with few exceptions the scholarship on religion in late antiquity has emphasized its tendencies toward transcendence abstraction
and spirit at the expense of matter in the corporeal imagination patricia cox miller argues instead that ancient christianity took a
material turn between the fourth and seventh centuries during this period miller contends there occurred a major shift in the ways
in which the human being was oriented in relation to the divine a shift that reconfigured the relationship between materiality and
meaning in a positive direction the corporeal imagination is a groundbreaking investigation into the theological poetics of material
substance in late ancient christian texts from hagiographies to literary descriptions of sacred paintings to treatises on relics and
theurgy miller examines a wide variety of ancient texts to reveal how christian writers increasingly described the matter of the
world as invested with divine power by appealing to the reader s sensory imagination christian texts endowed phenomena like
relics saints bodies in hagiography and saints presence in icons with a visual and tactile presence the book draws on a variety of
contemporary theoretical models to elucidate the significance of all these materials in ancient religious life and imagination

phenomenology new materialism and advances in the pulsatile imaginary rites of disimagination brings together scholars from art
history and image theory literary studies and philosophy chapters of this volume engage with the overarching theme of

imagination as a pulsatile force embedded in words images and all imaginative modes of instantiation of the work of art in their elemental aspects expressed in visual arts and literature as well as bodily schemata of choreographic and musical performances the papers employ contrasting and complementing methods from literary studies and image theory especially phenomenology and new materialism such as g bachelard and m merleau ponty g bataille j kristeva p lacoue labarthe and j sallis g didi huberman h belting and a warburg j bennett and jason m wirth as well as performance studies chapters in this volume inquire into the imaginative forces that disrupt and disinherit the traditional habits of imagination to create pulsatile imaginaries i e a dynamic process of emergence resurgence of image manifested in the act of creation and in perception this process does not properly imply a destruction of image but rather a withdrawal of image from the realm of representation to give way to new images and new imaginative experiences the newly coined term rite of disimagination points out to this operation consecutively implying imagining and disimaging that both denies as well as validates image it valorizes matter the affirmation of the materiality of image is the re incarnation of image

engaging with the work of nobel prize winning poet odysseus elytis within the framework of international modernism marinos pourgouris places the poet s work in the context of other modernist and surrealist writers in europe at the same time pourgouris puts forward a redefinition of european modernism that makes the mediterranean and greece in particular the discursive contact zone and incorporates neglected elements such as national identity and geography beginning with an examination of greek modernism pourgouris s study places elytis in conversation with albert camus analyzes the influence of charles baudelaire gaston bachelard and sigmund freud on elytis s theory of analogies traces the symbol of the sun in elytis s poetry by way of the philosophies of heraclitus and plotinus examines the influence of le corbusier on elytis s theory of architectural poetics and takes up the subject of elytis s application of his theory of solar metaphysics to poetic form in the context of works by freud c g jung and michel foucault informed by extensive research in the united states and europe pourgouris s study makes a compelling contribution to the comparative study of greek modernism the mediterranean and the work of odysseus elytis

psychic blocks from philip glass to pablo casals from michael eigen to mary aswell doll this book draws on the work of composers cellists psychoanalysts and educationists to find a way out of psychic meltdowns

the embodied image the embodied image imagination and imagery in architecture juhani pallasmaa all artistic and architectural effects are evoked mediated and experienced through poeticised images these images are embodied and lived experiences that take place in the flesh of the world becoming part of us at the same time that we unconsciously project aspects of ourselves on to a conceived space object or event artistic images have a life and reality of their own and they develop through unexpected associations rather than rational and causal logic images are usually thought of as retinal pictures but profound poetic images are multi sensory and they address us in an embodied and emotive manner architecture is usually analysed and taught as a discipline that articulates space and geometry but the mental impact of architecture arises significantly from its image quality that integrates the various aspects and dimensions of experience into a singular internalised and remembered entity the material reality is fused with our mental and imaginative realm the book is organised into five main parts that look at in turn the image in contemporary culture language thought and the image the many faces of the image the poetic image and finally the architectural image the embodied image is illustrated with over sixty images in pairs which are diverse in subject they range from scientific images to historic artistic and architectural masterpieces artworks span michelangelo and vermeer to gordon matta clark and architecture takes in modern masters such as mies van der rohe le corbusier and alvar aalto as well as significant contemporary works by steven holl and daniel libeskind

is there something important to learn from the history of science about knowledge and the mind do habits and emotions play a significant role in science to what extent do present concerns and knowledge distort our understanding of past texts and practices these are crucial questions in current debates but they are not new this monograph evaluates the answers to these and other questions that hélène metzger 1889 1944 provided metzger who was the leading historian of chemistry of her generation left us unparalleled reflections on the theory practice and aims of history writing despite her influence on subsequent generations of thinkers including thomas kuhn this is the first full length monograph on her beginning with an overview of her life and the challenges faced by a jewish woman working within academia the book goes on to discuss the most important themes of her historiography and her engagement with other disciplines notably general history philosophy ethnology and religious studies the book also explores both metzger s immediate legacy and the relevance of her ideas for a host of current debates in science studies the appendices include four of her historiographical papers translated into english for the first time

suggesting what can be learned from areas of culture beyond the boundaries of familiar professional disciplines he outlines the growing need for an architecture based in self awareness reconnection to the environment and a sense of ethical responsibility each essay in rootedness was initially conceived and presented as an educational lecture and has been carefully edited with clarifications refinements and valuable expansions accompanying sketches by the author emphasize the personal and intimate nature of the essays the book also includes explorations of perception creative practice and the need for an ethical stance thoughts meditations and challenges emerging from the author s search for identity and purpose in his architectural work a wealth of references within the essays as well as recommendations for books and films from which readers may draw further inspiration designed for students of architecture at any age rootedness reflections for young architects will also inspire professional architects designers and those in other creative professions

this book brings together critical and theoretical essays examining the connections between films and landscapes it showcases the work of established and emerging academics whose research probes the complex relationships between moving images and the filmed environment and accounts for the impactful effects of viewing lived spaces and human places on screen the essays in this collection actively engage with examples of contemporary popular and art cinema genre films and auteur canon historical films propaganda documentary and animation in their explorations of the meanings with which filmed landscapes are endowed and invested the breadth of the study is matched by the depth of the interest with writers here approaching the subject of film landscapes as critics as film practitioners and as teachers of film studies and film making film landscapes gives voice to a great many ideas and includes coverage of a great many films but it also points forward to ways in which we might revisit discussions of the environments of film and consider ways in which history and creativity critical understanding and the interaction of human beings and place could be reconsidered and revised to produce new insights

in poetics of the flesh mayra rivera offers poetic reflections on how we understand our carnal relationship to the world at once spiritual organic and social she connects conversations about corporeality in theology political theory and continental philosophy to show the relationship between the ways ancient christian thinkers and modern western philosophers conceive of the body and flesh her readings of the biblical writings of john and paul as well as the work of tertullian illustrate how christian ideas of flesh influenced the works of maurice merleau ponty and michel foucault and inform her readings of judith butler frantz fanon and others rivera also furthers developments in new materialism by exploring the intersections among bodies material elements social arrangements and discourses through body and flesh by painting a complex picture of bodies and by developing an account of how the social materializes in flesh rivera provides a new way to understand gender and race

material imagination examines the interrelated concepts of matter materialism and materiality in postwar european art from 1946 1972 provides a unique perspective on european art by prioritizing material dimensions over concept or context while also paying attention to theoretical and historical concerns explores artists methods and materials in order to better understand the social and cultural environments in which their works of art were made demonstrates how materials can be harnessed to affect the critical

interpretation of artwork brings together exceptional illustrations and new research in eight essays by art historians and scholars

the essays in this book respond to anna teresa tymieniecka's recent call to explore the relationship between the evolution of the universe and the process of self-individuation in the ontopoietic unfolding of life the essays approach the sensory manifold in a number of ways they show that theories of modern science become a strategy for the phenomenological study of works of art and vice versa works of phenomenology and of the arts examine how individual spontaneity connects with the design's of the logos of the whole and of the particulars while the design's rest not on some human concept but on life itself life's pliable matrices allow us to consider the expansiveness of contemporary science and to help create a contemporary phenomenological sense of cosmos

philosophers often use the term naturalism in order to describe their work it is commonplace to see a metaphysical epistemological and/or ethical position self-described and described by others as one that is naturalized but what if anything does the term naturalized add or subtract to the position being articulated i demonstrate in the problem of naturalism analytic and continental perspectives that the term naturalism connotes such a broad meaning that it is difficult to demarcate naturalism from philosophy itself still many philosophers have tried to provide non-trivial and non-vacuous definitions of the term my book by and large argues that such attempts are unsuccessful instead i argue that naturalism is an attitude and neither a methodology nor a substantive position i then articulate the guidelines the naturalist needs to follow as well as the virtues he or she needs to practice

in order for the term naturalism to do any meaningful work much of the book explains and then critiques the various attempts to define naturalism in the anglo american secondary literature some of the criticisms i raise seem to emanate from the internal logic of the naturalistic position being expressed however others have emerged from gleaning the work of such continental thinkers as nietzsche husserl heidegger and foucault i use these thinkers in order to expose the unjustified implicit and sometimes explicit assumptions that many naturalistic philosophers presume to hold when they attempt to render a clear distinct and robust naturalist position

this book analyzes different historical and cultural staging of gazes optical devices and images in the context of a discipline that goes by the name of visual culture here literary studies have contaminated and thus expanded their original field of investigation not only addressing as in the past the question of the relationship between verbal and visual but also giving substance to this interweaving with an in depth questioning about the meaning gazes images and vision devices or more generally the visual media can have on literature this research tries to define the ways in which changing cultures have addressed these questions in particular in which ways english early modern culture german nineteenth century fantastic and french twentieth century natural ekphrasis have done it

walking shadows focuses on the american fantastic and the american grotesque attempting in this manner for the first time to establish an overview of and a theoretical approach to two literary modes that have often been regarded as essential to an understanding of the american cultural canon the central importance of these two literary forms has been pointed out earlier by important theorists such as stanley cavell david reynolds and william van o connor a number of literary works from the beginning of the nineteenth to the end of the twentieth centuries are taken up in order to illustrate the inherent links or family resemblances between the two modes with special reference to the way in which a bakhtinian reading may facilitate our appreciation of their status within the canon these excursions into the house of fantastic and grotesque fiction may be of interest not only to hardcore aficionados but also to philosophically minded readers in general in particular perhaps to those who have paid acute attention to debates on late twentieth and early twenty first century post structuralism and deconstruction where the classic positions of foucault derrida et al still appear to be relevant

this book explores how theatre and performance can change the way we think about dementia and some of the environments in which dementia care takes place drawing on the author s creative practice and other performance projects in the uk it explores some of the challenges and opportunities of making performance in care homes rather than focusing on the transformative potential of the arts it asks how artists can engage with the different types of relationships that exist in a care community these include the relationships that residents and staff have with each other as well as relationships with care spaces exploring the intersection between participatory performance and the everyday creativity of a care home it argues that the arts have a cultural role to play in supporting dementia care as a relational practice moreover it celebrates the intrinsic creativity of caregiving and how principles and practices of care work can inform theatre and performance in diverse ways

an exploration of the production transmission and mutation of affective tonality when sound helps produce a bad vibe sound can be deployed to produce discomfort express a threat or create an ambience of fear or dread to produce a bad vibe sonic weapons of this sort include the psychoacoustic correction aimed at panama strongman manuel noriega by the u s army and at the branch davidians in waco by the fbi sonic booms or sound bombs over the gaza strip and high frequency rat repellants used against teenagers in malls at the same time artists and musicians generate intense frequencies in the search for new aesthetic experiences and new ways of mobilizing bodies in rhythm in sonic warfare steve goodman explores these uses of acoustic force and how they affect populations traversing philosophy science fiction aesthetics and popular culture he maps a dis continuum of vibrational force encompassing police and military research into acoustic means of crowd control the corporate deployment of sonic branding and the intense sonic encounters of sound art and music culture goodman concludes with speculations on the not yet heard the concept of unsound which relates to both the peripheries of auditory perception and the unactualized nexus of rhythms and frequencies within audible bandwidths

phenomenologies are a major stream of philosophy our aim with this handbook is to explore critically and reflexively the plurality of phenomenologies and their becoming in the context of management and organization studies we detail in the introduction the genealogy of the phenomenological moment and make a distinction between four streams of phenomenologies phenomenology as a phenomenological moment post phenomenologies anti phenomenologies and non phenomenologies beyond many clichés about phenomenologies we argue that phenomenologies cultivate critical perspectives ontologies and even for some of them metaphysics that make them particularly interwoven with other philosophical traditions we draw implications for management and organization studies as a field

skin steven connor argues has never been more visible the book of skin explores the multiple functions of the skin in the cultures of the west in this vividly illustrated book connor draws on evidence from a variety of sources including literary and other forms of public and private writing especially medical texts as well as painting photography and film folklore and popular song because of its newfound visibility skin has never been at once so manifest and so in jeopardy as it is today this dilemma becomes evident in connor s view if we examine how skin is displayed and manipulated as a site of inscription in order to trace our culture s anxious concerns with the materiality and mortality of skin connor s analysis ranges from the human body itself to photography from medieval leprosy renaissance flaying and eternal syphilis to cosmetics plastic surgery and skin cancers connor examines the chromatics of skin color and pigmentation blushing suntanning paleness darkening tattooing cutting the turin shroud the mummy and the invisible man he also offers engaging explanations for why particular colors are ascribed to feelings and conditions such as green for envy purple for rage and yellow for cowardice connor s insights into the obvious and yet unfamiliar terrain of the skin and its place in western culture ameliorates the intensities and attenuations of touch in cultural history the book of skin bears out james joyce s claim that modern man has an epidermis rather than a soul

as dennis patrick slattery s writing shows the very stuff of the great traditions is life itself and the hurly burly of current culture is

the ground in which tradition thrives slattery s analyses are keen and thoughtful often scholarly and always deeply spiritual but they are better for being a bit pugnacious and intimate and virile they give evidence of a life lived in earnest one in which nothing is walled off into a category but all enters into the whole that is the mysterious grounding of the person foreword by louise cowan author of the fugitive group series editor the terrain of comedy the epic cosmos and the tragic abyss founder institute of philosophic studies the university of dallas the teachers academy at the dallas institute of humanities and culture

the routledge companion to jacques lecoq presents a thorough overview and analysis of jacques lecoq s life work and philosophy of theatre through an exemplary collection of specially commissioned chapters from leading writers specialists and practitioners it draws together writings and reflections on his pedagogy his practice and his influence on the wider theatrical environment it is a comprehensive guide to the work and legacy of one of the major figures of western theatre in the second half of the twentieth century in a four part structure over fifty chapters the book examines the historical artistic and social context out of which lecoq s work and pedagogy arose and its relation to such figures as jacques copeau antonin artaud jean louis barrault and dario fo core themes of lecoq s international school of theatre such as movement play improvisation masks language comedy and tragedy investigated by former teachers and graduates of the school the significance and value of his pedagogical approaches in the context of contemporary theatre practices the diaspora of performance practice from the school from the perspective of many of the most prominent artists themselves this is an important and authoritative guide for anyone interested in lecoq s work

this book examines the psychology involved in handling and responding to materials in artistic practice such as oils charcoal brushes canvas earth and sand artists often work with intuitive tactile sensations and rhythms that connect them to these materials rhythm connects the brain and body to the world and the world of abstract art the book features new readings of artworks by matisse pollock dubuffet tápies benglis len lye star gossage shannon novak simon ingram lee mingwei l n tallur and many others such art challenges centuries of philosophical and aesthetic order that has elevated the substance of mind over the substance of matter this is a multidisciplinary study of different metastable patterns and rhythms in art the body and the brain this focus on the propagation of rhythm across domains represents a fresh art historical approach and provides important opportunities for art and science to cooperate

this is a unification of michel foucault s thought as a systematic epistemological project privitera shows that the method and unity of foucault s writings can only be seen by examining their origins in the work of bachelard and canguilhem

assesses merleau ponty s contribution to ethics as calling for a poetic interplay between perception and imagination and between silence and solidarity that reveals our place in the world and our obligations to ourselves and others before his death in 1961 merleau ponty worried about what he saw as humanity s increasingly self enclosed and manipulative way of experiencing self others and the world the consequences of which remain apparent in our destructive inability to connect with others within and across cultures in merleau ponty and the face of the world glen a mazis provides an overall consideration of merleau ponty s

philosophy that brings out what he sees as a corrective prescription for ethical reorientation that is fundamental to merleau ponty's thought mazis begins by analyzing the key role that silence plays for merleau ponty as a positive powerful presence rather than a lack or emptiness and then builds on this to explore the ethical significance of the face to face encounter in his thought as one of solidarity rather than obligation in the last part of the book mazis traces the development of what he calls physiognomic imagination in merleau ponty's work this understanding of imagination is not fancy or make believe but rather brings out the depths of perceptual meaning and leads to an appreciation of poetic language as the key to revitalizing both ethics and ontology drawing on merleau ponty's published works lecture notes unpublished writings and the work of many phenomenologists and merleau ponty scholars mazis also offers incisive readings of merleau ponty's work as it relates to that of antoine de saint exupéry gaston bachelard and emmanuel levinas

moving beyond merely biographical or textual interpretation claude tannery traces the philosophy of life and art developed by andré malraux with both sensitivity and expert interpretation he defines the issues personal and artistic as well as political that underlie malraux's writings including early as well as late works novels speeches and essays the result is a new and subtle portrait of malraux

this edited collection is the second of two volumes offering critical philosophical and interdisciplinary perspectives on contemporary and historic accounts of living in accordance with the broad natural world as at the center of a good and wise life it also explores the meaning and idea of nature in these different perspectives as it relates to and is distinguished from cultural life it builds on the work of pierre hadot and others on the connection that philosophers mystics scholars and others ancient and modern have seen between nature as articulated in physics metaphysics ontologies ecologies biologies and evolutionary theories and forms of self communal cultivation
