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in this anthology are gathered 28 essays devoted to the interrelations of the arts and media they present together the current state of the emerging field of interart studies the contributors stephen greenblatt claus clüver erika fischer lichte john neubauer steven paul scher walter bernhart ulrich weisstein eric t haskell eric vos thomas elsaesser among others are leading international scholars in the fields of art history literary criticism musicology film theatre and media studies in challenging ways they promote interdisciplinary strategies in the study of the traditional arts dance literature music painting sculpture theatre etc as well as of the modern media film tv video computer generated arts

etc the essays collected engage in a broad perspective of topics approached from varying theoretical methodological or ideological viewpoints no single thread runs through the diversely conceived essays yet it is evident that what all contributors appear to envision is the importance today of investigations into the problems of what might be called the interart or intermedia discourse aimed at university teachers scholars students and even artists this book will meet the demands from those interested in modern modes of interart and intermedia analysis

the english poetic mind 1932 is williams discussion of the source of the poetic impulse creativity and drive behind three prominent english poets shakespeare milton and wordsworth the text is reflective of williams imaginative and critical approach to literature and his appreciation of poetry and verse charles williams 1886 1945 was a british theologian playwright novelist and poet as a member of the inklings literary group at oxford his work supported a strong sense of narrative for williams spiritual exchanges were an undercurrent to life and his christian fantasy writing such as descent into hell 1937 earned him many followers this classic work is now being republished in a new modern edition with a specially commissioned introductory biography

in fettered genius keith d leonard identifies how african american poets use and revision of traditional poetics constituted an antiracist political agency comparing this practice to the use of poetic mastery by the ancient celtic bards to resist british imperialism leonard shows how traditional poetics enable african american poets to insert racial experience racial protest and african american culture into public discourse by making them features of validated artistic expression as with the celtic bards these poets artistry testified to their marginalized people s capacity for imagination and reason within and against the terms of the dominant culture in an ambitious survey that moves from slavery to the cultural nationalism of the 1960s leonard examines numerous poets placing each in the context of his or her time to demonstrate the antiracist meaning of their accomplishments the book offers new insight on the conservatism of phillis wheatley paul laurence dunbar and the genteel members of the harlem renaissance how their rage for assimilation functioned to refute racist notions of difference and paradoxically to affirm a distinctive racial experience as valid material for poetry leonard also demonstrates how the more progressive and ethnically distinctive poetics of langston hughes sterling brown gwendolyn brooks robert hayden and melvin b tolson share some of the same ambivalence about cultural achievement as those of the earlier poets they also have in common the self conscious pursuit of an affirmation of the african american self through the substitution of african american vernacular language and cultural forms for traditional poetic themes and forms the evolution of these poetics parallels the emergence of notions of ethnic identity over racial identity and indeed in some ways even motivated this shift leonard recognizes poetic mastery as the african american bardic poet s most powerful claim of ethnic tradition and of social belonging and clarifies the full hybrid complexity of african american identity that makes possible this political self assertion the development that is traced in fettered genius illustrates nothing less than the defining artistic

coherence and political significance of the african american poetic tradition

a landmark event in literary scholarship the publication of the johns hopkins edition of the complete poetry of percy bysshe shelley makes available for the first time critically edited clear texts of all poems and translations that shelley published or circulated among friends as well as diplomatic texts of his significant incomplete poetic drafts and fragments edited upon historical principles by donald h reiman and neil fraistat the multi volume edition will offer more poems and fragments than any previous collective edition arranged in the order of their first circulation these texts are followed by the most extensive collations hitherto available and detailed commentaries that describe their contextual origins and subsequent reception rejected passages of released poems appear as supplements to those poems while other poetic drafts that shelley rejected or left incomplete at his death will be grouped according to either their publication histories or the notebooks in which they survive writing to his publisher in 1813 shelley expressed the hope that two of his major works should form one volume nearly two centuries later the second volume of the johns hopkins edition of the complete poetry fulfills that wish for the first time this volume collects two important pieces queen mab and the esdaile notebook privately issued in 1813 queen mab was perhaps shelley s most intellectually ambitious work articulating his views of science politics history religion society and individual human relations subtitled a philosophical poem with notes it became his most influential and pirated poem during much of the

nineteenth century a favorite among reformers and radicals the esdaile notebook a cycle of fifty eight early poems exhibits an astonishing range of verse forms unpublished until 1964 this sequence is vital in understanding how the poet mastered his craft as in the acclaimed first volume these works have been critically edited by donald h reiman and neil fraistat the poems are presented as shelley intended with textual variants included in footnotes following the poems are extensive discussions of the circumstances of their composition and the influences they reflect their publication or circulation by other means their reception at the time of publication and in the decades since their re publication both authorized and unauthorized and their place in shelley s intellectual and aesthetic development
