although there has been a significant revival in interest in bertrand russell s work in recent years most professional philosophers

would still argue that russell was not interested in language here in the first full length study of russell s work on language throughout his long career keith green shows that this is in fact not the case in examining russell s work particularly from 1900 to 1950 green exposes a repeated emphasis on and turn to linguistic considerations green considers how linguistics and philosophy were struggling in the twentieth century to define themselves and to create appropriate contemporary disciplines they had much in common during certain periods yet seemed to continue in almost total ignorance of one another this negative relation has been noted in the past by roy harris whose work provides some of the inspiration for the present book taking those two aspects green s aim here is to provide the first full length consideration of russell s varied work in language and to read it in the context of developing contemporary i e with russell s work linguistic theory the main aims of this important new book in focusing exclusively on russell s work on language throughout his career are to place russell within the changing contexts of contemporary linguistic thought to read russell s language theories against the grain of his own linguistic practice to assess the relationship between linguistic and philosophical thought during russell s career and to reassess his place in the history of linguistic thought in the twentieth century as such this fascinating study will make a vital contribution to russell studies and to the study of the relationship between philosophy and linguistics

charles c fries 1887 1967 was a major figure in american linguistics and language education during the first half of the 20th century theoretical innovation and practical implementation were important threads that ran throughout his work fries believed that the attempt to deal with practical problems was a vital part of developing linguistic theory he spent most of his effort exploring grammar as a tool for communicating meaning charles c fries was quite influential in the development of linguistics in the united states and yet in some ways remained outside of the mainstream of the linguistics he helped to develop the contributors to this volume were asked to present and evaluate some aspect of fries work and to show how similar ideas are being used today

language in the schools integrating linguistic knowledge into k 12 teaching addresses two important questions what aspects of linguistic knowledge are most useful for teachers to know what kinds of activities and projects are most effective in introducing those aspects of linguistic knowledge to k 12 students the volume focuses on how basic linguistic knowledge can inform teachers approaches to language issues in the multicultural linguistically diverse classroom the text also includes examples of practical applications of language awareness to pedagogy assessment and curriculum construction which support the current goals of language

the book presents a new science of semiotic linguistics the goal of semiotic linguistics is to discover what characterizes language as an intermediary between the mind and reality so that language creates the picture of reality we perceive the cornerstone of semiotic linguistics is the discovery and resolution of language antinomies contradictions between two apparently reasonable principles or laws language antinomies constitute the essence of language and hence must be studied from both linguistic and philosophical points of view the basic language antinomy which underlies all other antinomies is the antinomy between meaning and information both generative and classical linguistic theories are unaware of the need to distinguish between meaning and information by confounding these notions they are unable to discover language antinomies and confine their research to naturalistic description of superficial

language phenomena rather than the quest for the essence of language series a

language our primary tool of thought and perception is at the heart of who we are as individuals languages are constantly changing sometimes into entirely new varieties of speech leading to subtle differences in how we present ourselves to others this revealing account brings together eleven leading specialists from the fields of linguistics anthropology philosophy and psychology to explore the fascinating relationship between language culture and social interaction a range of major questions are discussed how does language influence our perception of the world how do new languages emerge how do children learn to use language appropriately what factors determine language choice in bi and multilingual communities how far does language contribute to the formation of our personalities and finally in what ways does language make us human language culture and society will be essential reading for all those interested in language and its crucial role in our social lives

this book brings together an interdisciplinary group of academic researchers in order to examine how and to what extent the challenge of language revitalisation should be reassessed and reconceptualised to take account of our fast changing social context the period of four decades between 1980 and 2020 that straddled the end of the twentieth century and the beginning of the twenty first is widely regarded as one that witnessed a series of fundamental social economic and political transformations many societies have become increasingly individualistic mobile and diverse in terms of ethnicity and identity their economies have become increasingly interconnected and their governance structures have become increasingly complex incorporating a growing number of different levels and actors in addition rapid advancements with regard to automated digital and communication technology have had a far reaching impact on how people interact with each other and participate in society the chapters in this book aim to advance an agenda of key questions that should concern those working in the field of language revitalisation over the coming years and the volume will be of interest to students scholars and policy makers in related areas including sociolinguistics education sociology geography political science law economics celtic studies and communication technology

the papers published in this volume were originally read and discussed at a three day seminar sponsored by the canadian society for the study of religion societie canadienne des sciences religieuses at laval university quebec city quebec may 28th to 30th 1976 this seminar served the important function of bringing together the majority of the canadian scholars who specialize in indian philosophy and religion the topic language was chosen a year earlier so that advance study on a common theme could be undertaken by all who participated some thirty professors as well as a few senior graduate students engaged in the discussion an additional and important feature of the seminar was that since it was held during the learned societies meetings a number of western scholars with an interest in language were able to listen in to the thinking of their eastern colleagues this provided the basis for some interesting and informed dialogue

why should we study language how do the ways in which we communicate define our identities and how is this all changing in the digital world since 1993 many have turned to language culture and society for answers to questions like those above because of its comprehensive coverage of all critical aspects of linguistic anthropology this seventh edition carries on the legacy while addressing some of the newer pressing and exciting challenges of the 21st century such as issues of language and power language ideology and linguistic diasporas chapters on gender race and class also examine how language helps create and is created by identity new to this edition are enhanced and updated pedagogical features such as learning objectives updated resources for continued learning and the inclusion of a glossary there is also an expanded discussion of communication online and of social media outlets and how that universe is changing how we interact the discussion on race and ethnicity has also been expanded to include latin and asian american english vernacular

the book provides an encyclopaedic overview of the language contact between slavic languages and romani in eastern south eastern and east central europe it is based on yaron matras pragmatic functional approach to language contact and follows a new direction in romani linguistics that conceives romani as a subgroup of closely related languages rather than a single language the central topics discussed in the book are slavic impact on romani phonetics and phonology morphology and syntax forms and functions of slavic verbal prefixes in romani slavic impact on the romani lexicon romani elements in the nonstandard lexicon of the slavic languages writing romani with slavic alphabets
