bodies that birth puts birthing bodies at the centre of questions about contemporary birth politics power and agency arguing that the fleshy and embodied aspects of birth have been largely silenced in social science scholarship rachelle chadwick uses an array of birth stories from diverse race class demographics to explore the narrative entanglements between flesh power and sociomateriality in relation to birth adopting a unique theoretical framework incorporating new materialism feminist theory and a foucauldian analytics of power the book aims to trace and trouble taken for

granted assumptions about birthing bodies through a diffractive and dialogical approach the analysis highlights the interplay between corporeality power and ideologies in the making of birth narratives across a range of intersectional differences the book shows that there is no singular birthing body apart from sociomaterial relations of power instead birthing bodies are uncertain zones or unpredictable assortments of physiology flesh sociomateriality discourse and affective flows at the same time birthing bodies are located within intra acting fields of power relations including biomedicine racialized patriarchy socioeconomics and geopolitics bodies that birth brings the voices of women from different sociomaterial positions into conversation ultimately the book explores how attending to birthing bodies can vitalize global birth politics by listening to what matters to women in relation to birth this is fascinating reading for researchers academics and students from across the social sciences

this project examines two areas where there are important interpretive problems the composition of the book of jeremiah and specifically the provenance of and ideological functions served by the text of jeremiah on the one hand and the redactional interests in prophecy evident in the deuteronomistic history on the other the book argues that two distinct political groups can be seen to vie for theological authority via their literary portrayals of traditions about jeremiah and prophets generally in the deuteronomistic prose a group in babylon after the deportations of 597 b c e that is attempting to claim political and cultic authority and a group remaining behind in judah after 597 that counters the political claims and related interpretive moves made by the babylonian traditionists the book then illustrates through analysis of prophetic roles in jeremiah kings and deuteronomy 18 that there are substantial and fundamental discontinuities between the view of prophecy and the prophetic word presented in the deuteronomistic texts and the view presented in the deuteronomistic texts the results of the present study challenge the widely accepted scholarly thesis of monolithic redaction of the book of jeremiah at the hands of the same deuteronomists whose work is evident in the deuteronomistic history

ezra pound s cantos remains among the most influential and difficult of twentieth century poetic writings but now for the first time rabaté s powerful and original study presents a theory of reading adequate to the challenge of pound s writing using elements from lacanian psycho analysis and heidegger s powerful meditation of poetry and language this book constructs a theory of reading which both gives full force to the strategies of writing deployed in the cantos and to the historical and political situations to which those strategies are a response this study provides a fresh reading of the familiar pound canon homer dante ovid but also of the less well known ruskin browning frobenius pound s practice of quotation is understood in the context of a new poetic discourse characterized by parapraxis ellipsis condensation and autonomous voices which refer the division of the speaking subject back to an omniform intellect capable of taking on any new personality at will crucial to an understanding of pound s situation is the relationship between chinese and greek culture an analysis of which allows rabaté to elaborate the tragic dimension in pound s life and works this book also parallels and contrasts pound with his major contemporaries such as eliot and joyce and with his immediate heirs like william carlos williams h d zukofsky and olson

in his interdisciplinary memoir gerald gutek applies history and philosophy of education to educational biography the author was guided by his focusing goals of exploring his path to becoming an educational biographer and working generalizations with his

colleagues in the field gutek's narrative begins with the author's childhood experiences that inclined him to a career in education followed by chapters on his doctoral program in the college of education at the university of illinois in champaign urbana his teaching of history and philosophy and education in the school of education at loyola university chicago his research and writing of biographies of johann heinrich pestalozzi and joseph neef and his textbook historical and philosophical foundations of education a biographical introduction and issues and strategies in writing about maria montessori throughout the book gutek analyzes concepts and applications he developed as an educational biographer such as parallel biographies slice of life writing reconsidering overlooked and understudied educators and the role of place and space in telling life stories endorsements readers both new to educational biography or familiar with the discipline will find a valuable account of the author's long and varied career as a biographer from his childhood memory of listening to neighbors stories in his grandfather's grocery store to encounters with the important teachers in his life gutek brings his own story to life as he recounts the influences on his personal intellectual history and the processes of his research and writing readers gain valuable insights into the methods of an experienced educational biographer larry prochner university of alberta for fifty years gerald gutek has been and remains one of the seminal and leading voices in the field of educational biography thus it only makes sense for him to create something new an intellectual memoir from his work on counts in 1970 to his work on montessori 2016 and her acolytes in the us 2020 gutek has reliably bridged the worlds of educational history educational biography and philosophical foundations of education this work cements his legacy gutek skillfully interweaves personal and family history with movements in educational history both formal and informal then explains how these impacted his thinking and writing throughout this eminently readable memoir gutek also includes political and historical context without engaging in divisiveness scholars of life writing should give this a close reading as gutek sprinkles nuggets of methodological brilliance throughout the manuscript junior scholars would do well to read gutek's more substantive sections on the methods used to write each of his books it is the academic equivalent of master class in textual form ed janak university of toledo

ecclesiastes also known as qohelet is a fascinating text filled with intriguing contradictions such as wisdom's beneficial consequences god's justice and wisdom's superiority over pleasure under the paradigm of modernism the contradictions in the book have been regarded as problems to be harmonized or explained away in reanimating qohelet's contradictory voices jimyung kim drawing on mikhail bakhtin's insights offers an alternative reading that embraces the contradictions as they stand for kim qohelet's or the protagonist's contradictory consciousness is dialogically constructed by his contact with a complex web of discourses instead of harmonizing them or explaining them away kim identifies various dialogic voices available to qohelet and demonstrates how those voices constitute qohelet's contradictory utterances and construct his unfinalizable identity

this book examines the ideological affinity that can be established between the classical bildungsroman and colonialist ideology on the basis of a literary analysis of wilhelm meisters lehrjahre considered by most critics to be the origin of the genre and great expectations one of the paradigmatic examples of the development of the bildungsroman in english literature this ideological affinity is understood as an example of what the palestinian critic edward said has called a structure of attitude and reference the convergence of different cultural manifestations that although formally independent

contribute to a common purpose the monograph also undertakes a study of the main characteristics of the classical bildungsroman from a formal and thematic point of view and an analysis of the relationship between genre theories and eurocentric discourses
