name things like an old address or a license plate number every child can understand base ten numeration when taught hands on with arithmetic blocks thereby every child can understand base ten arithmetic and every child can learn how to count out the number facts like $5 \times 7 = 35$ and $56 \div 8 = 7$ and if they forget one never have to guess and risk ridicule and bad grades if they guess wrong what matters in teaching arithmetic is not how much a child can remember but how much they can figure out if when they forget
