things make us just as much as we make things and yet unlike the study of languages or places there is no discipline devoted to the study of material things this book shows why it is time to acknowledge and confront this neglect and how much we can learn from focusing our attention on stuff the book opens with a critique of the concept of superficiality as applied to clothing it presents the theories that are required to understand the way we are created by material as well as social relations it takes us inside the very private worlds of our home possessions and our processes of accommodating it considers issues of materiality in relation to the media as well as the implications of such an approach in relation for example to poverty finally the book considers objects which we use to define what it is to be alive and how we use objects to cope with death based on more than thirty years of research in the caribbean india london and elsewhere stuff is nothing less than a manifesto for the study of material culture and a new way of looking at the objects that surround us and make up so much of our social and personal life

what do we know about ordinary people in our towns and cities about what really matters to them and how they organize their lives today this book visits an ordinary street and looks into thirty households it reveals the aspirations and frustrations the tragedies and accomplishments that are played out behind the doors it focuses on the things that matter to these people which quite often turn out to be material things their house the dog their music the christmas decorations these are the means by which they express who they have become and relationships to objects turn out to be central to their relationships with other people children lovers brothers and friends if this is a typical street in a modern city like london then what kind of society is this it s not a community nor a neighbourhood nor is it a collection of isolated individuals it isn t dominated by the family we assume that social life is corrupted by materialism made superficial and individualistic by a surfeit of consumer goods but this is misleading if the street isn t any of these things then what is it this brilliant and revealing portrayal of a street in modern london written by one the most prominent anthropologists shows how much is to be gained when we stop lamenting what

we think we used to be and focus instead on what we are now becoming it reveals the forms by which ordinary people make sense of their lives and the ways in which objects become our companions in the daily struggle to make life meaningful

this interdisciplinary essay collection investigates the various interactions of people feelings and things throughout premodern europe it focuses on the period before mass production when limited literacy often prioritised material methods of communication the subject of materiality has been of increasing significance in recent historical inquiry alongside growing emphasis on the relationships between objects emotions and affect in archaeological and sociological research the historical intersections between materiality and emotions however have remained under theorised particularly with respect to artefacts that have continuing resonance over extended periods of time or across cultural and geographical space feeling things addresses the need to develop an appropriate cross disciplinary theoretical framework for the analysis of objects and emotions in european history with special attention to the need to track the shifting emotional valencies of objects from the past to the present and from one place and cultural context to another the collection draws together an international group of historians art historians curators and literary scholars working on a variety of cultural literary visual and material sources objects considered include books letters prosthetics religious relics shoes stone and textiles many of these have been preserved in international galleries museums and archives while others have remained in their original locations even as their contexts have changed over time the chapters consider the ways in which emotions such as despair fear grief hope love and wonder become inscribed in and ascribed to these items producing emotional objects of significance and agency such objects can be harnessed to create affirm or express individual relationships as for example in religious devotion and practice or in the construction of cultural communal and national identities

the relation between religion and things has long been conceived in antagonistic terms privileging spirit above matter belief above ritual and objects meaning above form and inward contemplation above outward action this book addresses these issues

discussing multiple aspects of material culture and domestic consumption this book tackles the relationship between the trajectories and biographies of people families houses and objects and how they intertwine and produce each other focusing on the life stories of a group of european and catholic brahmin goan families of the colonial elite who left mozambique after the country s independence in 1975 the book shows how material culture interferes with structuring dimensions of migratory experiences in the management of family memories ties and networks of belonging as well as in the social dynamics of positioning hierarchy and distinction

this collection of essays offers a series of rigorously focused art historical historical and philosophical studies that examine ways in which materiality has posed and still poses a religious and cultural problem the volume examines the material agency of objects artifacts and environments art ritual pilgrimage food and philosophy it studies the variable senses of materiality the place of materiality in the formation of modern western religion and its role in christianity s dialogue with non western religions the essays present new interpretations of religious rites and outlooks through the focus on their material components they also suggest how material engagement theory a new movement in cultural anthropology and archeology may shed light on the cultural history of christianity in medieval and early modern europe and the americas it thus fills an important lacuna in the study of western religion by highlighting the longue durée from the middles ages to the modern period of a current dilemma namely the divide between materialistic and what might broadly be called hermeneutical or cultural critical approaches to religion and human subjectivity

this book is about the objects people owned and how they used them twenty three specially written essays investigate the type of things that might have been considered everyday objects in the medieval and early modern periods and how they help us to understand the daily lives of those individuals for whom few other types of evidence survive for instance people of lower status and women of all status groups everyday objects presents new research by specialists from a range of disciplines to assess what the study of material culture can contribute to our understanding of medieval and early modern societies extending and developing key debates in the study of the everyday the chapters provide analysis of such things as ceramics illustrated manuscripts pins handbells carved chimneypieces clothing drinking vessels bagpipes paintings shoes religious icons and the built fabric of domestic houses and guild halls these things are examined in relation to central themes of pre modern history for instance gender identity space morality skill value ritual use belief public and private behaviour continental influence

materiality emotion technical innovation status competition and social mobility this book offers both a collection of new research by a diverse range of specialists and a source book of current methodological approaches for the study of pre modern material culture the multi disciplinary analysis of these everyday objects by archaeologists art historians literary scholars historians conservators and museum practitioners provides a snapshot of current methodological approaches within the humanities although analysis of material culture has become an increasingly important aspect of the study of the past previous research in this area has often remained confined to subject specific boundaries this book will therefore be an invaluable resource for researchers and students interested in learning about important new work which demonstrates the potential of material culture study to cut across traditional historiographies and disciplinary boundaries and access the lived experience of individuals in the past

histories of artists personal possessions shed new light on the lives of their owners artists are makers of things yet it is a measure of the disembodied manner in which we generally think about artists that we rarely consider the everyday items they own this innovative book looks at objects that once belonged to artists revealing not only the fabric of the eighteenth century art world in france but also unfamiliar and sometimes unexpected insights into the individuals who populated it including jean antoine watteau françois boucher jean baptiste greuze and elisabeth vigée lebrun from the curious to the mundane from the useful to the symbolic these items have one thing in common they have all been eclipsed from historical view some of the objects still exist like jean honoré fragonard s color box and jacques louis david s table others survive only in paintings such as jeansiméon chardin s cistern in his copper drinking fountain or in documents like françois lemoine s sword the instrument of his suicide several were literally lost including pastelist jean baptiste perronneau s pencil case in this fascinating book the authors engage with fundamental historical debates about production consumption and sociability through the lens of material goods owned by artists the free online edition of this open access

at its heart pasztory's thesis is simple and yet profound she asserts that humans create things some of which modern western society chooses to call art in order to work out our ideas that is we literally think with things pasztory draws on examples from many societies to argue that the art making impulse is primarily cognitive and only secondarily aesthetic she demonstrates that art always reflects the specific social context in which it is created and that as societies become more complex their art becomes more rarefied jacket

place of the human within it encouraging us to think anew about what we mean by materiality itself

in interplay of things anthony b pinn theorizes religion as a technology for interrogating human experiences and the boundaries between people and other things rather than considering religion in terms of institutions doctrines and creeds pinn shows how religion

exposes the openness and porousness of all things and how they are always involved in processes of exchange and interplay pinn examines work by nella larsen and richard wright that illustrates an openness between things and he traces how pop art and readymades point to the multidirectional nature of influence he also shows how ron atthey s and clifford owens s performance art draws out inherent interconnectedness to various cultural codes in ways that reveal the symbiotic relationship between art and religion as a technology theorizing that antiblack racism and gender and class based hostility constitute efforts to close off the porous nature of certain bodies pinn shows how many artists have rebelled against these attempts to counter openness his analyses offer a means by which to understand the porous unbounded and open nature of humans and things

a cultural history of objects in antiquity covers the period 500 bce to 500 ce examining ancient objects from machines and buildings to furniture and fashion many of our current attitudes to the world of things are shaped by ideas forged in classical antiquity we now understand that we do not merely do things to objects they do things to us reinterpreting objects in greece and rome casts new light on our understanding of ourselves and turns the ancient world upside down the 6 volume set of the cultural history of objects examines how objects have been created used interpreted and set loose in the world over the last 2500 years over this time the west has developed particular attitudes to the material world at the centre of which is the idea of the object the themes covered in each volume are objecthood technology economic objects everyday objects art architecture bodily objects object worlds robin osborne is professor of ancient history at the university of cambridge uk volume 1 in the cultural history of objects set general editors dan hicks and william whyte
