the island of sri lanka formerly ceylon was one of the few asian colonies in which the british empire experimented liberal state building in the nineteenth century and where many british colonial officials predicted that the independent state would become a liberal democratic success story sri lanka has held on to much of the liberal democratic state institutions left behind by the british empire including periodic elections at the same time the un s office of the high commissioner for human rights concluded in september 2015 that there are reasonable grounds to believe that sri lanka committed serious international crimes against the tamils such accusations are usually levelled against authoritarian states it is unusual for a democracy to face such charges this book analyses where sri lanka stands as a state that has in place liberal democratic state institutions but exhibits the characteristics of an authoritarian state using michel foucault s concept of biopolitics the author argues that sri lanka enacted racist legislations and perpetrated mass atrocities on the tamils as part of its biopolitics of institutionalising and securing a sinhala buddhist ethnocratic state order the book also explores the ways that apart from military action power relations produce the effects of battle and thus the way that peace can often become a means of waging war the author provides fresh insights into sri lanka s postcolonial policies and the system of government that it has in place a novel approach to analysing sri lanka s postcolonial policies and the system of government this book will be of interests to researchers in the field of political science asian politics and international relations

this volume examines the unique characteristics of akshara orthography and how they may affect literacy development and problems along with the implications for assessment and instruction even though akshara orthography is used by more than a billion people there is an urgent need for a systematic attempt to bring the features research findings and future directions of akshara together in a coherent volume we hope that this volume will bridge that gap akshara is used in several indic languages each calling it by a slightly different name for example aksharamu in telugu akshara in kannada and akshar in hindi it is the bhrami derived orthography used across much of the indian subcontinent there is a growing body of research on the psycholinguistic underpinnings of learning to read akshara and the emerging perspective is that akshara even though classified as alphasyllabaries abugida and semi syllabic writing systems is neither alphabetic nor syllabic rather akshara orthography is unique and deserves to be a separate classification and needs further investigation relating to literacy acquisition in akshara the chapters in this volume written by leading authors in the field will inform the reader of the current research on akshara in a coherent and systematic way

in ravana s kingdom justin w henry delves into the historical literary reception of the ramayana in sri lanka charting how the demon king antagonist ravana has become an unlikely cultural hero among sinhala buddhists over the past decade

this book constitutes the refereed proceedings of the second international conference slaai icaai 2018 held in moratuwa sri lanka in december 2018 the 32 revised full papers presented were carefully reviewed and selected from numerous submissions the papers are organized in the following topical sections intelligence systems neural networks game theory ontology engineering natural language processing agent based system signal and image processing

against the backdrop of the ongoing rohingya crisis this book takes a close and detailed look at the rise of militant buddhism in sri lanka burma and thailand and especially at the issues of why and how around it we are well aware of christian fundamentalism militant judaism and islamist salafism jihadism extremist and violent buddhism however features only rarely in book length studies on religion and political violence somehow the very idea of buddhist monks as the archetypical world renouncers exhorting frenzied mobs to commit acts of violence against perceived enemies of the religion seems to be outright ludicrous recent events in myanmar burma

but also in thailand and sri lanka however indicate that a militant strand of theravada buddhism is on the rise how can this rise be explained and what role do monks play in that regard these are the two broad questions that this book explores

this book discusses ravanisation the revitalisation of ravana among sinhalese buddhists in post war after 2009 sri lanka the hindu ramayana generally portrays ravana as a cruel king how and why then has ravana gained the interest of sinhalese buddhists this study takes an ethnographic perspective to answer these questions the book discusses multiple ravana representations that have emerged at an urban buddhist site the sri devram maha viharaya and a rural site lakegala and discloses how ravanisation relates to sinhalese buddhist ethno nationalism in addition the material ritual and spatial perspectives offer unique insights in the personal and local relevance of ravana

a data driven explanation of when successful religious parties reduce the civil liberties of their citizens in muslim majority countries and when they don't religious parties are increasingly common across the world more and more they participate in elections win legislative seats and join governments particularly in muslim majority countries since they are often founded on orthodox principles that are inconsistent with liberal democracy their rise potentially holds consequences for the prospects of liberal democratic values and practices and this risk has inspired much heated debate in religious parties and the politics of civil liberties the award winning political science scholar vineeta yadav considers a question that has been central to the discussion will the success of religious parties lead to declines in the civil liberties of their citizens yadav summarizes the popular and academic sides of the conversation and addresses the weaknesses of both by presenting an original empirical analysis of religious parties actual relationship to civil liberties many believe that if religious parties come to power they will curb civil liberties in order to realize their religious visions academic research on religious parties however claims that the need to compete in elections incentivizes religious parties to moderate their behaviors and policies including on civil liberties neither of these assertions has been systematically tested until now with this book yadav adjudicates the debate using systematic data that covers all muslim majority countries for a period of almost forty years she highlights the role that religious lobbies play in this issue and goes on to identify the specific conditions under which religious parties do or don't curb civil liberties a sweeping comparative account that combines large n analysis with focused studies of turkey and pakistan this book will reshape our understanding of the relationship between religious party strength and the preservation of civil liberties
