldwork from the 1980s and 1990s lawson demonstrates how the women of quyi a community of chinese female singers in republican tianjin successfully negotiated their sexuality and vocality in performance owing to their role as third person narrators the women of quyi bridged the gender gap in chinese performance creating an androgynous persona that allowed them to showcase their voices on public stages places that had been previously unwelcoming to conventional female performers this is a story about female storytellers who sang their way to respectability and social change by minimizing their bodies to allow their voices to be heard

not only surveys cross dressing and gender impersonation throughout history and in a variety of cultures but examines the medical biological psychological and sociological findings that have been presented in modern scientific literature

a disrobing acrobat a female hamlet and a tuba playing labor activist all these women come to life in rank ladies in this comprehensive study of women in vaudeville alison kibler reveals how female performers patrons and workers shaped the rise and fall of the most popular live entertainment at the turn of the century kibler focuses on the role of gender in struggles over whether high or low culture would reign in vaudeville examining women s performances and careers in vaudeville their status in the expanding vaudeville audience and their activity in the vaudevillians labor union respectable women were a key to vaudeville s success she says as entrepreneurs drew women into audiences that had previously been dominated by working class men and recruited female artists as performers but although theater managers publicly celebrated the cultural uplift of vaudeville and its popularity among women in reality their houses were often hostile both to female performers and to female patrons and home to women who challenged conventional understandings of respectable behavior once a sign of vaudeville s refinement kibler says women became associated with the decay of vaudeville and were implicated in broader attacks on mass culture as well

charts la s gay history from the first missionary encounters with native american cross gendered two spirits to cross dressing frontier women in search of their fortunes and from the 1960s gay liberation movement to the creation of gay marketing in the 1990s

why did traditional chinese literati so often identify themselves with women in their writing what can this tell us about how they viewed themselves as men and how they

understood masculinity how did their attitudes in turn shape the martial heroes and other masculine models they constructed martin huang attempts to answer these questions in this valuable work on manhood in late imperial china he focuses on the ambivalent and often paradoxical role played by women and the feminine in the intricate negotiating process of male gender identity in late imperial cultural discourses two common strategies for constructing and negotiating masculinity were adopted in many of the works examined here the first what huang calls the strategy of analogy constructs masculinity in close association with the feminine the second the strategy of differentiation defines it in sharp contrast to the feminine in both cases women bear the burden as the defining other in this study feminine is a rather broad concept denoting a wide range of gender phenomena associated with women from the politically and socially destabilizing to the exemplary wives and daughters celebrated in confucian chastity discourse

noh kabuki and bunraku are the three distinct genres of classical theater that have made japan s dramatic art unique the audience steeped in these traditional theatrical forms sees many aspects of stage conventions in japanese cinema this intimacy makes the aesthetic intellectual experience of films more enriching japanese classical theater in films aims at heightening such awareness in the west the awareness of the influence that these three major dramatic genres have had on japan s cinematic tradition using an eclectic critical framework a solid combination of historical and cultural approaches reinforced with formalist and auteurist perspectives keiko i mcdonald undertakes this much needed ambitious task

this is the first book in more than twenty five years to examine the complex historical cultural and aesthetic relationship between theater and film and the effect that each has had on the other s development robert knopf here assembles essays from performers directors writers and critics that illuminate this ongoing inquiry the book is divided into five parts historical influence comparisons and contrasts writing directing and acting with interludes by major artists whose work and words have shaped the development of theater and film a comprehensive bibliography and filmography support further work in this area the book contains contributions from susan sontag stanley kauffmann sarah bey cheng bertolt brecht ingmar bergman harold pinter david mamet julia taymor judi dench sam waterston orson welles antonin artaud and milos forman among others

the jazz age a phenomenon that shaped american leisure culture in the early twentieth century coincided with the growth of kansas city missouri from frontier town to metropolitan city though kansas city s music culture and stars are well covered queering kansas city jazz supplements the grand narrative of jazz history by including queer identities in the city s history while framing the jazz scene experience in terms of identity and space cabarets gender impressionism clubs and sites of sex tourism in kansas city served as world making spaces for those whose performance of identity transgressed hegemonic notions of gender sexuality race and class amber r clifford napoleone takes an interdisciplinary approach to provide a critical deconstruction of how the jazz scene offered a space for nonnormative gender practice and performance and acted as a site of contested identity and spatial territory few books examine the changing ideas about gender in the turn of the century great plains

under the false assumption that people in middle american places experienced cultural shifts only as an aftershock of events on the coasts this approach overlooks the region's contested territories identities and memories and fails to adequately explain the social and cultural disruptions experienced on the plains clifford napoleone rectifies this oversight and shows how kansas city represents the complexity of the jazz scene in america as a microcosm of all the other people who made the culture clubs music and cabarets of the age possible

capture imprisoned servicemen bonds between men ties with home going round the bend liberation resettling conclusion

sex change social change reflections on identity institutions and imperialism provides readers with an authoritative introduction to contemporary transsexual politics in canadian and québécois contexts through different case studies relating to the law human rights health care and prostitution dr namaste exposes readers to the complex issues involved in how transsexual politics and feminism interrelate written in accessible language and including interviews essays and political speeches sex change social change will appeal to academics and to activists in the community as well as to the general reader the second edition has been thoroughly updated with five new chapters and includes new commentary on the readings from the first edition all royalties from the sale of this book go to pasan prisoners hiv aids support action network in particular their emergency fund that provides modest amounts of money to prisoners upon their release these funds enable people to secure housing go to a job interview and or replace their identity documents

crossing the stage brings together for the first time essays which explore cross dressing in theatre cabaret opera and dance the volume contains seminal pieces which have become standard texts in the field as well as new work especially commissioned from leading writers on performance crossing the stage is an indispensable sourcebook on theatrical cross dressing it will be essential reading for all those interested in performance and the representation of gender

fans are one of the most widely studied groups of media consumers emphasising the contradictions of fandom matthew hills discusses how media fans have been conceptualised in cultural theory

americans have long cherished romantic images of the frontier and its colorful cast of characters where the cowboys are always rugged and the ladies always fragile but in this book peter boag opens an extraordinary window onto the real old west delving into countless primary sources and surveying sexological and literary sources boag paints a vivid picture of a west where cross dressing for both men and women was pervasive and where easterners as well as mexicans and even indians could redefine their gender and sexual identities boag asks why has this history been forgotten and erased citing a cultural moment at the turn of the twentieth century when the frontier ended the united states entered the modern era and homosexuality was created as a category boag shows how the american people and thus the american nation were

bequeathed an unambiguous heterosexual identity

first published in 2013 queer style was ahead of its time it was the first book to address the cultural political and material histories of clothes as signs and markers of gender and sexual identity and remains key reading for scholars and students across fashion studies and the humanities more broadly now 10 years later the authors have revisited their classic work and updated it to examine the function of subcultural dress within queer communities and the mannerisms and messages that are used as signifiers of identity

traces the history of gay men and lesbians in san francisco from the turn of the century when queer bars emerged in san francisco s tourist districts to 1965 when a raid on a drag ball energized the gay community includes excerpts from oral histories of lesbians and gay men who have lived in san francisco since the 1930s

queering india is the first book to provide an understanding of same sex love and eroticism in indian culture and society the essays focus on pre colonial colonial and post colonial gay and lesbian life in india to provide a comprehensive look at a much neglected topic the topics are wide ranging considering film literature popular culture historical and religious texts law and other aspects of life in india specifically the essays cover such issues as deepa mehta s recent and controversial film fire which focused on lesbian relationships in india the indian penal code which outlaws homosexual acts a case of same sex love and murder in colonial india homophobic fiction

and homoerotic advertising in current day india and lesbian subtext in hindu scripture all of the essays are original to the collection queering india promises to change the way we understand india as well as gay and lesbian life and sexuality around the world

critics often chastised the twentieth century black press for focusing on sex and scandal rather than african american achievements in pleasure in the news kim gallon takes an opposing stance arguing that african american newspapers fostered black sexual expression agency and identity gallon discusses how journalists and editors created black sexual publics that offered everyday african americans opportunities to discuss sexual topics that exposed class and gender tensions while black churches and black schools often encouraged sexual restraint the black press printed stories that complicated notions about respectability sensational coverage also expanded african american women s sexual consciousness and demonstrated the tenuous position of female impersonators black gay men and black lesbians in early twentieth african american urban communities informative and empowering pleasure in the news redefines the significance of the black press in african american history and advancement while shedding light on the important cultural and social role that sexuality played in the power of the black press

differences on stage is a collection of twelve original essays by leading international theatre critics and scholars which aims to address the relationship between theatre and the development of political awareness through the voice of subaltern people the book is enriched by the contributions of some of the most engaged protagonists of the stage who in their capacity as authors players and directors denounce prejudice and conformism whilst allowing the marginalized sections of society to speak out an authoritative overview of the theatre of differences this book offers a key interpretation of contemporary society and underscores that although theatre no longer holds a central position in our multi media society the theatre of marginalized spaces ironically becomes central again and regains its role as the brain and lungs of the community differences on stage covers a variety of topics across a multi cultural and geographical spectrum and its contributions present previously unexplored connections between the discourses of theatre and anthropological cultural and translation studies offering new critical readings and drawing on recent theoretical frameworks

filmmakers fascination with opera dates back to the silent era but it was not until the late 1980s that critical enquiries into the intersection of opera and cinema began to emerge jeongwon joe focusses primarily on the role of opera as soundtrack by exploring the distinct effects opera produces in film effects which differ from other types of soundtrack music such as jazz or symphony these effects are examined from three perspectives peculiar qualities of the operatic voice various properties commonly associated with opera such as excess otherness or death and multifaceted tensions between opera and cinema for instance opera as live embodied high art and cinema as technologically mediated popular entertainment joe argues that when opera excerpts are employed on soundtracks they tend to appear at critical moments of the film usually associated with the protagonists and the author explores why it is opera not symphony or jazz that accompanies poignant scenes like these joe s film analysis focuses on the time period of the post 1970s which is distinguished by an increase of opera excerpts on soundtracks to blockbuster titles the commercial recognition of

which promoted the production of numerous opera soundtrack cds in the following years joe incorporates an empirical methodology by examining primary sources such as production files cue sheets and unpublished interviews with film directors and composers to enhance the traditional hermeneutic approach the films analysed in her book include woody allen s match point david cronenberg s m butterfly and wong kar wai s 2046

between 1917 and 1941 hollywood studios gossip columnists and novelists featured an unprecedented number of homosexuals cross dressers and adulterers in their depictions of the glamorous hollywood lifestyle actress greta garbo defined herself as the ultimate serial bachelorette screenwriter mercedes de acosta engaged in numerous lesbian relationships with the hollywood elite and countless homosexual designers brazenly picked up men in the hottest hollywood nightclubs hollywood s image grew as a place of sexual abandon this book demonstrates how studios and the media used images of these sexually adventurous characters to promote the industry and appeal to the prurient interests of their audiences

in a world of trendsetting film icons few are more familiar than mae west yet for all her public controversy west is also a mystery marybeth hamilton combines elements of biography cultural analysis and social history to unmask west and reveal her commercial savvy willpower and truly shocking theatrical transgressions

revealing male bodies is the first scholarly collection to directly confront male lived experience there has been an explosion of work in men s studies masculinity issues and male sexuality in addition to a growing literature exploring female embodiment missing from the current literature however is a sustained analysis of the phenomenology of male gendered bodies revealing male bodies addresses this omission by examining how male bodies are physically and experientially constituted by the economic theoretical and social practices in which men are immersed contributors include susan bordo william cowling terry goldie maurice hamington don ihde greg johnson björn krondorfer alphonso lingis patrick mcgann paul mcilvenny terrance macmullan jim perkinson steven p schacht richard schmitt nancy tuana craig l wilkins and john zuern

in this highly readable book kathleen casey makes an important intervention into the study of early twentieth century american vaudeville and some of its most infamous stars she pinpoints the blind spot in current scholarship by demonstrating how race as much as gender charges the meanings in vaudeville performance linda mizejewski author of pretty funny women comedians and body politics and ziegfeld girl from the 1890s through the 1920s vaudeville reigned as one of the most popular entertainment forms in urban america through drama humor and satire it invited its socially economically and ethnically diverse audiences to turn a self conscious eye upon themselves and their culture which was being rapidly transformed by such forces as immigration racial discord and new conceptions of gender roles it was no coincidence that acts featuring cross dressing performers and racial impersonators were among vaudeville s biggest attractions in this lively and enlightening study kathleen b casey explores the ways in which the gender and race bending spectacles of vaudeville dramatized the economic technological social and cultural upheaval



that gripped the united states in the early twentieth century she focuses on four key performers eva tanguay known as the i don t care girl was loved for her defiance of victorian decorum linking white womanliness to animalistic savagery at a time when racial and gender ideologies were undergoing significant reconstruction in contrast julian eltinge the era s foremost female impersonator used race to exaggerate notions of manliness and femininity in a way that reinforced traditional norms more than it undermined them lillyn brown a biracial woman who portrayed a cosmopolitan black male dandy while singing about an antebellum southern past offered her audiences black and white starkly different visual and aural messages about race and gender finally sophie tucker who often performed in blackface during the early years of her long and heralded career strategically played with prevailing ideologies by alternately portraying herself as white jewish black manly and womanly while managing remarkably to convince audiences that these identities could coexist within one body analyzing a wide assortment of primary materials advertisements recordings lyrics sheet music costumes photographs reviews and press accounts from the era casey looks not only at gender and racial impersonation but also at how spectators reacted to these performances kathleen b casey is an assistant professor of history at virginia wesleyan college

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the drag queen anthology the absolutely fabulous but flawlessly customary world of female impersonators examines the phenomenon of male to female gender performance and the people who live it this provocative collection of original essays explores the possibilities limitations ironies and controversies surrounding men who perform as women to an audience that knows the truth but celebrates the illusion the book s contributors call on extensive backgrounds in sociology anthropology theater literature even military studies and use a variety of approaches to address common themes and genres of presentation performance and style in a wide range of historical settings and cultures

women in asian performance offers a vital re assessment of women s contributions to asian performance traditions focusing for the first time on their specific historical cultural and performative contexts arya madhavan brings together leading scholars from across the globe to make an exciting intervention into current debates around femininity and female representation on stage this collection looks afresh at the often centuries old aesthetic theories and acting conventions that have informed ideas of gender in asian performance it is divided into three parts erasure the history of the presence and absence of female bodies on asian stages intervention the politics of

female intervention into patriarchal performance genres reconstruction the strategies and methods adopted by women in redefining their performance practice establishing a radical culturally specific approach to addressing female performance making women in asian performance is a must read for scholars and students across asian studies and performance studies

most modern discussions of the relationship of biological sex to gender presuppose that there are two genders male and female founded on the two biological sexes but not all cultures share this essentialist assumption and even western societies have not always embraced it bringing together historical and anthropological studies third sex third gender challenges the usual emphasis on sexual dimorphism and reproduction providing a unique perspective on the various forms of socialization of people who are neither male nor female the existence of a third sex or gender enables us to understand how byzantine palace eunuchs and indian hijras met the criteria of special social roles that necessitated practices such as self castration and how intimate and forbidden desires were expressed among the dutch sodomites in the early modern period the sapphists of eighteenth century england or the so called hermaphrodite homosexuals of nineteenth century europe and america by contextualizing these practices and by allowing these bodies meanings and desires to emerge third sex third gender provides a new way to think about sex and gender systems that is crucial to contemporary debates within the social sciences

a critical appreciation of the opera house in the coal mining region of appalachia from the mid 1860s to the early 1930s coal and culture demonstrates that these were multipurpose facilities that were used for traveling theater concerts religious events lectures commencements boxing matches benefits union meetings and if the auditorium had a flat floor skating and basketball
